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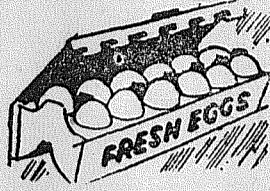

**Pineapple Upside Down
Cake**

Broadcast: March 13, 1954

1/4 cup butter 1 package white
1 cup brown sugar or yellow cake mix
8 slices canned (see note)
pineapple, well 1/2 cup Pet
drained Evaporated Milk
1/2 cup water

Melt butter over very low heat in 9-in. skillet. Remove from heat and sprinkle brown sugar over melted butter. Arrange pineapple slices on sugar. Let stand. Put cake mix into bowl. Add 1/2 of milk and water mixture. Beat hard 1 minute. Stir in rest of milk mixture and beat hard 2 minutes. Pour batter over pineapple. 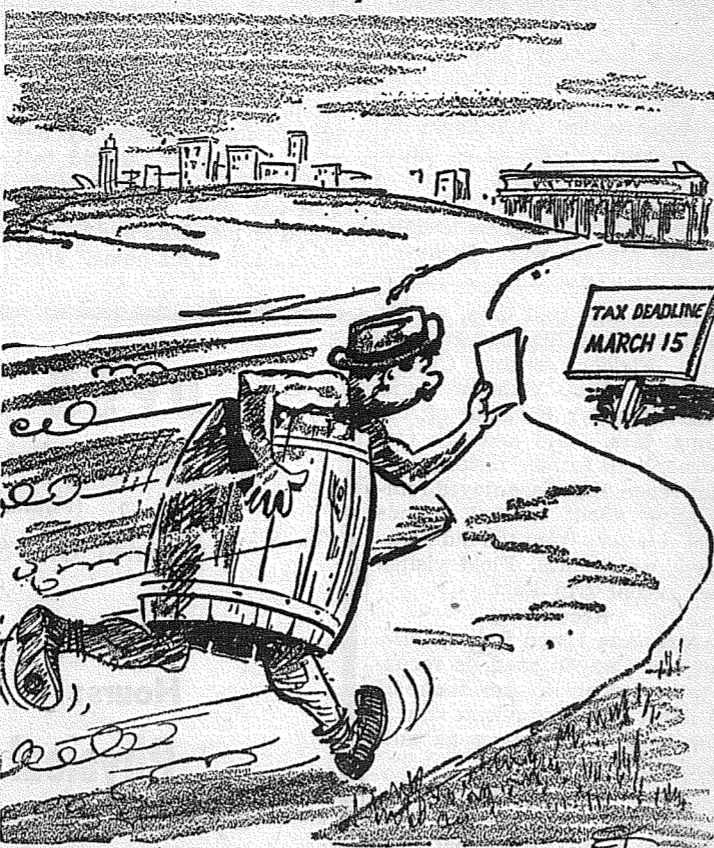

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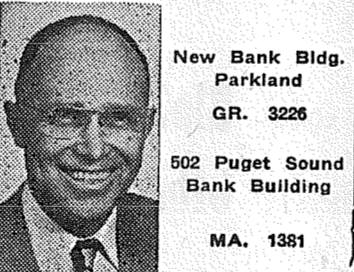

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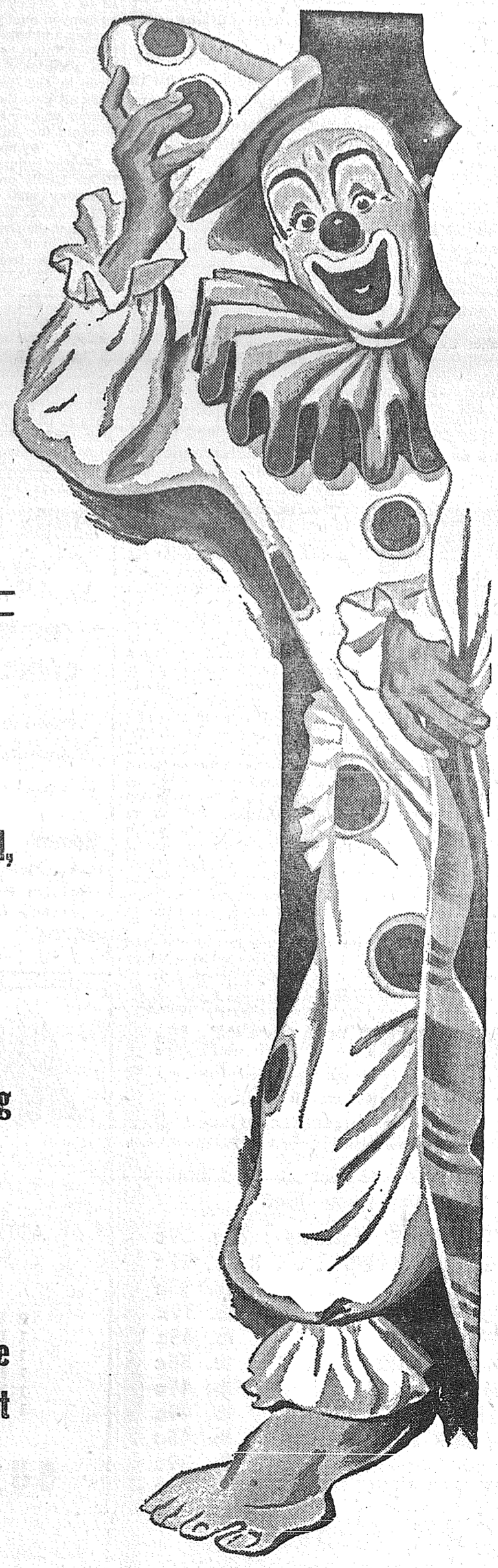

On November 18, 1953, my son Victor, age 17, upon his return from school that day, reported to me that during the day he was called to report to Homer T. Anderson, Superintendent of Bethel School District, which he did. Victor reported to me that the Superintendent, Homer T. Anderson, had questioned him as to pertinent family matters, which I considered of no concern of the District Superintendent or any one else. He questioned our son as to the time his father left home for, and returned from work, which matter I consider as of no concern of the District Superintendent, or anyone else. Victor reported that he, Anderson, told him to try to talk to his parents and try to get them to send the grade school children back to school. He also told our son Victor that his sister, Betty, had trouble in school (which trouble I, as Betty's mother, have never been advised of).

I, immediately that day wrote a letter of complaint to the District Board of Directors, stating that what concerns us, as parents, and our grammar school children, should not be reflected toward or against our high school children. I complained of the obvious threat and act of intimidation on the part of Homer T. Anderson in conversation with our son, Victor, wherein, as related by Victor, Homer T. lawyers would benefit by it. I guess Anderson was afraid then of being sued because of his actions.

In that letter of complaint I petitioned the Board of Directors to consider the actions of the Superintendent as ground for his immediate dismissal. More than a month later I received a letter from the clerk of Bethel School District 403, informing me that, quote, "The Directors ordered the letter filed with Board correspondence and went on record that the Superintendent in performing his administrative duties has the right to talk to any student at any time and the conference you mention in your letter was within the superintendent's line of duty."

Immediately upon receipt of this letter I wrote another letter of protest to the Board and took the stand that the superintendent, regardless of the decision of the board, had no right whatsoever, to talk to my child about anything except

what would concern that child in his school work and school business. The conference he held with my son Victor did not concern Victor or his school activity in any way. Especially do we take exception to the superintendent's conference with our son since he did so after he told me what he would do and after I had told him he had better not interfere with my high school children with anything which did not concern them or him.

This letter, written much more than a month ago, and which I heard read at their next meeting of the board, has not been answered or acknowledged in any way. I suppose it, too, is filed with the Board correspondence and Homer T. Anderson is still superintendent and my grade school children are still out of school.

The bulls were purchased from a famous polled Hereford herd in Pendleton, Oregon.

"They are the best boned, smooth scale and largest hind quarter polled bulls that I have ever handled," Rafferty said.

Tough, Rough and Ready

One fine evening in June, June 28, 1939 to be exact, in

Yankee Stadium New York, a short, blubbery, hairy chested gorilla-like man entered the boxing ring to meet the quiet, deadly-punching Joe Louis.

This match had been looked upon as one of the biggest mismatches ever signed and the fans filled the stadium to see the Brown Bomber make short work of the oddly-built gladiator.

From his stool, the squat, scowling, 235 pound, brawler muttered to himself "I'll moider da bum" and as the bell sounded leaped at his opponent with all intentions of doing just that.

Yes, Tony Galento loved to fight. Not much of a boxer, but a harder puncher and more game performer never set foot inside a ring. This he proved to the jeering fans who came to see him against the great Louis.

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Will Is Not Valid Without Witnesses

John Oldman didn't have a relative in the world nor had he ever married.

When he reached his 70th birthday he thought about what he wanted done with his money after his death. He had a close personal friend, a young man 25 years old, who was the son of dear friends of his.

At his home in Seattle he drew a will in long hand in which he left everything to his young friend, Robert Olson. He knew that holographic wills (That it, wills completely in the handwriting of the testator, which do not require witnesses) were valid in the state where he lived as a child, and he therefore assumed they were also valid in the state of Washington. For this reason he did not have anyone witness his signature and sign as a witness.

Washington Law

He died a short time later, and his will was offered for probate. Unfortunately, it had to be rejected, and as a result Robert Olson received nothing. Since John had no known relatives, his entire estate reverted to the state of Washington.

Holographic wills executed in this state are not valid. In our state a will executed here has to be in writing, signed by the testator, or by some other person under his direction in his presence, and must be attested by two or more competent witnesses signing their names to the will in the presence of the testator by his request or direction.

(This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)

With the first punch of the fight, Galento stunned the surprised Louis with a tremendous right. At the end of the round the puggy Galento trudged back to his corner and the crowd gave him a hand.

During the second round Louis began to find the target and had the 5 ft. 9 inch Galento in trouble.

In the third, Louis had Galento bleeding from the nose, but Galento finally connected with a smashing round house and put Louis on the canvas.

The crowd jumped to their feet in amazement. Hardly had they expected Two-Ton Tony to make any showing at all, let alone putting the great Louis on the floor.

Well, to make a long story short, Galento's glory was short lived as Louis came back in the fourth round to batter Tony into submission.

From that evening on, Galento was one of the biggest drawing attractions in the country. He engaged in several boxing matches later on and won most of his important fights.

His main interest was to meet Louis again, but this bout was never arranged for some unknown reason.

He invested his money in a tavern, where he set up his gym, in which to train. He was accused of training mainly on beer and he never denied the charges. Whenever questioned about his training program, his answer was always "I'll Moider Da' Bums."

During his travels, as added attractions, he fought a kangaroo, an octopus and several other weird creatures.

His contest with the octopus took place in Seattle and he killed the eight armed beast with one punch in the underwater dual. Tony felt bad about the incident and attended the

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Cinnamon Pecan Rolls Will Brighten Breakfast

by Dorothy Maddox

A breakfast "to grow on" is vital to a good day and good health. When you serve nutritionally rich hot breads, you pack a lot of pleasure into the meal, too. Try these rolls for everybody's enjoyment.

Cinnamon Pecan Rolls (6 cinnamon pecan rolls)

One teaspoon melted butter or margarine, 6 brown-n-serve dinner rolls, ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon, 2½ teaspoons granulated sugar, 1 tablespoon chopped pecans.

Brush butter over top of each roll. Combine cinnamon and sugar and sprinkle ½ teaspoon over each roll. Top with chopped pecans. Bake in a greased shallow pan in hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 12 minutes. Serve immediately.

Here is how to make short shift of preparation time: The cinnamon pecan rolls may be oven-readied the night before, refrigerated for holding and baked while the rest of the breakfast menu is in process.

Cereal ingredients, too, may be measured in the evening, for quick cooking in the morning. For easy out-of-hand eating, oranges may be cut into wedges, leaving just enough at the bottom to hold together.

We went to a luncheon recently where a new type of cake was introduced. It uses a brand name flour that gives a soft and silky texture and a popular vegetable oil. We thought it a genuinely fine cake.

"Lovelight" Chocolate Two-egg Chiffon Cake

Two eggs, separated; 1½ cups sugar, 1¼ cups sifted cake flour, ¾ teaspoon soda, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ cup vegetable oil, 1 cup buttermilk (sweet milk may be substituted for buttermilk in this recipe), 2 squares unsweetened chocolate (2 ounces), melted.

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. (modern). Grease generously and dust with flour 2 round layer pans, 8 inches by at least 1½ inches deep or 9x1½ inches. Now, just 3 easy steps.

1. Meringue is the key to this cake. Beat egg whites until frothy. Gradually beat in ½ cup of sugar. Continue beating until very stiff and glossy.

2. Only 2 minutes batter beating. Sift remaining sugar, cake flour, soda, salt into another bowl. Pour in oil, half of buttermilk. Beat 1 minute, medium speed on mixer or 150 vigorous strokes by hand. Scrape sides and bottom of bowl constantly. Add remaining buttermilk, egg yolks, chocolate. Beat 1 minute more, scraping bowl constantly.

3. Simple folding of meringue assures fluffy texture. Just fold

meringue into batter by cutting down gently through batter, across the bottom up and over, turning bowl often. Pour into prepared pans. Bake layers 30 to 35 minutes. Cool. Split each layer into two layers. Spread chocolate fluff between

layers and over cake. Store in refrigerator until used.

Chocolate Fluff

Mix together in chilled bowl 2 cups whipping cream, 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar, ½ cup cocoa, dash of salt. Beat until enough to hold to a point.

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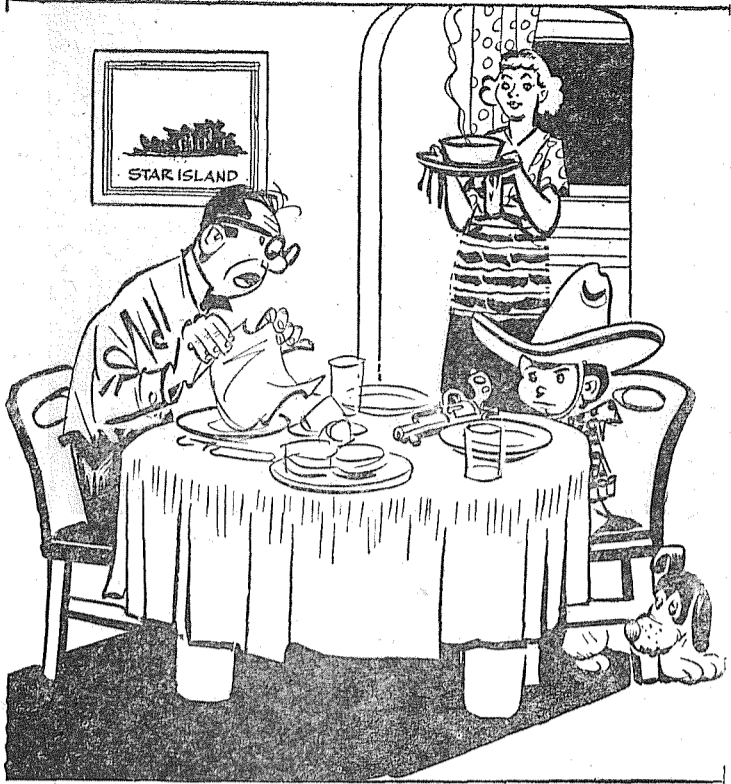
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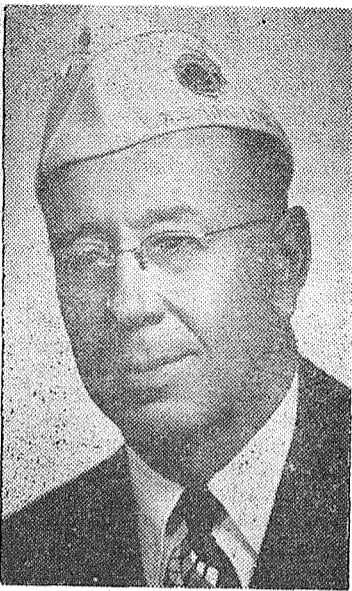

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County Agents' Corner

By C. R. Doran

"You can eat your cake and have it too," said a speaker at the Western Washington Farm Forestry meeting. He was talking of good farm forestry practices in management of second growth timber.

Thinning of trees speeds up the production of saw logs timber per acre. New markets are developing for the material removed so that thinning is becoming a profitable operation too.

I recently attended a small tour with John Bosshart, Orting, forester for the St. Paul Tacoma Lumber company. On company second growth lands they have several horse loggers at work removing trees marked for thinning. These loggers are self-employed taking their income from sale of material removed.

If thinning is a paying operation for industry it appears to have good possibilities for farm forest owners.

56,000 acres of second growth is under private ownership in Pierce County.

Adna Booth, president of the Western Washington Farm Forestry association gave a good example of the advantages of selective logging. The case he cited was a clear cut in 1950 disregarding principles of good forestry. They recovered 32,000 board feet per acre for an income of \$293. Had they chosen to work it on a 15 year selective cut the following could have

He will not stay in baseball as a manager or coach but will spend all of his time managing his business interests. He owns a liquor store in Tampa, Florida.

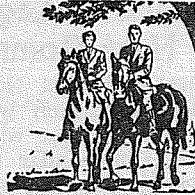

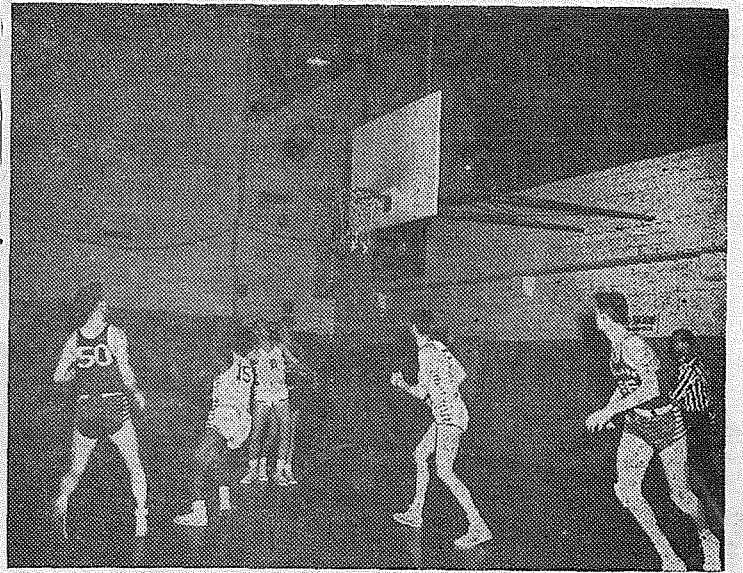

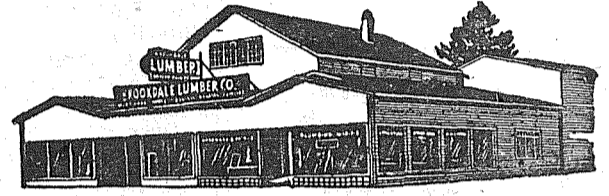

Martin Holland, Edgewood fryer grower has a good system of feeding young chicks. He uses egg flats with a lath edge. Its easily constructed. The egg flats or cardboard is tacked to the bottom of a lath framework. These are placed on top the litter around the edge of the brooder.

Even though the flat feeders are used for only a few days much feed is saved by using the lath edges.

The chicks don't scratch as much feed out of the feeders. Martin says that feed efficiency has improved since he started using them.

After the feeders have been used for one flock the egg flat is pulled off and burned. It takes only a few minutes to tack on a new paper.

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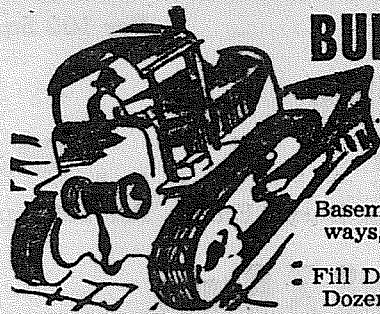
