Congratulations Leymah Gbowee!

Just two days before learning that she was a recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, Leymah Gbowee was speaking to a captivated audience at Queen Anne Lutheran, Seattle.

Gbowee, a member of the Lutheran Church in Liberia, is responsible for organizing a non-violent women's movement that brought an end to a 14-year civil war in Liberia.



The starting point of the women's movement was war fatigue, said Gbowee, a mother of six children. She grew tired of watching children die from hunger and "waking up every morning and not knowing whether a tomorrow was possible. You can't plan for the future." Along with thousands of other women from across Liberia, Gbowee wanted to dream of a better community. She decided it was time to stop the war and called together women of all faiths—Christian, Muslim, indigenous and others—from across Liberia to "step out," recognizing that Liberian women can play a critical role in peace building.

Gbowee's story is chronicled in the documentary *Pray the Devil Back to Hell*. She has just completed her memoir, *Mighty Be Our Powers: How Sisterhood, Prayer, and Sex Changed a Nation at War* -- a book that examines "the power of women and the power of faith in getting you (out) from the darkest place in your life," she said.

A Word From The Bishop

“For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.” Jeremiah 29:11 NRSV

How can we plan for the future? We live in a time of transition and change. We do not know what is coming and we are still trying to recover from the changes that have already affected us. We are trying to hang on, not plan.

Having a vision that God is calling us to faithful discipleship is critical for us, our congregations and the synod. The years of “five year mission plans” may well be behind us in the increasingly changing world. Having strategies to inform our work and our decision making is increasingly essential.

Ten years ago Pastor Jan Nesse and I set our goals to start new worshipping communities and support the development of new rostered leaders. That continues to be our goal. In the process Pastor Nancy Winder, Candidacy, and Pastor Jerry Buss, Director of Evangelical Mission, have joined the staff to work on these directions. It informs our decision making when we know what we are trying to accomplish, especially in times of financial distress.

The 2011 Churchwide Assembly adopted a recommendation from the *Living Into the Future, Together* (LIFT) Task Force that encourages each congregation in the ELCA to develop a mission strategy by December 2012. For some congregations it will be easy to reshape current planning and identify mission strategy. For others this looks like more paperwork. It is my hope that the Synod Office will be a partner with you in developing your strategy. The goal is not the filing of papers with this office or churchwide. The goal is for each congregation to be clear about how God is using your congregation to give future

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and hope to your community and world.

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A Word From The Bishop

As we have talked at the churchwide and synod expressions, the deadline of 2012 is a goal not an enforceable date. The process needs to get started and there needs to be a target. Think of the next year as that space to work on this visioning process. Where is God calling you? What does your community need that you can provide? If your congregation were to disappear tomorrow, what would your neighbors say is missing?

The hope is that every congregation will be able to verbalize its work in ways that invite its members to greater participation and that also invites others to join in the mission of Jesus taking place in each congregation. Expect the question, “What is your mission strategy or plan?” This is not to shame or criticize. It is to help us be clear in our response to the world around us and to speak and act in Christ’s name.

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A Very Serious Problem

On September 24 I attended the *Greening Your Congregation* event and listened to University of Washington professor Paul Johnson present the data on anthropogenic (human-created) climate change.

It is a bleak picture to be sure: Because of the effects our carbon dioxide and methane emissions have on the atmosphere, most of the Arctic ice will be gone by 2040, and global warming will accelerate tremendously once that occurs.

Sea levels will rise while a reduced snow pack will decrease the freshwater flow of rivers. Rainfall distribution will become more extreme, with wet areas getting even more wet and dry areas more dry. We will experience long and intense drought over many of our crop-producing lands worldwide, and at the same time population increases will continue to put pressure on food supplies in another way. There will be record heat waves and devastating storms. Species after species will go extinct. Human beings and other creatures will starve on the scale of a billion. Mass migration will destabilize whole societies.

There will be great pain and suffering. The process is in motion. We cannot prevent global warming, but only mitigate it, thereby (hopefully) reducing some of the above effects.

In the face of such a reality, Johnson cited this final statistic: Only 33% of Americans believe that anthropogenic global warming is “a very serious problem.” While 58% believe it is a “serious problem,” it is typically not until we are willing to add that extra adjective “very” to the phrase that we actually become motivated to work both personally and politically for change.

Dr. Satterlee’s scholarly interests include the relationship of preaching and areas of congregational life and mission, including liturgy, spirituality, stewardship, mission and leadership.

Collecting Shoes

Kent Lutheran in Kent is collecting used shoes to recycle and help fund their community restoration project in South Sudan. They will be collecting shoes until late November.

Members are working with a for-profit organization (ReRun Shoes) which supports micro-business in West Africa. If the congregation raises a cargo container full of shoes, ReRun will pay Kent Lutheran \$12,000.

This is a win-win-win-win situation. People get jobs in West Africa repairing and re-selling shoes, people get affordable shoes in West Africa protecting them from disease and parasites, and Kent Lutheran gets the funds needed for their water project in South Sudan, and finally, shoes are diverted from the waste stream.

How many shoes do we need? **Fifteen tons of shoes.**

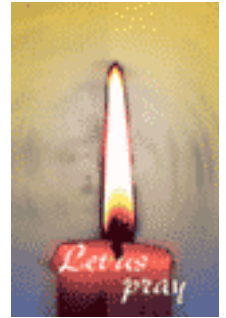
