Duwamish River Ecojustice Boat Tour

For decades Seattle's only waterway, the Duwamish River, has suffered a slow oil spill from polluted run-off and toxic chemical dumping. In 2001, the Environmental Protection Agency listed the Lower Duwamish River as a federal Superfund site, naming it as one of the most contaminated sites in the U.S. People who live near the Duwamish, predominately communities of color, are at risk from a toxic stew of chemicals which also endangers salmon, shellfish, eagles, seals and orcas.

Earth Ministry, St. James Cathedral, St. Mark's Episcopal Cathedral, Seattle First Baptist Church and Plymouth UCC have joined together to organize a boat tour of the lower Duwamish River narrated by staff of the Duwamish River Cleanup coalition.

On this short trip, our faith communities will join in prayer, learn about the contaminated ecosystems of the waterway, and be updated about advocacy opportunities to protect the only river in the City of Seattle.

Please join Earth Ministry and our downtown religious partners for a faith-based cruise on the Lower Duwamish River from noon to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 14. Check-in will be at 11:30.

A Word From The Acting Bishop

"Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise."

Deuteronomy 6: 4-7 NRSV

As I have visited the congregations in our synod over the past nine years, I have discovered a crisis in our churches. No, it has nothing to do with resolutions of the 2009 churchwide assembly. And it doesn't have to do with the economy, either, at least not directly. The crisis in our synod is in youth ministry.

It really caught my attention in this past month as I witnessed the resignations and lay-offs of four more Youth Ministers. Some were moving on to other things partly because of low pay and

lack of support for their work, some were "terminated" because of budget cuts. When congregations identify youth ministry as a priority in their self understanding but make it the lowest priority in the budget, there is an inconsistency. Maybe you have observed that inconsistency.

If your church has a healthy, effective ministry to families, children and youth, you have some things to teach the rest of us. You are "bucking a trend" in mainline congregations which have experienced a decline in youth attendance, and concomitantly, in youth ministry.

Even as early as 1996 George Barna, in his *Index of Leading Spiritual Indicators*, recorded what congregational members believe are the things they do best and worst. "Creating programs for teenagers" was listed as the worst. This is a problem. I believe it is a crisis.

Some might like to lay this all at the feet of youth

ministers, but I believe it belongs to all of us.

Youth ministers are seldom in a position to set the congregation's policy for youth ministry and usually work with various images of what the congregation member expects. Part of the crisis in youth ministry is the expectation that youth ministers can "handle youth ministry." But youth ministry is a task, a calling for all of us.

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A Word From The Acting Bishop

A synod wide vision for youth ministry is a place to start. What that requires is that all people who care about the future of the church, the faith of our young people and life in the northwest come together to describe a vision, chart a course and commit to make the priority of youth ministry more than a wistful longing or an immobilizing challenge.

So a *Youth Ministry Summit* will be held at Holy Spirit in Kirkland from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 20, with lunch served. Registration information will be sent to your congregation inviting pastors and other *decision makers* and vision bearers to participate. Watch for it and be there!

Affordable Apartments In Ballard

The Compass Housing Alliance is building 80 affordable apartments in Ballard and will name the facility after the late pastor Nyer Urness. The project is a seven-story, 51,664 square foot, mixed-use building with a green roof. The majority of the first two floors will be dedicated to human service uses. These areas

include offices for social workers, addiction counselors, mental health professionals, healthcare providers and employment specialists who will primarily, but not exclusively, serve the building residents. It will be staffed 24-hours a day, with secured access. There are also meeting rooms for support group sessions. Each studio apartment will have a full bathroom and galley kitchen.

Pastor Nyer served as chaplain of the Compass Center from 1989 to 2006. His ministry was at the heart of the Compass community. It is in memory of his gracious spirit that the project is named. The Nyer Urness House will be located at 1753 NW 56th St. in the Ballard community of Seattle. Construction will begin in late 2010. For more information visit www.compasshousingalliance.org.

Interim Anxiety

by Barbara Sharkey Member of Faith Lutheran in Seattle In January, 2009, when Pastor Nancy Winder pulled into my driveway, I had been pacing the sidewalk for ten minutes. In the previous 29 years she had made many pastoral visits, but she'd never just called up and asked if she could drop by. I was convinced she was coming to deliver some bad news in person.

So, I was greatly relieved when she revealed

the purpose of her visit. She had accepted a one-year assignment as the pastor at Holden Village, a place where her ministry had begun. This assignment, which began in the fall of 2009, provided an ideal way for her to ease out of her long relationship with the members of Faith in Seattle and it would force us to wallow along on our own as she would be safely beyond calling distance.

I was so relieved that no one had died, and that she wasn't forced to leave because of personal illness, but my relief lasted about two minutes. Along with many of my church friends, I had looked forward to Pastor Winder not only officiating at my children's weddings but also baptizing the next generation, the babies of the first children she had baptized at Faith almost 30 years ago.

During the next few weeks, a bigger problem became apparent. I was the chair of the parish education committee as well as the coordinator for the elementary program. My committee and I had spent years with Pastor Winder fine-tuning our Sunday School program. What would happen now that she was going? What if the interim or the new pastor came in with all new ideas? I was dreading the transition and call process, as any instability in the congregation would have a huge effect on families. Like the Israelites in the desert, I muttered and complained about the upcoming disruption for most of the spring.

Then one Sunday I walked past the church office and saw several council members talking with Pastor Red Burchfield, and I realized that perhaps he might be our interim. My worries instantly disappeared. Pastor Burchfield and I had become acquainted a few years early when he was subbing for Pastor Winder on our St. Francis Pet Blessing Day. Pastor Burchfield unflappably and without rehearsal blessed fish, hamsters, cats, dogs, a snake and, I'm pretty sure, a chicken that showed up that year, too.

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Interim Anxiety

Worshipping with Pastor Burchfield and working with him on parish education this past year, I have found him to be sincere, encouraging and uplifting. Most importantly, he encouraged us to take time to mourn the loss of Pastor Winder, while giving us permission to do things in a new way, to create different traditions and to take this opportunity of "change-thrust-upon-us" to discover new directions, while still holding the past close in our hearts and without feeling disloyal.

Change is difficult. In the ELCA, many pastors are nearing retirement age. On paper, the interim process can look bulky, slow and intimidating. People like me want to just get on with it and call someone, anyone, who can pick up the reins and keep our carriage rolling along the same way it has been in the past.

But an interim pastor can give a congregation a much needed excuse to pause for just a moment and to think. Just think. Is everything as swell as we think it is? Are our programs the way we want, or are they that way because of the strengths and weaknesses of the people who have run them for years? Are there people who have wanted to change positions? The interim process provides a chance for all the cards to come out on the table and for new ideas to begin to take shape. The opportunity to stretch and grow, when supported by a compassionate and accomplished interim pastor, can be a wonderful parting gift.

And if you are lucky enough to get an interim who is willing to bless a chicken on the spur of the moment, you're off to a very good start indeed. Thank you Pastor Red Burchfield.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has issued a new rule that may affect use of some wireless microphones by congregations. The rule bans the use of wireless microphones or similar devices that operate in the 700 MHz Band effective June 12, to avoid interference with fire and police departments now using the band.

New FCC Rules Wireless Microphones

Wireless microphones and similar devices that operate in the 700MHz Band must be tuned to another frequency or replaced. Wireless microphones or similar devices that operate outside the 700MHz Band are not affected, nor are microphones and similar devices with cords. Wireless microphones are normally marked with the frequency the devices use. Violations of the rule may result in fines, confiscation of the equipment, or criminal sanctions, including imprisonment. In 1934 he was ordained at North Prairie Church in Parshall, N.D. and married Martha Marie Jordahl in July 1936. He served Bethlehem Lutheran in Morris, Ill, from 1944 to 1955. He accepted a call to Denny Park in Seattle and served there from 1955 to 1974. During retirement, Stoa began a new career as a chaplain to seafarers coming to the Port of Seattle and he did this for the next 19 years. His wife, Martha, passed away in 2000. In his 90th year, Stoa published a book called *My 90-Year Odyssey*. He is survived by three children (Martha, Eunice and Philip), many grandchildren and great grandchildren.
