Then word will go out to the Parkland business firms cooperating in the Derby and such gifts as are appropriate at that early date will be delivered immediately. Other gifts may be claimed by the proud parents at their convenience.

Anyone knowing of a baby born to Parkland parents early New Year's day in a hospital in some other community is asked to notify the Times-Journal. That baby would be eligible to win if the parents actually live in the Parkland community, but the "blessed event" might be overlooked by the Times-Journal staff unless attention was called to it.

The name of the Baby Derby winner will be announced in the Times-Journal dated Jan. 8. However, as the contest will be decided long before that date, the parents of the winning baby will be notified from the Times-Journal office as soon as it is apparent which baby has won.

In each of the previous four years, the contest has attracted much attention and interest and the parents of the winner have always been amazed and delighted with the many valuable prizes. This year's prizes are the finest offered to date and will be a welcome addition to any provision made for the arrival of the little stranger.

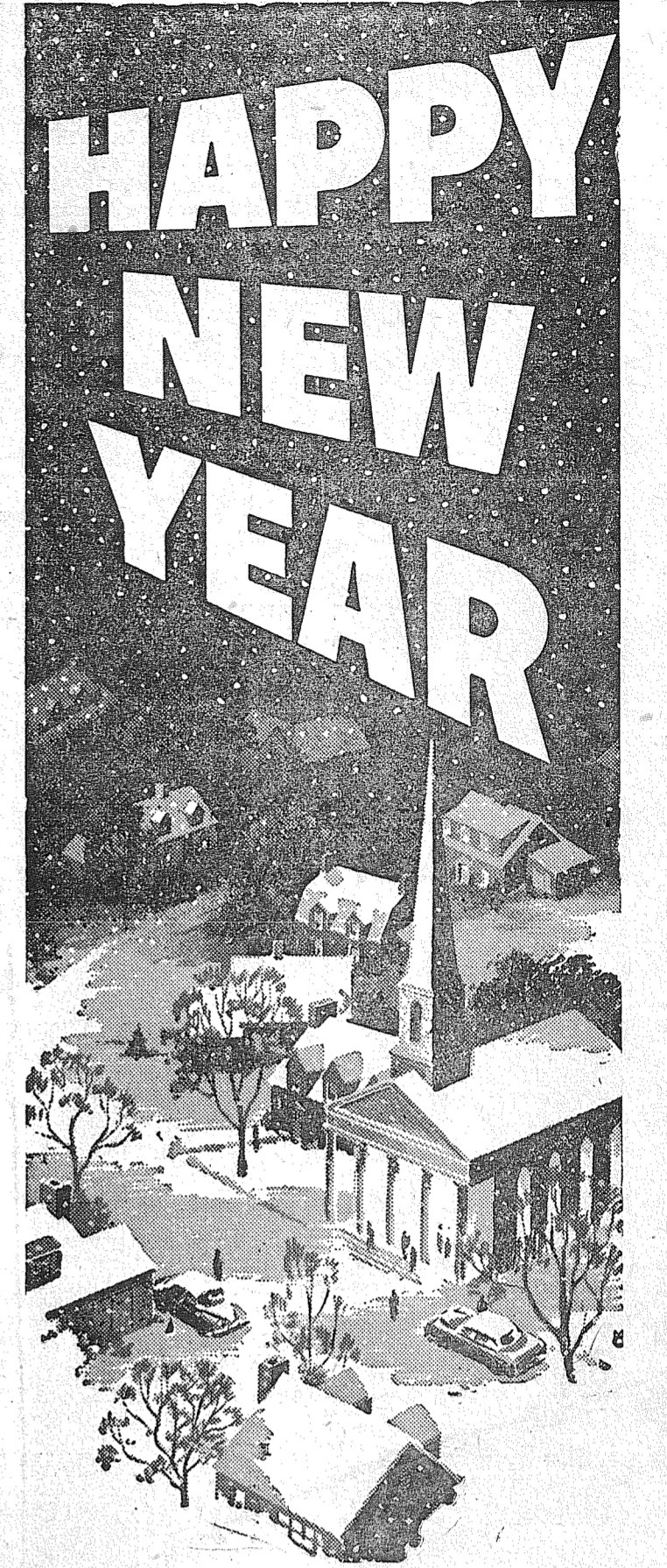

Save Electricity: Save Workers Jobs

Authorities tell us that the heaviest use of electric power comes between the hours of 5:30 and 6:15 p.m. This statement suggests that savings during the dinner preparation hour are most important. If you and I each save a little, together we can make a noticeable contribution to the general power pool.

Are you making economical use of your electric stove? Use pans that fit the units so that the heat is not lost around the sides of the pan. Adjust the units so that the heat is coming up through the bottom of the pan only.

When cooking food in water, turn units down when the water boils. Rapid boiling adds no more heat and can cause the food to break down into mushy, unattractive pieces more easily. Turn off units completely when cooking time nears completion as much heat stored in the unit will be enough to finish cooking the food.

Time vegetables and other products to be just done when dinner is to be served. Nutritionally it is better for you and cooking time and electricity are not wasted.

Plan to use your deep-well utility cooker for more one-dish meals. Meat stews, corned beef and cabbage, baked beans, chowders and spaghetti with meat sauce are good on cold winter days.

Use aluminum foil in which to wrap small amounts of leftover vegetables and drop these packages into boiling water in one pan. Less dishes to wash and more electricity saved.

Oven meals are in order in this critical period. The oven uses less electricity than surface units cooking the same amount of food for a dinner. Try casseroles, meat and fish loaves, with scalloped and baked potatoes; use dumplings or oven baked rice. Cook vegetables, such as onions, carrots and potatoes, around the Sunday pot roast. Reheat canned and frozen vegetables in a covered casserole. Desserts also will fit into the oven with the main dinner foods. Cobblers, pies, apple crisps and bread puddings will be enjoyed by the whole family.

Use candle warmers to keep coffee hot at the table. This adds a festive touch to the serving.

Make your candies the uncooked variety. They're good, and even the youngsters can do it for you. Popcorn the old-fashioned way and roast marshmallows, too—use the fireplace. The kids will love it.

Saving electricity can be a project for the whole family without sacrificing any of the joy of cooking.

Johnny O'Brien Sets Scoring Mark

Little Johnny O'Brien, the mighty mite of the Seattle University Chieftains basketball team, set a new four-year scoring record for collegiate basketball Saturday night in Philadelphia as he scored 26 points against St. Joseph's college. This brought his current total to 2,618 points with 22 games remaining to be played this year. Seattle University is in the east at present playing several of the top teams in the country. In their first eastern engagement the Chieftains topped New York University in a hectic battle by a 102 to 101 count. The score in the St. Joseph's contest was 90 to 77 in favor of the Seattle squad. In both games, record crowds turned out to see the little giant perform. Fans in this area will have the opportunity of watching the Chieftains in operation against the Pacific Lutheran Gladiators on Jan. 20 at the PLG gym.

East Downs West in Thriller

Led by the great passing quarterback from the University of Illinois, Tom O'Connell, the underdog Eastern eleven upset the West in a bitterly fought contest Saturday afternoon in San Francisco. The annual East-West football classic had the fans on their feet during most of the game. O'Connell played the entire game on offense for the Eastern squad and set a new passing record by completing 21 tosses for 229 yards. The East displayed terrific spirit in the final minutes of the game and moved 71 yards to score the winning touchdown with only a few seconds remaining in the game. For the West, Billy Veselski, the All-American back from Oklahoma, was the outstanding star. He made several nice runs through the East line and also took a pass from Don Heinrich, the U. of W. quarterback, and romped for a touchdown. When the final gun sounded, the East held a 21 to 20 advantage in an evenly fought game.

PLC Downs Alaska U.

The Pacific Lutheran Gladiators made short work of the University of Alaska Polar Bears Saturday night as they took a lopsided 81 to 23 win over the visitors from the north. It was evident at the beginning that the U. of Alaska was no match for the taller PLC team. Coach Mary Harshman of the Lutes used his reserves most of the game and still the contest was too one-sided. Garnet Lund, the Lute's center, was high point man for the evening with 15 points. The next PLC home game will be on January 14, when they meet the strong College of Puget Sound team.

Rose Bowl Game Thursday

Thursday, Jan. 1, 1953, will bring together two strong football teams for the annual Rose Bowl game in Pasadena, Calif. The University of Southern California will meet the Wisconsin gridders before a crowd of around 103,000 fans. This game should be a good one considering the records and strength of both teams. The U.S.C. squad will be a slight pre-game favorite because of their excellent defensive team. The Badgers will depend on their great fullback, Alan Ameche, to do most of the running in the backfield. The Trojans have no outstanding backs on offense, but either Sears, Sellers or Carmichael are capable of making a good showing and will probably give the Badgers a rough afternoon. Both squads will be at full strength as injuries have been light in practice so far.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Glorified Custard

1/2 cup shredded coconut
10 marshmallows, quartered
2 slightly beaten eggs

2 Tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup boiling water
1/4 teaspoon vanilla

Grease lightly 4 custard cups holding about 3/4 cup each. Put into bottom of cups equal portions of 1/2 cup coconut and the marshmallows. Mix in bowl the beaten eggs, sugar, salt, milk, water and vanilla. Pour over coconut and marshmallows in cups. Sprinkle tops with equal parts of 1/2 cup coconut. Set into pan holding about an inch of hot water. Bake in slow oven (325) about 35 minutes, or until knife inserted an inch from outer edge comes out clean. Serve warm or cold.

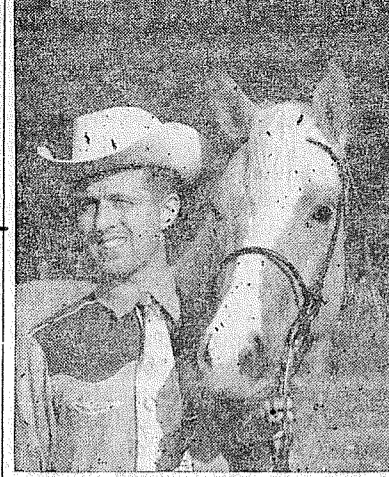

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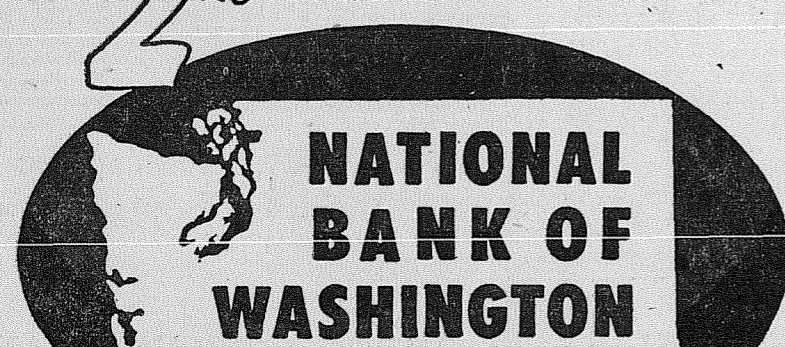
