



### Flying Report

Many folks who read the reports of your Prairie Pointer publisher learning to fly have been asking how I'm doing since soloing. So I reckon a report to date is in order. Solo time accumulated since that eventful Thanksgiving day when I took to the air alone stand at nine hours. And I have had a mighty lot of fun as well as some anxious moments such as the time I ran smack up against a thick cloud. Boy was I scared. Whew! I had visions of whirling around in that thing or maybe getting upside down and coming out of it on top of the Parkland water tank. However, I swung that Taylorcraft around and down towards Mother Earth and managed to get clear before I was completely swallowed up in the thick of it. Norm Hondle, my instructor, had warned me to stay away from clouds, but I didn't realize how quickly those things can come upon one. Anyway I found out, and also that plenty of altitude comes in very handy at times such as this.

### Winter Flying

Although there are some days when flying conditions for light planes are not too good during the winter months, the cold clear days are certainly wonderful. Visibility is exceptionally clear and the air is as smooth as a salesman's conversation. One such Sunday, recently, at 3,500 feet I could see snow-capped mountains in Canada and on down the coast range into Oregon, and the rugged beauty of Rainier was awe-inspiring at such close range. Persons who have seen these mountains from the air know what I mean. There are few writers who could describe such beauty.

### Check Flight

I took Hondle along one trip recently to check my progress in the art of smooth flying. Check he did and the things he said wouldn't exactly read like a college romance. My steep turns made that plane's nose go up and down like a swallow chasing bugs. He straightened me out on that and then I showed him one of my stalls. That really was a stomach raiser. Instead of holding the altitude nearly even I'd let that craft go down like a falling stone, instead of pouring the throttle on at once so we'd pick up flying speed quickly. After getting back to Russell's office Hondle drew some diagrams for me and said: "Take these along with you and practice the maneuvers yet awhile—then we'll see." That's my progress report to date. Looks like a lot of practice and quite a number of hours to that cherished goal—a private pilot's license.

### New Plane

The good wife and myself were conveyed through the plant of Puget Pacific Planes, Inc., in South Tacoma last Saturday afternoon. They had open house there and the place was jammed with visitors, indicating a great interest in flying by the average citizen. It is reported there are 10,000 licensed pilots in the state of Washington alone, so it doesn't take a crystal ball to see the future of aviation. Not being technically sharp on the engineering aspects of plane building, all the misuses and myself know about this new Wheelair is what we saw and what the man told us. If it will do all that the builders claim for it's good and will be a real contribution to the advancement of flying for the average person. With a comfortable cabin with roomy seating for four people and being non-spinable and non-stallable for added safety make it an outstanding airplane, one of which is nearing completion and will be flight tested soon.

### Hard Freeze

The South End generally is on the cold side this week with temperatures as low as ten degrees being reported. Starting off with snow flurries Sunday and Monday the cold snap really hit us below the stove line Wednesday morning. Many pipes had to be thawed in the early hours so folks could get breakfast coffee water. Varying depths of snow were reported. Around 96th street it was only a scant inch while John Kuper, who resides out Clover Creek way, reported four inches of the stuff covering his bailiwick.

## When Should We Get a High School?

The "South End" is growing. The past few years have seen a tremendous advance in population, building, business and market centers, roads, fire departments, airfields, light and water facilities here. It's difficult to recognize it as the same place of ten years back. At that time patriotic boosters talked of how the district was bound to develop, but even they in their optimistic moods weren't quite prepared for the progress that the past decade brought this section.

At that time, too, quite a few people were saying as how pretty soon there would have to be a high school built to take care of all the "kids" wanting to go to high school and how something would have to be done as soon as we could see our way clear to do it.

Today, people and industries and homes and stores and bus lines and fire trucks and restaurants have arrived—but, as yet, no high school. Most people are agreed we need one though, and (shades of the past!) lots of them are still saying as how something ought to be done just as soon as we can see our way clear to do it.

Well, the way should be clear enough on Saturday, January 18, for residents of Central Avenue, Midland, Collins and Parkland. On that day they will go to the polls to decide whether to tackle the problem of getting a high school now or whether to put it off for another few years.

**The proposition is plain:** "Shall Parkland, Midland, Collins and Central Avenue school districts consolidate for the purpose of providing high school facilities in this area?"

If carried, it means the four districts will unite to form one large district. This one district, under a school board of five members elected by the people and each representing a portion of the new district, will direct the operations of the schools within the district and will take steps necessary to construct a high school.

Of course a yes vote doesn't automatically provide the high school. But a yes vote is the big hurdle. If the four districts can get together on that proposition, there's no question but they'll build the high school, just like they're building the rest of this South End community, a high school which will right away be pressing Puyallup and Cover Park for size.

**The proposition is fair:** Each district must approve it or the plan is entirely rejected. There can be no coercion in any district. If the proposition is approved the location of the high school must be voted on by the people.

**The proposition is sound:** The four districts together have a valuation of over two million dollars and an immediate prospective enrollment of 500 to 600 high school students exclusive of students from non-high districts who may attend. The valuation and the enrollment are very satisfactory for producing a good high school.

It will take money, lots of it. How much will depend on what the people will want in special facilities such as shops, gymnasiums, cafeterias, athletic fields. It will also depend on what funds the State can furnish. But the cost will not be more for us than for other communities who, less able to build than we, have stepped out and done the job.

**The proposition is timely:** It has been said that this is not a good time in which to build. That is true. It is equally true that it is a good time in which to raise the money with which to build later. A high school the size of the one needed is not built overnight. It will take time to raise the money, time to plan, time to build. Waiting to begin will serve no useful purpose—it will only make starting that much more difficult.

**The proposition is yours:** Hearings have been held or are scheduled before election day in all the districts concerned. Efforts have been made to get the facts to everyone. On the pros and cons of those facts you as a voter should decide the issue. The proposition is yours. Make your decision carefully on the basis of all the information you can possibly gather. Of course The Pointer hopes that decision will be to . . .

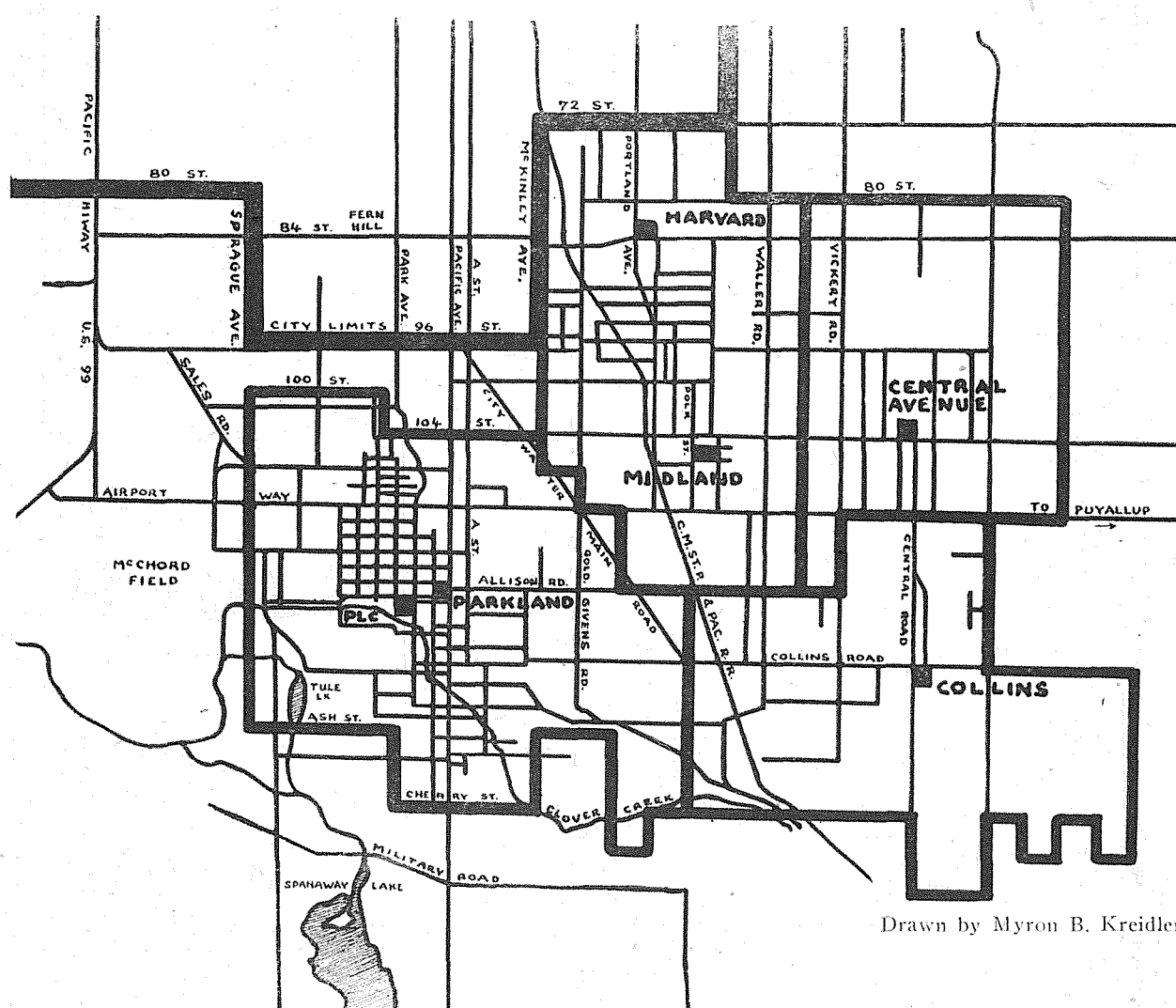

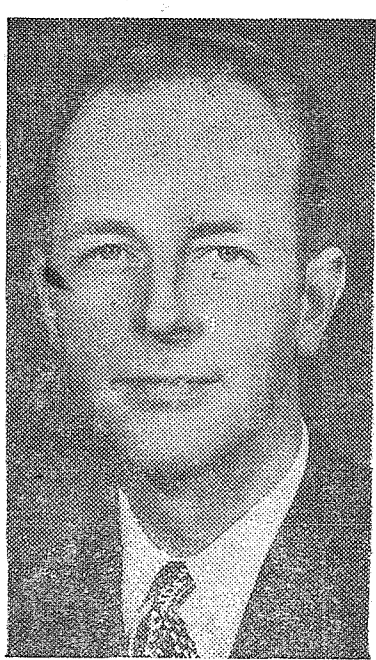
