## The Conference Meeting

It should prove profitable for a community to have the conference meeting held in its midst. We acquaint ourselves with the work and its problems, as we attend these meetings. And inspiration comes to us in an added measure, if we come to the services and other devotional mectings in the right spirit. We hope that many from Portand and the ontlying districts will attend the sessions and the serrices and derotional mectinge of our conicrence convention. It is an opportunity which may not come to us again in this district for many years. A hearty welcome to our convention!

## The Quarterly Payments

Both our syruod and our conference have often insisted upon, that the congregations pay their budget part to conference and synod quarterly. That rule was established long ago. The reason was that the synod and the conference both need the money in order that they might save interest and thus save money for all concerned. Both conference and synod must pay their missionaries month15. They must meet thefr other expenses at the proper time.

It would be well if all congregations would observe the above rule. They can no doubt do so more generally than heretofore has been the case. The congregation should be willing to borrow, if necessary, to meet hese obligations regularly. That would not mean an increased debt It wouk mean the oullay of that extra interest. The cungregation should be willing to take upos itself that extra expense. as that would only mean that it woukd take upon itself the proportionate burden that otherwise is laid upon the conference and stome. It means an awful extra cepense to the geateral work, if a great mumber al congregations prol on the conterence the interes eatused by the tardiness of their bulgee payments. The items can usually be hatn fled, if the willingness is there. How mach beller the congregation might feel at the end of the year, if all whigations to the conference have been met in a regular, business-like way. One quarter is now gone of this year. Let us all do our best to pay as soon as possible at least one fonth of the conference dues for this year.

## Immanuel Church, Where the Conference Meets

The fmmanuel congregation. Portland. is the oldest on the west coast including California. It was organized December 28, 1879 by Kev. Peter Carlson. This sturdy pioncer pastor came from East Union.

Carver County, Minnesota after having labored among the pioneers of that large Lutheran settlement for about two decades. Here another pioneer, Rev J. W. Skans, was pastor from 1883 till his death July 10, 1904. Rev. C. J. Renhard was the pastor of the congregation from 1904 till 1910, Rev. A. V. Anderson from 1917 till 1927. The present pastor has had charge of the

congregation since September 11, 1927.
The first church was built on 11 th and Burnside streets and was dedicated April 9, 1883 by Rev. Peter Carlson assisted by Rev. J. Telleen, who was at that time pastor of the newly organized ebenczer Lutheran Churei. San Francisco. Cal. The present church on 19 th and Irving streets was built 1905 and dedicated September 2 , 1906 by Ree. M. L. Larson, then conferpace president.

The first district organization on the coast, within the Augustana Synod. was effected at a meeting in Immanmel Church. April 7. 1883. It received the name The West Coast Mission Jistrict. Its territory included all the coast as far as San Francisco. The Columbia Conference was organized in Immanuel Chureh March 4, 1893.

## "How Shall Our Luther League Best Sarve the Young People and the Church?"'

(Paper read at the Portland District Luther leagne Rally at Immanuel (hureh. Portland, Mare! 15. 1931, by Miss Pedith ()son, Lmmanuel.)

Our voung people of today are the piltars of our church tomorrow. We must leep them today if we are to have use of them on the morrow.

Throughout our Lutheran Churches is : $n$ organization called Lather Leagnc which is composed of confirmed young ieople of our individual churches. The problem confronting our various congresations: is how shall we keep the conirmands within our leagues? Each year a new clase is confirmed, some are large and some are small. What pereentage of the classes become active members of your !cague: Our answers should be 100 per rent, but sad to say in many instances they are not even fifty per cent. Then the fucstion arises, is there something wrong with our form of mectings? Is there angthing minss? The one who could answer you best would be the young man or goung lady who has dropped ont. They should be abie so tell you the reason. But in rery fow cases th we get any answer at all. If the young people get away from You wdidy they soon find new companionship. more modern entertanment, and then it is harder to win them hack again tomorrow.

Each league has the above mentionerl problems lefore them, and all are stris ing to overome them. As new members come to league meeting:, make them welcome, see that they become acouainted. liet no one go home slighted in any was
whatsocver. Have programs and entertainments that will interest them and that are different. Keep your league active. Have something doing all the time, so that there is always something to look forward ti.
One meeting a month should be deroted to some form of Bible stuly. Let all members take furns in discussing different phases or topics of the Bible. Meetings of this kind can be very interesting if the members learn they must do their part. Don't leave all the discussion to the minister. He also can learn from each one's discussion. For the other mectings have diversified programs. Give all members an opportunity during the year to take charge of one meeting's entertainment. As new members begin attending. put them on committees, give them responsibilitics. Then they will realize they are partly responsible for the success of your league.

Our friendships in our leagues and in our district meetings are some of the best we will ever have. For where could one find a better place for friends than in our own leagues? They furnish the kind of friendship you will cary with you always.

Joint meetings during the year with other leagues or groups of young people help a great deal in making meetings more interesting, for there is always some one new to know. The ideas of others will help us a lot.

If our league serves the young people in such a way as to bring them cluser together, creating a fine bond of frientlship on a higher level. then it has best sorved its church and the Master.

## How Our Bible Institute Helps to Bring Our Young People Closer to Christ

(P'aper read it Portland District Luther I.eague Rally at Immanuel Church, Portland. Mareh 15. 19? 1, by Miss Guhli Olson. Augustana.)
()ur Bible Inslitute was organized about Gour years ago by the Portland District Luther leagues. The meetings are held once a year for one week at Colton. Oregon, in the Canyon Creek Cathedral and in the Forest Chapel. There are three sessions in the morning, which are a derotional hour. a Pible study hour, and a lecture In the afternoon there is recreation and in the evening a lecture and sometimes a bonfire.

The purpose of our Bible Institute is to implant, teach and make steadfast the true teaching of the Bible especially among the young people. You know our young minds and hearts are very plastic and open for impressions; therefore it is very. very necessary that we receive the true instruction. In this age so many want to discard the Bible as the word of God. which always shonld be used as the foumdation for the teachings of the Church. I want to reall to you a few passages proving that the bible is the true word of God. It says in the 2nd Epistle of Peter 1:20-21. "Knowing this first, that no prof:hecy of the seriptures is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old times by the will of man. but Holy Men of God spake as they were mosed by the Holy Ghost." 2nd Timothy 3: 16. "All scriptures is given by inpiration of God and is profitable for doctrine. for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." John 20:31. "But these are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name." These passages. I believe. prove that the Bible is the true Worl of God.

Our Bible Institute has laid out a systematic Bible study. In John $5: 39$ Jesus saicl. "Search the Scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life. and they are they which testify of me." Pro. 1:17 "The lear of the Lord is the beginning of
wisdom, but fonls despise wistom and instruction." Jro. 2:1-6, "My son, ii thou will receive My word, and hide My commandments with thee; so that thon incline thine year unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding; if thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hidden treasure; then shalt thou understand the sear of the Lord, and find the knowledge of God." For the Lord giveth wisfom; out of His mouth cometh kuowledge and understanding." Jesus Christ said, "Search the Scriptures." Solomon said. "Seek and search as ye would for silver and hidden treasures." Now our Bible Institute supplies us with teachers who have for many years searched and studied the Scriptures, and who are willing to let us have the benefits of their knowledge. They also help to teach us: how to search the seriptures.

One of the parposes of the Bible Tustitute is to strengthen our spiritual life. We read in Isaia $10: 31$. Now, I shall say a few words about the bencite we reaive from the Bible Institute.
