The Resurrection Story

ASTER brings happiness to all true Christians. It speaks of victory. And what a tremendous victory it proclaims! It is the victory of life over death that it announces. The Victor is none less than Jesus, for He alone could ever have won such a victory.

God would have you, dear Christian to rejoice this Easter-tide. You have the assurance that Jesus arose, from the grave and you have received grace to believe that

blessed assurance. Now you may know, that you shall also win out even in your final combat with death. It is indeed true, that you shall die in God's appointed time the bodily death. For "it is appointed unto man once to die," and there is no exception to that rule, except for the helievers who shall live here on earth at the time of the second coming of Christ. Death shall however not harm the one who falls asleep believing in Jesus. Only the earthly tabernacle shall crumble. Our body shall be laid rest in the grave and return to dust. But the grave that seemed to be the place of defeat shall finally prove itself to be the place of the most glorious victory. For Christ arose from the grave, and now the promise is, that we also shall arise. Now the apostle can ask "O grave, where is thy victory!" Now he can exclaim: "God be praised who giveth us the victory through our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ!"

Jesus arose from the grave in the morning, when it was still dark. His resurrection turned the darkness into light. In the dark hour victory came and joy and peace was soon restored, where hearts otherwise were troubled end pinning. You may have your dark moments. Perhaps the angel of death has entered in over your threshold. Turn to the resurrected Saviour, if such be the sad experience. Review again the Easter story. Allow the Risen One to come before you, Hear Him again say: "I live, ye shall live also." Remember that He brought life and immortality into light. Hear Him again say: "I am the resur-

rection and the life. He that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live, and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." Do you find it impossible to see your Saviour with the eye of faith, since now your heart is so sad and so heavily laden? Go then to the Galilee of His word, there shall you see Him. There He has promised to reveal Himself. There He shall make the dreary heart burning, even as He did, when He spoke

Receive that tiding of eternal hope for your soul, that you may find your sorrow turned into joy. Pray God that you may rejoice in the eternal hope that the resurrected Saviour has opened up for you and for all who believe in Him. Dwell with Jesus in that resurrection story, and He shall wipe your tears away. Behold Him as your life, your salvation, your hope, your rightcousness. Pray, pray fervently that you may find in the risen Jesus the well-spring of eternal life with which you may refresh your drooping spirit. Do as the psalmist

did, ask God that He might quicken you by His word.

God has again given us a blessed Easter-tide. May it in a real spiritual way continue to be a blessed period for us all. The disciples of the Emans way ate with Jesus, as be had entered into their home. Let us invite Jesus to stay in our horses that we may eat with Him and thus have Him more plainly revealed to us. Yea, may an abundance of blessings come to us all this Easter-tide!

Day of wonder, day of gladness, Hail thy ever glorious light! Gone is sorrow, gone is sadness, Ended is the gloomy night! Listen to the angel's story.—
Cast away all fear and dread; Give to God the Father glory!


The Quarterly Payments.

Both our synod and our conference have often insisted upon, that the congregations pay their budget part to conference and synod quarterly. That rule was established long ago. The reason was that the synod and the conference both need the money in order that they might save interest and thus save money for all concerned. Both conference and synod must pay their missionaries monthly. They must meet their other expenses at the proper time.

It would be well if all congregations would observe the above rule. They can no doubt do so more generally than heretofore has been the case. The congregation should be willing to borrow, if necessary, to meet these obligations regularly. That would not mean an increased debt. It would mean the outlay of that extra interest. The congregation should be willing to take upon itself that extra expense. as that would only mean that it would take upon itself the proportionate burden that otherwise is laid upon the conference and synod. It means an awful extra expense to the general work, if a great number of congregations pool on the conference the interest caused by the tardiness of their budget payments. The items can usually be handled, if the willingness is there. How much better the congregation might feel at the end of the year, if all obligations to the conference have been met in a regular, business-like way. One quarter is now gone of this year. Let us all do our best to pay as soon as possible at least one fourth of the conference dues for this year.

Immanuel Church, Where the Conference Meets

The Immanuel congregation, Portland, is the oldest on the west coast including California. It was organized December 28, 1879 by Rev. Peter Carlson. This sturdy pioneer pastor came from East Union.

Carver County, Minnesota after having labored among the pioneers of that large Lutheran settlement for about two decades. Here another pioneer, Rev. J. W. Skaus, was pastor from 1883 till his death July 10, 1904. Rev. C. J. Renhard was the pastor of the congregation from 1904 till 1910, Rev. A. V. Anderson from 1917 till 1927. The present pastor has had charge of the

congregation since September 11, 1927.

The first church was built on 11th and Burnside streets and was dedicated April 9, 1883 by Rev. Peter Carlson assisted by Rev. J. Telleen, who was at that time pastor of the newly organized Ebenezer Lutheran Church. San Francisco, Cal. The present church on 19th and Irving streets was built 1905 and dedicated September 2, 1906 by Rev. M. L. Larson, then conference president.

The first district organization on the coast, within the Augustana Synod, was effected at a meeting in Immanuel Church. April 7, 1883. It received the name The West Coast Mission District. Its territory included all the coast as far as San Francisco. The Columbia Conference was organized in Immanuel Church March 4, 1893.

Fortland District Mission Meeting and Installation of Pastor

Mission meeting of the Portland district was held in the Elim church at Brush Prairie, Washington, and Saron church, Gresham, Oregon, on Tuesday and Wednesday, March 24-25, 1931. The meeting opened on Tuesday morning at Brush Prairie with regular service in Swedish. Rev. Samuel E. Johnson preached the sermon on the topic, "Father, Forgive Them. For They Know Not What They Do.' In the afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock. services were held when Rev. A. G. Anderson was duly installed as pastor of the church. Rev. H. P. Johnson, vice president of the conference, delivered the sermon, taking as his subject, "The Pastor and His Message." The installation followed when Rev. G. K. Andeen, president of the Conference, officiated, assisted by the pastors present. Rev. G. K. Andeen then preached on the Second Word from the cross, "Verily, I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with Me in Paradise." The meeting came to a close in the evening when Rev. E. J. Simultaneously with the closing meeting at Brush Prairie, the meeting opened at Gresham with a service under the auspices of the Luther League. Rev. G. K. Andeen spoke on the subject, "Life's High Calling." On Wednesday morning the meeting continued at Gresham with a Swedish service when Rev. E. J. Sakrison preached on the last Word from the cross, "Father, Into Thy Hands I Commend My Spirit." In the afternoon the Woman's Missionary Society had charge of the program, when the local president, Mrs. A. G. Anderson, led the meeting. Mrs. H. P. Johnson, president of the district, gave a short talk, and Rev. H. P. Johnson gave the address on the subject. Thy Kingdom Is An Everlasting Kingdom," Ps. 145:13. "How Shall Our Luther League Best Serve the Young People and the Church?"

(Paper read at the Portland District Luther league Rally at Immanuel Church, Portland, March 15, 1931, by Miss Edith Olson, Immanuel.)

Our young people of today are the pillars of our church tomorrow. We must keep them today if we are to have use of them on the morrow.

Throughout our Lutheran Churches is in organization ealled Luther League which is composed of confirmed young people of our individual churches. problem confronting our various congregations is how shall we keep the conairmands within our leagues? Each year a new class is confirmed, some are large and some are small. What percentage of the classes become active members of your !cague? Our answers should be 100 per cent, but sad to say in many instances they are not even fifty per cent. Then the question arises, is there something wrong with our form of meetings? there anything miss? The one who could answer you best would be the young man or young lady who has dropped out. They should be abic to tell you the reason. But in very few cases do we get any answer at all. If the young people get away from you today they soon find new companionship, more modern entertainment, and then it is harder to win them back again tomorrow.

Each league has the above mentioned problems before them, and all are striving to overcome them. As new members come to league meetings, make them welcome, see that they become acquainted. Let no one go home slighted in any way

whatsoever. Have programs and entertainments that will interest them and that are different. Keep your league active. Have something doing all the time, so that there is always something to look forward to.

One meeting a month should be devoted to some form of Bible study. Let all members take turns in discussing different phases or topics of the Bible. Meetings of this kind can be very interesting if the members learn they must do their part. Don't leave all the discussion to the minister. He also can learn from each one's discussion. For the other meetings have diversified programs. Give all members an opportunity during the year to take charge of one meeting's entertainment. As new members begin attending. put them on committees, give them responsibilities. Then they will realize they are partly responsible for the success of your league.

Our friendships in our leagues and in our district meetings are some of the best we will ever have. For where could one find a better place for friends than in our own leagues? They furnish the kind of friendship you will carry with you always.

Joint meetings during the year with other leagues or groups of young people help a great deal in making meetings more interesting, for there is always some one new to know. The ideas of others will help us a lot.

If our league serves the young people in such a way as to bring them closer together, creating a fine bond of friendship on a higher level, then it has best served its church and the Master.

The following poem seems to fit in as what our Luther League friendships and standards should mean to each one of us. It is entitled "That's What I Call a Friend."

One whose handclasp is a little tighter.
One whose smile is a little brighter.
One whose deeds are a little whiter,
That's what I call a friend.

One who'll lend as quick as he'll borrow, One who's the same today as tomorrow, One who will share your joy and sorrow. That's what I call a friend.

How Our Bible Institute Helps to Bring Our Young People Closer to Christ

(Paper read at Portland District Luther League Rally at Immanuel Church, Portland, March 15, 1921, by Miss Guhli Olson, Augustana.)

Our Bible Institute was organized about four years ago by the Portland District Luther leagues. The meetings are held once a year for one week at Colton, Oregon, in the Canyon Creek Cathedral and in the Forest Chapel. There are three sessions in the morning, which are a devotional hour, a Bible study hour, and a lecture. In the afternoon there is recreation and in the evening a lecture, and sometimes a bonfire.

The purpose of our Bible Institute is to implant, teach and make steadfast the true teaching of the Bible especially among the young people. You know our young minds and hearts are very plastic and open for impressions; therefore it is very. very necessary that we receive the true instruction. In this age so many want to discard the Bible as the word of God. which always should be used as the foundation for the teachings of the Church. I want to read to you a few passages proving that the Bible is the true word of God. It says in the 2nd Epistle of Peter 1:20-21, "Knowing this first, that no prophecy of the scriptures is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old times by the will of man, but Holy Men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." 2nd Timothy 3: 16, "All scriptures is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." John 20:31, "But these are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name." These passages. I believe, prove that the Bible is the true Word of God

Our Bible Institute has laid out a systematic Bible study. In John 5:39 Jesus said, "Search the Scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life, and they are they which testify of me." Pro. 1:17 "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of

wisdom, but fools despise wisdom and instruction." Pro. 2:1-6, "My son, if thou will receive My word, and hide My commandments with thee; so that thou incline thine year unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding; if thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hidden treasure; then shalt thou understand the rear of the Lord, and find the knowledge of God." For the Lord giveth wisdom; out of His mouth cometh knowledge and understanding." Jesus Christ said, "Search the Scriptures," Solomon said, "Seek and search as ye would for silver and hidden treasures." Now our Bible Institute supplies us with teachers who have for many years searched and studied the Scriptures, and who are willing to let us have the benefits of their knowledge. They also help to teach us how to search the scriptures.

One of the purposes of the Bible Institute is to strengthen our spiritual life. We read in Isaia 40:31, "But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles, they shall run and not be weary, and they shall walk and faint not." Many people say that they see God in nature. They see His greatness in the things that He made, but they can never strengthen their spiritual life by nature. However, out in Colton we can see the beauty of God's handiwork and by our Bible hour sermons, etc., we can strengthen our spiritual life.

The Bible Institute is also to help us to consecrate our lives more fully to the Lord's service. We read in Titus 2:11, "For the Grace of God that bringeth salvation, hath appeared to men, teaching ns that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and Godly in this present world, looking forward to that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Savieur, Jesus Christ." John 14:22, "Jndas (not Iscariot) said unto Him, 'Lord, how is it that Thou wilt manifest thyself unto us and not unto the world? Jesus answered and said unto him: 'If a man love Me, he will keep My word: and My Father will love him and We will come unto him and make our abode with him." John 14:17, "Even the Spirit of Truth whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth Him not, neither knoweth Him; but ye know Him, for he dwelleth with you and shall be in you." 1st Epistle of John 4:2, "Heraby know ye the Spirit of God. Every spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christ is come in the flosh is of God." At the Bible Institute we have a chance in the quiet and beautiful outdoors to meditate and receive many wonderful blessings from above that help us to consecrate our lives to God.

Still another purpose of our Bible Institute is to give wholesome recreation in God's beautiful nature. We all know that we need recreation. I assure you that you will find it out at Colton. The trees on our land are so straight and tail that they seem to point right to Heaven and God who made them. The trees, I think, show us that our lives should be always pointing to God. The people you meet at Colton are like friends you have known for years. In fact, when we are there we feel as if we were of one big family. The good ladies spoil us with their delicious meals. I have never tasted as good gingerbread as I had in Colton. You can get your meals for a very reasonable price. However, if you are camping you have the privilege of doing your own

Now, I shall say a few words about the benefits we receive from the Bible Institute. Friends, after studying the Scriptures, listening to lectures and sermons, one cannot help but feel the real power and nearness of the Spirit of Jesus Christ as it says in Rom. 8:16, "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God."

The Bible Institute strengthens our faith. Faith is very necessary in our Christian life. In Heb, 11:6 it is written. But he that denieth Me before men shall be denied before the angels of God." You, friends, and I are here in this world to bear witness and to testify for Christ. Let us do it in a way that is pleasing in the sight of God. In Math. 7:20-21 we read, "Wherefore by their fruit ye shall know them. Not everyone that saith unto Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter into the kingdom of Heaven, but he that doeth the will of My Father which is in Heaven."

The Bible Institute broadens our vision or spiritual things. Sometimes we get into a rut; we are likely to become narrow-minded and self-centered. It really is a privilege to exchange thoughts and experiences with other people.

In conclusion, I will read from Cor. 2: 10, "But as it is written eye hath not seen nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God has prepared for them that love Him." Friends, it is well worth while to follow and love Christ, and our Bible Institute is teaching and showing us how to attain that end. I trust and hope that as many of us as can possibly come out to the Bible Institute in Colton this summer will come. I am sure we will all profit by doing so.
