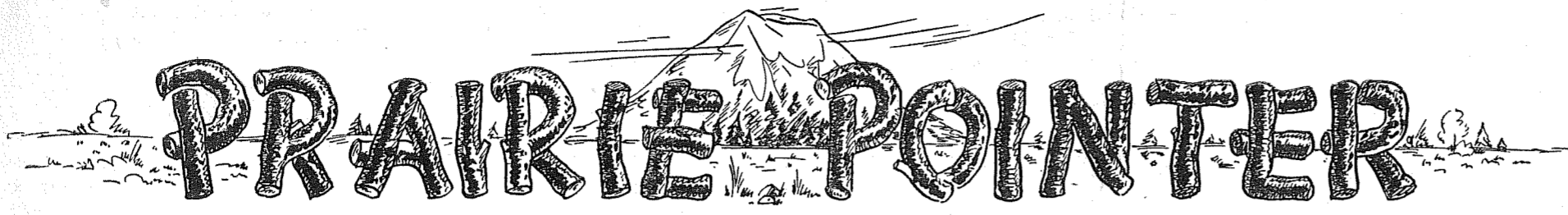

## National Bank of Wash. to Locate New Branch Here

National Bank of Washington will soon establish a new branch to serve the people of Parkland and the surrounding territory, according to a statement made by A. H. Brouse, president.

Approval of this branch permit by the Comptroller of the Currency marks the first branch that National Bank of Washington has established since 1938. The new bank, which will be known as Parkland Branch of National Bank of Washington, will be located on the southeast corner of Pacific Avenue and the Lakeview-Puyallup Highway. Construction

of a modern bank building will begin in the near future, and it is anticipated that the bank will be open for business about December 1.

Plenty of parking space will be available on the north and west side of the building, and one of the special features to be provided for the convenience of customers will be a covered walkway from the parking area to the bank entrance.

"It is the intention of National Bank of Washington," Mr. Brouse stated, "to bring to the people of this large area a complete banking service, including, in addition to the regular deposit and loan facilities, safe deposit boxes and a night depository. The branch will be staffed by a highly skilled organization and backed by the resources of a hundred million dollar bank."

In addition to the Tacoma head office, National Bank of Washington has nine branches in Western Washington located at Auburn, Kent, Bremerton, Fort Lewis, Chehalis, Castle Rock, Winlock, Toledo and Kalama.
