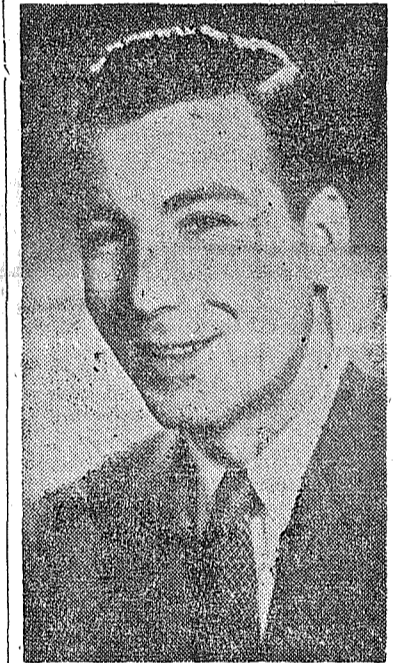
Well Baby Clinic

SPANAWAY FREE AMBULANCE HAS BUSY FIRST WEEK

Interesting and varied experiences marked the first week's operation of the free ambulance provided by the Spanaway Community club for the use of the Spanaway Volunteer fire department.

The first call came Wednesday night, March 12, and the special rescue squad took Herman Pajpans from his Spanaway lake home to Tacoma General hospital. Critically ill with pneumonia at that time, Mr. Pajpans failed to rally and died in the hospital early Monday morning.

Friday morning, March 14, brought a call for assistance when L. S. Thorpe of 161 So. 112th St., Parkland, suffered a stroke at his home. He was rushed to a Tacoma hospital, where his condition was reported as satisfactory Monday afternoon.

Harry F. Pillsbury of Spanaway had a heart attack Sunday afternoon and was taken to St. Joseph's hospital. He was reported doing as well as could be expected Monday afternoon.

Monday morning brought a call from Mrs. David Roebuck, 1105 So. 119th St., for a hurry-up trip to Madigan hospital. A fast ride to Fort Lewis outdistanced the stork by a narrow margin, to the relief of the ambulance attendants who thought they might be needed for midwife service along the way. Mrs. Roebuck's husband is serving in Korea.

A message from a Times-Journal reader Monday called attention to the fact that a letter from Sheriff Harold Bird, published last week, made no reference to Spanaway in connection with the ambulance service. The fact that it is so thoroughly understood that Spanaway Community club provided the free ambulance, and that the Spanaway Volunteer Fire department operates it, probably accounts for the failure of the Times-Journal editor to notice the omission. Sheriff Bird joins the Times-Journal in apologies to the people of Spanaway, who are providing such a magnificent service for the entire south end of the county.

The Daffodil Festival which originated in the Puyallup Valley, but gradually taken over by Tacoma interests, each year loses appeal to many thousands of area residents. At one time the Parade and Festival was the top attraction in the Valley where the daffodils really grow. The flower show used to be held in Sumner, where the center of the bulb industry is; now, however, it has been taken away from the source and taken to Tacoma and has reached a high degree of commercialization which readily reflects on the quality of the show and the main interest.

Small business and individuals are being more and more discouraged from entering floats in the parade, which, too, used to be the big attraction of the parade. Now due to the complex rules and stipulation as to number of flowers, etc., which must be on the float, it's increasingly difficult for the small fellow even to get into the parade, much less enter a float which will meet the standards of the committee . . . to win . . . hardly ever.

Valley residents would be wise to retain more of the control over the festival and once again restore to it its original intent . . . not an advertising scheme for Tacoma. The main parade used to be in Puyallup and Sumner . . . now large majority of the parade never even leaves Tacoma.

Hundreds of horsemen in the Valley and elsewhere used to look forward to the annual ride in the colorful event . . . now gradually, due to the screwy rules set up by the Tacoma end of the parade, which controls the affair, any mounted group is actually discouraged from entering the parade. In order to even ride it is necessary to maintain your position in the last section, where due to the jumbled control over that portion of the parade, one finds what mounted groups who want to ride jammed into one mess.

It is the contention of many riding clubs and mounted groups, posses, etc., that in order to properly display the hundreds of fine horses and outstanding equipment together with the splendid uniforms and flags of the units that the mounted groups should be interspersed throughout the entire parade. Kids by the thousands go to the parade only to see the pretty horses. Many clubs are going on record this year against the vindictive measures of the committee in this regard.

It has been a custom of the Governor for years to ride in the Daffodil Parade; however, this year he has decided not to ride. That in itself will be disappointing to many who appreciate the prestige created by the Governor and his presence.

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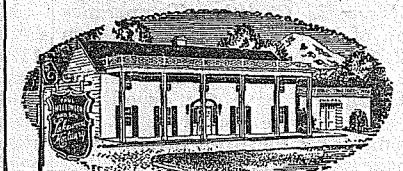

Mrs. E. Beitz and Mrs. H. Beitz, calling committee in case of fire for the firemen, were also presented with badges.

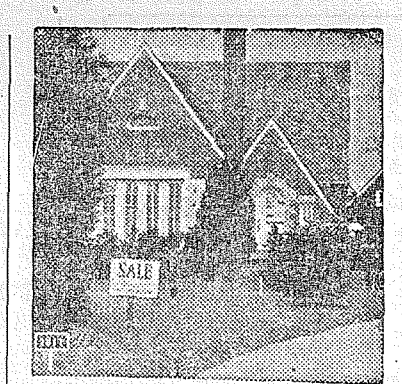
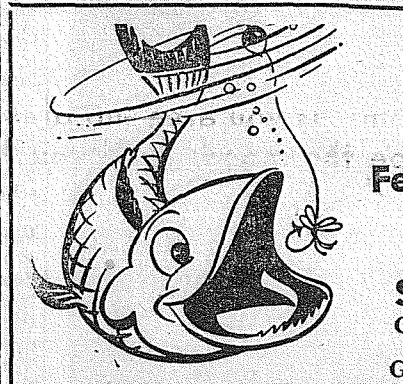

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Salmon Egg Casserole
1 1/2 cup noodles
2 1/2 cups boiling water
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
4 hard-cooked eggs
1 1/2 cups Pet Milk
1 1/2 cups sliced salmon, canned
few grains pepper
1 cup grated American cheese
2 teaspoons grated onion

Boil noodles in water and 1 1/2 teasp. salt 15 min., or until tender. Drain. Cut eggs in halves, lengthwise, and remove yolks. Mash yolks; mix in gradually 1/2 cup milk. Mix in salmon, 1/2 teasp. salt and few grains pepper. Fill egg whites with half of salmon mixture. Mix rest of mixture with noodles, cheese, 3/4 cup milk, onion, 1 teasp. salt and few grains pepper. Put into greased 1 1/2-qt. baking dish. Arrange stuffed eggs on top. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 25 min., or until bubbly hot. Makes 4 servings.

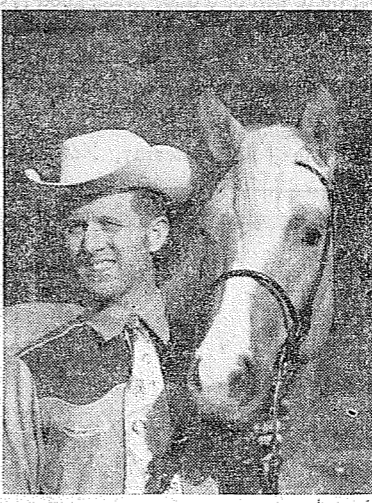

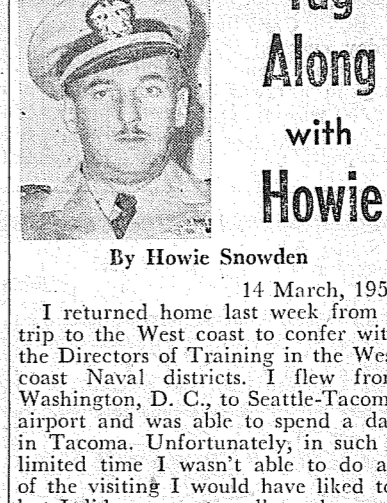
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Tag Along with Howie
