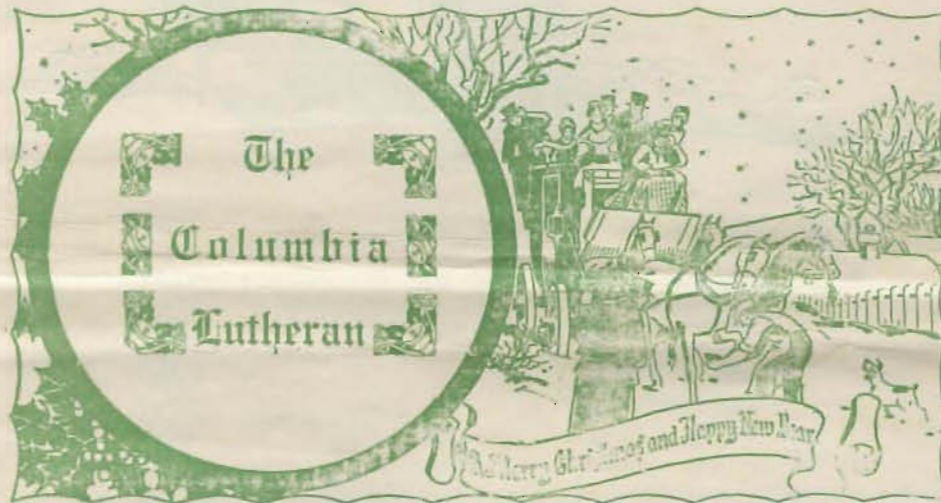

Sorrow has entered into the little community of Elgarose, near Roseburg, Ore. Mrs. Emil Sandquist, one of the leading women of the community, passed away recently after several years of ill health. Rev. J. A. Eldlund of Marshfield officiated at the funeral, which was held in Roseburg. Mrs. Sandquist is mourned by husband, Emil Sandquist, Walter and Harrie at home, and a married daughter in Portland.

Automobile accidents have marred the happiness of Bethel, Seattle, the last two weeks. FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

For the Columbia Lutheran

The Trinity Lutheran Congregation at Marchfield, Oregon, celebrated its 50th anniversary Nov. 18.

The congregation was organized by the Augustana Synod's field Secretary, Rev. Peter Carlson, Sept. 7th and 8th, 1884, with 44 communicant members.

The following year the first permanent pastor, C. M. Ryden, came but staid less than two years.

Since then the following pastors have served the congregation: A. A. Svärd, Dr. C. M. Esbjörn, B. F. Bengtson, J. Richard Olson, Dr. Jno. E. Oslund, J. V. Benson, Andrew G. Anderson and the present pastor, J. A. Eldlund. Four of these pastors remained only one year each. We wonder if any thing like that has happened in any other congregation within the Synod.

Sunday morning, Nov. 18, the pastor read an historical address, covering the struggles of the church these 50 years. In the evening we held a so called "Confirmand Reunion."

This celebration was a very happy event and will long be remembered by those present, and they were not a few, but the severe rainstorm kept many away. A few months after the Congregation was organized the church was built and is still standing and in good condition: the only church building in use within the Conference and built under the supervision of that sainted pioneer pastor on the Pacific coast, Rev. Peter Carlson.

Sunday evening, Dec. 11th, there will be memorial services. "Blessed are the dead, who die in the Lord."

The following message was sent to all who had been confirmed within the congregation and whose addresses we could find, for many of these are scattered in many parts of the land and the result was most gratifying.

AN INTERESTING BOOK

"In the Cloudy and Dark Day" is the title of a new book just off the press at the Augustana Book Concern, Rock Island, Ill. The author of the book is Dr. G. H. Knight, well known for his first book, "In the Secret of His Presence." Dr. Knight was born at Bernishshire, Scotland, one hundred years ago. He was ordained into the ministry in 1863. In 1896 he retired on account of ill health. He died in 1917.

Two years ago the Book Concern received the permission to reprint his book, "In the Secret of His Presence," and the demand for the book was so great that it was printed in three editions. "In the Cloudy and Dark Day" is even greater than the first, and the book concern deserves the thanks of the public for reprinting it.

It has rare spiritual insight, together with a sympathetic understanding of the moods and the needs of the human soul, characterizes this book of devotional studies. It has the same devotional spirit and the same simple and beautiful language that made such an appeal to the readers of "In the Secret of His Presence" by the same author.

The sub-title, which reads, "God's Messages of Peace to the Weary, the Sorrow-laden, the Troubled, and the Tired," might make it appear as if the messages were addressed to a special group or groups. You will find, however, that you are included in the classes mentioned and that the book speaks to you. The need for consolation is universal.

In its setting forth of the entire question of pain and suffering in the light of God's revelation and of Christian faith this book has unique value. No other book with which we are familiar brings a more satisfying message to the heart that is troubled about these matters. Yet there is no trace of sentimentalism, nor is comfort given apart from spiritual discipline. 190 pages. Attractive cloth binding. Price \$1.00; net.

Mightily, as never before in Central, echoed the battle-hymn of reformation. Mr. John Groening, a local music teacher, sang a solo. Rev. Johnson sang the liturgical parts of the vesper. The church was well filled, and every one departed from this festive vesper service inspired bodily as well as spiritually, a service not soon to be forgotten.
