A Word From The Acting Bishop The Rev. Jan Nesse

Many of us start working on the church budget in October and so we start talking about stewardship a lot more. I have been reading quite a bit lately about stewardship, especially as it relates to small congregations. But I've come to realize that stewardship is individual and it doesn't matter the size of the congregation. Stewardship is not about money, but it certainly shows up there...probably because money is so important to us.

I think we should change the word for stewardship because it has been used to mean so many things: collecting an offering, making a budget, having a capital campaign, and time, talent and treasure/money. Stewardship seems to be always a church word; it has kind of lost its real meaning.

A "stigweard" is an Old English term for steward. Stig means "house" and weard means "warden or keeper". My old dictionary defines a steward as "one employed in a large household or estate to manage domestic concerns including supervision of servants, collection of rents, and keeping of accounts." Maybe we should call it "Stigweard-ship." Okay, maybe not.

The position of the steward is one of great responsibility and also one requiring great accountability. Stewards have no inherent authority of their own. Their only authority comes from their master, the one for whom they work. In business we would call these people

managers. When we accept Christ as the core and foundation of our faith, we acknowledge a relationship to God as a steward, maybe we think of ourselves as managers of God's gifts.

But I think we know that basic concept of stewardship. The question is: How does that knowledge move from our heads to our hearts? How do we teach new Christians about stewardship/stigweardship; about managing God's gifts? I think the words of Paul to Timothy give us ample instruction, "set the believers an example in speech and in conduct, in love, in faith, in purity..."

Maryanne was a single parent, doing the best she could to raise five-year-old Ryan. She was single because her husband had left her. I don't even know all the circumstances. It

doesn't matter. She loved her son and "taught" him well.

Once when Maryanne was reading a bedtime story to Ryan, he stopped her and asked if she had bought that book for him.

"Yes," she said.

And then he asked if she had also bought the bed in which he slept.

"Yes," she said.

Had she bought the house they called home? Yes, she had.

And what about his new jacket that was brand new? "Yes," she said, she had bought that, too.

He was very quiet for a few moments. Then he got out of his bed and retrieved his piggy bank from across the room. "Mommy," he said. I have seven pennies and I want you to take them and get something you really want for you."

Maryanne was a teacher of stewardship, not with her words, not with her beliefs, but with her actions and her love.

In fewer than 5 years, Ryan had learned that everything he had was a gift from his mother. His response was to offer her his seven cents - everything he had. I imagine when Ryan is older, he will come to know the real source of all that he has. But he has already learned how to respond.

Until I arrive give attention to the public reading of scripture, to exhorting, to teaching. Do not neglect the gift that is in you, which was given to you through prophecy with the laying on of hands by the council of elders. Put these things into practice, devote yourself to them, so that all may see your progress. Pay close attention to yourself and to your teaching; continue in these things, for in doing this you will save both yourself and your hearers."
