Approximately 100 attended the affair, and refreshments were served following the program.





Such words of wisdom can be applied to tragedies of war. Simply, it means that the best method to eliminate the horrors of war is to prevent them before they get started.

Our war generals, capitalizing on their popularity, maintain the best method of war prevention is military conscription. Time after time they have appeared before Congress to

Very few, if any, times has any mention been made about the importance of maintaining an efficient and qualified corps of diplomatic ambassadors in the foreign lands. Seemingly, there is no importance attached to the job of handling our state department affairs in the countries throughout the world.

Surely no one will deny that if the U.S. has any indispensable men they are the "good, qualified and sincere" men who should handle our foreign problems.

But what is happening? If seems that men, unwanted in our own national capital due to incompetence are tagged for shipment abroad to conduct our foreign relations. Tell us how we can expect good diplomatic results this way.

It is about time America faces its foreign policy with realism and with sound judgment. Nothing short of another conflict will arise unless we send competent men into diplomatic



WORLD WAR I VETS GET **BONUS BALANCE**

Approximately 11,000 veterans of World War I will share a windfall of \$2,750,000 as a result of adjusted interest on bonus loans, the Veterans Administration announced last week.

Checks averaging \$250 will be mailed out to the servicemen. Until now, interest on loans made on World War I service certificates was figured from the date of the loan to the maturity date of the certificate, which in

most cases was January 1945. The Veterans Administration, however, took into consideration the fact that congress authorized redemption of the adjusted service certificates in 1936, approximately nine years ahead of their scheduled maturity.

Under the new policy, interest will be charged only through Oct.

F. W. Kelsey, assistant veterans administrator for finance, said that the checks for the readjusted interest will be mailed automatically where due and that it will not be necessary for the veterans to file claims.

To date, the government has paid out about \$3,800,000,000 on the World War I bonus. However, 18,000 certificates, with a net value of about 12 million dollars, are still outsanding.

Young humming birds will eat every 25 minutes; chicadees more than 30 times every half hour. Young wrens require more food than any bird and have been known to eat more than 1,200 times in 16 hours.
