Dad's Pie Nite New Business Block Started At Fern Hill

It will be Dad's Nite Wednesday, Oct. 27, at 8 o'clock when the Harvard-Midland Preschool meets in the Midland kindergarten room. Construction started last week on a fine new business block in the Fern Hill area on Park avenue near 84th street. Mel Pedersen of Parkland, general contractor for the job, states that the structure will be of concrete block, SCR brick and frame construction, a handsome building which will be a credit to the community. He states that Paul F. Barber, the owner, is putting up the block with the co-operation of R. E. Anderson Co. Lyle Swedberg is the architect.

If there is no unforeseen delay, Mr. Pedersen estimates that the job will be completed about Feb. 1, 1955.

At this time, only one of the units has been leased. Tincher's Pharmacy, established in the community for some time, will be moving into these new and larger quarters as soon as the structure is ready for occupancy.

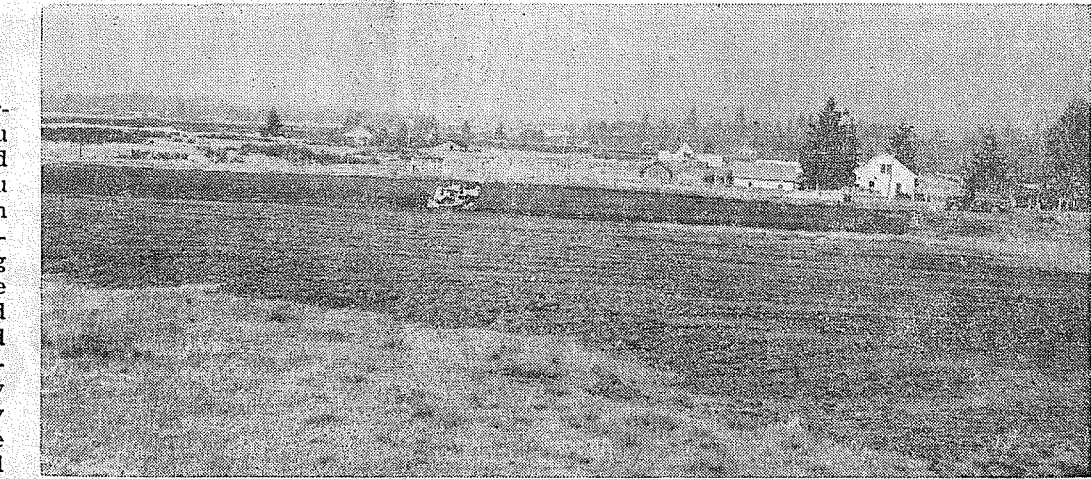

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Rice and Frank Casserole

2 slightly beaten eggs
1 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon dry mustard

1 teaspoon salt
2 cups cooked rice
2 cups grated American cheese
4 skinless frankfurters

Mix in a bowl the eggs, milk, water, mustard, salt, rice and 1 cup cheese. Put into a greased shallow baking dish holding about 6 cups. Split frankfurters lengthwise, being careful not to cut through underside. Fill frankfurters with 1 cup cheese, then arrange, cut side up, on top of rice mixture. Set baking dish in pan containing about 1 inch of hot water. Bake in 350 oven (moderate) about 45 minutes, or until knife inserted near edge of rice mixture comes out clean. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.
