### A Word From The Bishop

"No longer drink only water, but take a little wine for the sake of your stomach and your frequent ailments." 1 Timothy 5:23

Every 45 seconds a child dies of malaria in the world. By the time you finish this article at least two or three children will have lost their fight to this disease. Malaria is a disease that we, the world community, can prevent and treat. Lutheran Churches in various countries in Africa are preparing to fight this disease as the financial resources are raised in this country, by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

At our recent Churchwide Assembly the ELCA kicked off its Malaria Campaign. The goal is to raise \$15 million dollars over the

next five years. This money will support the work of our companion churches in Africa. Also at the Assembly it was announced that the Conference of Bishops, the Church Council and the Churchwide executives have pledges \$1.5 million to this campaign. Members of the Churchwide Assembly added to that number by pledging over \$175,000 to this effort. We are off to a good start!

Now we are coming to you. If every baptized member of this church contributed \$5 to this campaign, we would oversubscribe our goal. That is an achievable goal. Obviously not every member will have the money to give. We ask that those with greater resources support this cause so that those with fewer resources do not feel compelled to give more than they can.

You can donate through your local congregation or by going to www.elca.org/malaria. The problem is global and can seem beyond our capacity. The fact is that it has grown to the size that it is because we have had that view.

We do have the capacity to save lives and to change the world. That is not just marketing hype it is a fact. We will not be alone in this effort. The Christian Church across denominational lines is addressing this disease. It is important that we, in the ELCA, do our part.

### Boundaries Training Opportunity

The ELCA requires that all rostered leaders attend Boundaries Training at least once, early during their period of rostered service.

Boundaries Training provides clear information on sexual misconduct prevention for people in positions of power, which includes pastors and lay leaders, and everyone who works with children and

and lay leaders, and everyone who works with children and other vulnerable people. The training helps us understand how to keep ourselves healthy, to ensure that our personal needs are met without coercive participation by those we serve.

The next training session in our area is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 20, at Faith Lutheran in Seattle. Barbara Keller will be the presenter; she is a consultant to the ELCA on sexual misconduct issues and presents a clear program for misconduct prevention. ### FAN Positions On Initiatives

Faith Action Network takes positions on three ballot initiatives:

Recommend Opposing Initiative Measure

No. 1125; limits transportation funding.

The measure would provide that a toll on a particular road or bridge could be used only for construction, operation or maintenance of that particular road or bridge, thus limiting revenue for other important project such as light rail.

- Recommend Endorsing Initiative Measure No. 1163; improving long-term care for elderly. Home care workers are some of our most valuable workers providing critical in-home services to the elderly and disabled. This measure would reinstate background checks, training and other requirements for long-term care workers providing services to the elderly and disabled.
- Recommend Opposing Initiative Measure No. 1183 concerning the sale of liquor (spirits). Right now, the profits from our state-run liquor stores go directly to services like health care, schools and public safety. With budget deficits at every level of government the impact on public services would be severe.

On Wednesday, August 24, 57 people from ten congregations throughout the synod attended the Faith Formation Workshop at Trinity Lutheran College in Everett.

Sue Houglum, Professor and Chair of Early Childhood Education at Trinity Lutheran College, was the guest speaker. Sue provided the history of children's Christian education and an overview of Sunday school models.

Originally Sunday school's purpose was to teach children to read and write so why do we still have Sunday school today in this teaching format? Are there other ways to experience God that are outside of Sunday School? It is important for children to experience God and worship is a great place to do this.

After the opening, there were four sessions people chose from: 0-3years old; PreK-1st grade; 2nd-6th grade; or Fellowship, Faith & Family. We came back together for a short discussion on self-care and how we can increase our margin in the five areas of emotion, physical, financial, time and spirituality. People from the various congregations spent time networking and discussing the information they discovered and possible next steps.

The Lutheran college fairs and workshops are designed to give insight into the unique aspects of Lutheran higher education and a chance to meet representatives from some member colleges and universities. There is no charge and no need to pre-register. In addition, students who attend the event will receive four application fee waivers. # The Rev. D. Scott Postlewait Honored

This award is presented by the ELCA's Youth, Young Adult, and Campus Ministry Program and recognizes staff for creativity and risk-taking within their ministry settings. Scott was nominated by his colleague, the Rev. Deacon Mary Shehane, Episcopal Diocese of Olympia, as well as two students who specifically cited his involvement with and support for the *UW United Students Against Sweatshops' Kick Out Sodexo Campaign*.

Both students mentioned Scott's call to them to "live out [their] faith in a concrete way" and indicated that his example, personal involvement and frequent reassurances of prayer motivated them in this social justice campaign, especially when it seemed the cause was a hopeless one. Thank you for supporting a ministry and a pastor that encourage young adults to not only go to church, but to **be** the church.

The Faith and Criminal Task Force of the ELCA is in the process of developing a social statement on the wide-range and complex issues associated with criminal justice. The study is called *Hearing the Cries: Faith and Criminal Justice*. The task force needs to have input from

- Volunteers from First Lutheran in Mount Vernon have been serving dinner at Friendship House on the last Tuesday of the month for 20 years. They make sloppy joes, and brownies, and bring lettuce, tomato and salad dressings.
- Church of Mary Magdalene in Seattle will celebrate their 20th anniversary on Saturday, Sept. 24. The celebration includes: singing at 10 a.m., worship service at 11 a.m. and a reception at noon. The church of Mary Magdalene is for women who are struggling to be free from homelessness, poverty and abusive treatment. The Church of Mary Magdalene is ecumenical and non-denominational.
