Tadich Does Well In Chicago

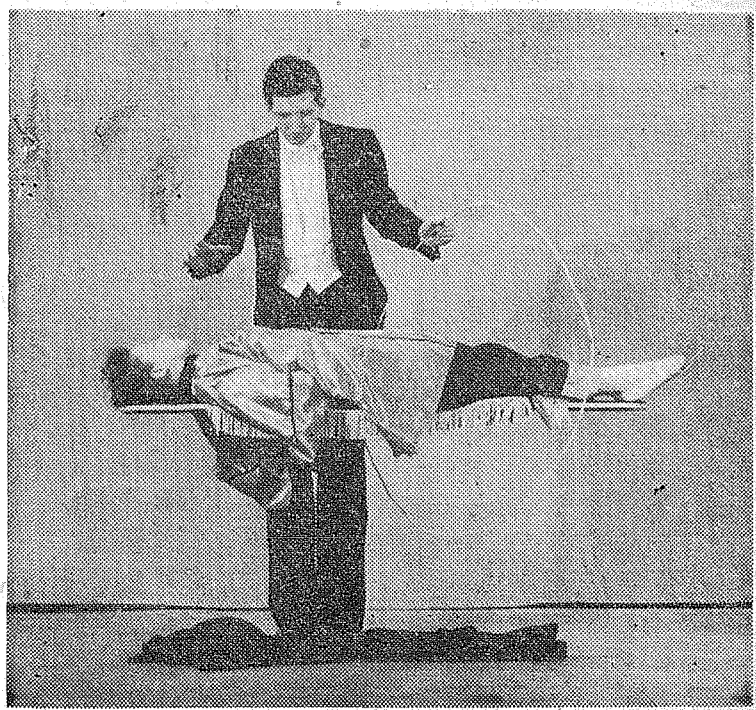

"The mission of the Legion," Gough said, "is to pick the American Communists off with a telescopic-sight rifle rather than shower them with a howitzer. And I think we have been successful. Red-made Christmas Tree Ornaments To Flood America
There is expected to be a flood of "Iron Curtain" Christmas tree orna-

ments from Poland, Czechoslovakia and East Germany and the public should be made aware of the fact that every home in the United States may be directly supporting Communist forces at work in the world—taking advantage of our American Christmas spirit while denying the very Christmas faith which is at the root of the coming holiday season.

Editor Joseph C. Kceley, of the American Legion magazine, suggested two immediate steps to squash the Communist plans to cash in on the U. S. Christmas ornaments market: (1) The U. S. government should recognize that a foreign (Soviet) subsidy is backing the producers of Christmas tree ornaments in those countries, or they couldn't compete with, and sometimes undersell, the

United States' producers; (2) The American public should be acquainted NOW, (when Christmas tree ornaments are beginning to sell in volume), with the facts as well as with the slight physical difference by which "Iron Curtain" ornaments may be identified.

THE ONLY WAY THE AMERICAN BUYERS CAN DISTINGUISH between the two types of ornaments is by examining the "cap" which the stem-holder fits. The U. S. product has the larger cap and is readily distinguishable if compared. U. S. ornaments are more durable and of better quality even though it is almost impossible to determine this by handling or looking at the bulbs at store counters.
