#### Haiti Still In Crisis

Haiti is still in crisis. According to a July 30 situation report from the ELCA, the Caribbean nation of Haiti has yet to move into the recovery phase, following the Jan. 12 earthquake that left 1.5 million people displaced from their homes.

More than 190,500 households are still living in camps, said Megan Bradfield, associate director for International Disaster Response, ELCA Global Mission. Bradfield, who prepared the report, said many of these camps are "highly vulnerable to storms and flooding." An estimated 250,000 people died as a result of the earthquake.

In response to some of Haiti's critical needs, "the ELCA has supported a multinational, multilateral response to the earthquake that includes the coordination of relief and development agencies through the Action by Churches Together (ACT) Alliance," said Bradfield.

The ELCA has been a member of the ACT Alliance since 1995.

To date members of the ELCA have contributed more than \$12.2 million in gifts to support disaster relief efforts in Haiti.

Editor's Note: More than 4 million people have been displaced by the recent flooding in Pakistan. The ELCA is supporting a planned response by Church World Services (CWS) and has has committed \$100,000. ## A Word From The Acting Bishop

"For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters, only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love be servants of one another. For the whole law is fulfilled in one word, 'you shall love your neighbor as yourself."

A couple of months ago, my husband and I became "bee owners." I read yesterday that you are not a "bee keeper" until you can find the queen among the thousands of bees in the hive. This afternoon, we became bee keepers.

Getting bees was not my idea but I must say, it has become a fascinating hobby. I have read more about bees in the last two months than I ever thought of reading

before. There's a lot to learn about bees, certainly, but there's a lot more to learn from them. I've started to compile a list of lessons to be learned from bees. Here's the start of my list, but I keep learning.

Lesson 1: There can be only one queen in a hive. All the bees take care of the one queen and will get rid of any other queens that may hatch or enter the hive. Jesus gave the same lesson in Matthew 6:24.

Lesson 2: Bees have different jobs to do at different times in their lives. When they first hatch, they aren't strong enough yet to fly, so they take care of the household chores. When they are able to fly, they relentlessly fly out for pollen and nectar. Perhaps the bees are simply demonstrating the words of 1Corinthians 12.

Lesson 3: If you are selecting hives to merge, select for the possibility of the strongest hive. Never merge two weak hives as the outcome will be one larger weak hive. Paul spoke similarly in 2 Corinthians 6 when he spoke about partnering for a stronger, more vibrant faith. Lesson 4: A little known fact about bees is that even the worker bees that seem to be flying in and out, carrying nectar and pollen all day long, actually take time to rest and hang out in the honey storage areas for a while so they can rest and take some nourishment.

## A Word From The Acting Bishop

Deuteronomy 5:13 is about Sabbath rest, a discipline, yes, but patterned into nature from the very beginning.

Lesson 5: Every worker bee must forage in the later part of her life. No bee can stay in the hive the whole time. In that sense all bees are sent out. Ah yes, just as Matthew 28 says, "GO, and make disciples…" don't wait for others to come to you.

Well, it's just the beginning of my "sermon illustrations," Every time I watch the hive work as a single organism, each bee working for the good of the hive, cooperating and not competing, I think about the church and Christ's intention for us. May we live out that unity as well as the bees.
