
Dr. Ott teaches at Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, Ohio, where she also serves as Director of Supervised Clinical Ministry. She is a 12 year veteran of crisis work in congregations and the proactive ministry of systems analysis in businesses, schools, and judicatory and church organizations. A Clinical Fellow in the American Association of Pastoral Counselors, she is beginning a fifth year of study at the Bowen Center for the Study of the Family.

Let us then pursue what makes for peace and for mutual upbuilding.

Romans 14:19 NRSV

We live in that wonderful time where communication opportunities abound and people are feeling more isolated and cut off from each other. One of the regular comments I hear is that we do not know what the larger church is doing. Why didn't someone tell us about (fill in the blank). I know that I have difficulty keeping up with the multitude of emails, text messages and other forms of communication.

In the midst of all of this I want to let you know of a new communication tool for us living in the territory of Region 1. The site,

www.soulcafe.org, is a new tool for the members, congregations and synods of Region 1 to share in a wide variety of ways. Congregations can establish a group for public sharing of information. Congregation Councils can have public groups for their work. Worship Committee leaders could form a group of other leaders to share ideas with worship leaders in with others across the synod or region. The possibilities are countless. The fact is that it will be the members of our congregations who will define how this tool will benefit the church.

Bishop David Brauer-Rieke and the Oregon Synod are the idea and process facilitators for this project. The Northwest Washington Synod is a participant in the establishment of this idea. All congregations, agencies and institutions of this synod and their members are welcome to participate in Soulcafé.

I will be quick to confess that I am a technological dinosaur when it comes to the full potential for this tool. I barely understand Facebook. This is not a churchly *continued on page 3* 

Facebook. It is more than that. It is however a public space. This is not the tool to share confidential or sensitive information. It is a way of building the church by sharing our ideas, passions and questions. It is a place for mutual upbuilding.

For this to work we need our members to sign up and be involved. The first step is to establish an account on Soulcafé. I want to encourage you to check this out. Setting up an account is relatively easy. I have even found that establishing a group is a painless process. As the idea began in the Oregon Synod, the early participants are largely from that synod. I encourage you to check out this website and imagine how it might assist you and your congregation in the many things you are asked to do. As with all new tools there will be issues to resolve as we get this up and running. Until we start using it, we do not know all that it will do. I invite your participation in www.soulcafe.org.

# Boundaries Training Opportunity

The ELCA requires that all rostered leaders attend Boundaries Training at least once, early during their period of rostered service.

Boundaries Training provides clear information on sexual misconduct prevention for people in positions of power, which

includes pastors and lay leaders, and everyone who works with children and other vulnerable people. The training helps us understand how to keep ourselves healthy, to ensure that our personal needs are met without coercive participation by those we serve.

The next training session in our area is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 20, at Faith Lutheran in Seattle.

Barbara Keller will be the presenter; she is a consultant to the ELCA on sexual misconduct issues and presents a clear program for misconduct prevention. The cost for the seminar is \$20 and includes lunch and morning refreshments. Rostered leaders, church staff and volunteers are welcome at these training sessions.

## Horn of Africa

More than 500,000 people have left their homes because of the drought in the Horn of Africa. Many are receiving life-saving water and food at Lutheran-managed camps. The Lutheran

# Ethiopian Chicken Hatchery Update

by Ken Halvorson, Chair, Synod Global Mission Committee The Northwest Washington Synod has raised \$45,157.94 towards the Ethiopian Chicken Hatchery project through the generosity of individuals, Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible Schools and congregations. Creativity has been in abundance as people have backed the project. Our goal is to send \$35,440 this year, \$14,400 next year and \$12,000 in 2013.

In two to three years, we expect the Ethiopian Chicken Hatchery to begin paying

for itself and start producing income. When this happens, we will reduce our contributions except to buy additional equipment as needed. Our long-range goal, and theirs, is to make this project stand on its own and be productive in protein, jobs, community and money for Ethiopian Church leadership training.

Last spring five of us went to Ethiopia to check on the development of the hatchery. It seemed that God arranged this team because each person brought different skills and perspectives. One is a retired lawyer who was invaluable in the business end of discussions. Another is a builder who was impressed with the basic serviceability of the future hatchery buildings. The third person had excellent skills at relating and visiting with people. Each team member came home convinced that this is a worthwhile project.

We had very good discussions with the Mekane Yesus Church leaders and others. The government approved this project due to great need, but also wanted assurance that it was a viable and well funded program. The government wanted the project to be larger to raise more chickens because of the great need. The Ethiopian Church stood their ground saying they would start small and grow into a larger hatchery.

Upon our return to Washington, at our team's

recommendation, the Synod Council Executive conti Committee and Bishop Boerger approved a letter of intent to support the chicken hatchery. The letter of intent stated that our Synod will provide \$102,000 (including money already raised) for six years as the hatchery develops. With this assurance the government gave its approval for the Mekane Yesus church to use the land and buildings at Haik for development of the chicken hatchery.

The Ethiopian Church is now hiring a manager, choosing equipment and supplies, and modifying the buildings on the hatchery site.

## Seeing God Clearly

Pastor Matt Maas and seminary student Caitlyn Melillo led six high school youth (including myself) from Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Lynnwood on a summer mission trip to Los Angeles, Calif., leaving on June 28.

Our mission was to do an urban immersion study with a group called New City Parish (NCP), a group of nine ELCA congregations that focus on transforming urban communities through ministry and social outreach. We arrived at our church location that evening and were welcomed with open arms. There we learned what we would be doing in the coming days. We also met Pastor Brian Eklund who is one of the founders of NCP. He accompanied us throughout our mission and taught us all about the urban Los Angeles (L.A.) community. Without him our mission would not have been a success.

Early the next morning we drove through downtown L.A. and visited a place called Homeboy Industries. Homeboy, founded by Father Greg Boyle, is a place where former gang members can be employed with jobs in a safe environment. Hearing individual stories of people who have been able to get back on their feet after having been in a gang and experienced consequences from gang violence was astounding. It would have been impossible for most of them to turn their lives around without the support of Homeboy Industries.

The congregation met Christopher while he was studying at TLC and they have helped him with a couple projects in his home village. Currently he is a lay pastor and is the driving force behind a clinic and the school.

Lord of Life has matched the four Kenyan students with four Sunday School classes. The hope is that the children at Lord of Life will make a connection to the children in Kodera.

The Sunday School students send letters from time to time. Lord of Life also highlighted these four children at this summer's VBS. As a mission project the children at VBS colored cinch bags and then filled them with crayons, socks, a ruler, scissors and pencils. About 100 bags will be shipped to Pine Lake Academy.

### Hearing The Cries Faith and Criminal Justice

The Faith and Criminal Task Force of the ELCA is in the process of developing a social statement on the wide-range and complex issues associated with criminal justice. The study is called *Hearing the Cries: Faith and Criminal Justice*. The task force needs to have input from groups and individuals as they gather information for a social statement. Responses are due by October 15. Information can be found at www.elca.org/criminaljustice.

Homelessness is a serious and growing problem in King County. While there are shelters that house men, and shelters for women, there are currently few shelters for women with children. Since January, record numbers of homeless women with children have been seeking temporary shelter — only to find that there is none. Every night in our community, these women and their children find refuge where they can —in a car (for the "lucky" ones who have a car), on a bus, at the airport, or under a bridge.

As part of our ministry, Queen Anne Lutheran Church created *HomeBase* (www.queenannelutheran.org/ homebase), an outreach program that provides temporary shelter and meals to homeless women and their children. Our partner in this effort is *Mary's Place* (www.marysplace. org) the only weekday drop-in day program for homeless women and formerly homeless women and their children in King County. For two weeks several times a year, Queen Anne Lutheran Church will host up to 14 homeless women and their children in thei building overnight.

With the congregation's newly remodeled kitchen and Fellowship Hall, Queen Anne was able to host their first families during the first two weeks in August.

### Here 'n There

Our Redeemer's in Seattle held a celebration on June 26. They celebrated the end of their mortgage by throwing shredded copies of the mortgage in the air like confetti.

The August service project for members of St. Luke's in Bellevue is packing school supplies for *Congregations* for Kids (www.congregations4kids.org). In 2010, in its 15th year, 38 congregations and organizations in Bellevue supplied 1,450 backpacks with school supplies and an additional 300 sets of school supplies. These supplies helped a total of 1,750 students in 28 different schools in Bellevue.

Trinity in Lynnwood participated in the Back to School Fair, organized by the Family Center of Lutheran Community Services and other community partners. Trinity agreed to stuff 100 backpacks and stuff with the needed supplies. The Back to School Fair provides 1,000 needy students in the Edmonds School District with a backpack and school supplies.
