

## Smärtornas man

## Text: Es. 53: 3

Vàr text är hämtad ur det kapitel hos gamla testamentets evangelist, som $\mathbf{i}$ gripande ordalag mảlar för oss vầr dyre Frälsares djupaste förnedring, dà "Herren kastade allas vâra synder uppà honom."

Jesus var inte endast en smärtornas man i örtagården Getsemane eller dà han gisslades, törnekröntes och korsfästes. Nej! Över hela hans liv kan man sätta: "Smärtornas man," ty nog var han föraktad, hảnad och begabbad frản vaggan till graven, Härom kan du lisa i de fyra evangelierna; likasá hurı han var av andra övergiven, t. o, m. av sina egna lärjimgar, ja, utav Gad-sjäv, de hat put korset itropar: "Min Gud, min Gud, varfore har du övergivit mig?" Nog var han "fortrogen med lidandet," ty lidande bestar inte bara uti kroppsliga smärtor, utan förnämligast i själssmärta. Han kom hit ned från himmelens rena varld till oss i denma av synd besuddlade värld, som ropar om hännd frân en rättfirdig Gud och skapare. Se, t. ex. Jona 1:2. Omgiven av denna ondska levde han, Gudamänniskan, ibland oss i tre och trettio ar. Vi ha ofta undrat varföre han ej dröjde länge ibland Arlams fallna barn. Ja, varföre? Kunde han ej uthärda världssmärtan nảgot längre? Vi bara frâga och fortsätta stapplande vâr pilgrimsfärd. Varföre har Han inte komm't tillbaka; ej i fömedring utan i härlighet? Sả länge själar för varje dag vinnas för hans rike kommer han att droja med domen, ty han vill frälsa sâ mãnga som ske kan. Hans stora mission var att frälsa, ej att döma. Detta, att vi äro otåliga emedan han drojer att komma, tillför Honom smärta. Det höves oss att stă ödmjuka och med tand för tunga inför skriftens djupaste mysterier.

Huru har inte smärtornas man blivit övergiven, icke bara av enskilda utan av hela kyrkosamfund, icke endast uti ett ovärdigt leverne utan uti det som är lika vederstyggligt infor Gud och med ännu svărare foljder: falsk lära, som utgatt pả att förueka vad Kristus uffört till vär försoning, som sã tydligt och sã vältaligt framställes i detta juvelställe i den heliga

## skrift, där vår text är tagen.

Den som bortförklarar Kristi ställföreträdlande lidande inför Gud, har stulit den ädlaste juvelen ur kronan på dens huvud, som heter "Konungarnas Konung och herrars Herre." Jesus övergives också, när det yttre i verksamheten blir det centrala och icke den andliga uppbygelsen. Men därföre få vi inte säga, att det yttre âr av ondo och i skenheligt fromleri bekämpa detta. Nej! Det ena skall man göra och det andra icke låta. Ja, Jesus var en smärtornas man, förtrogen med lidandet som ingen aunan. Sannt sjunger Qvirsfeld: "Sã, som Jesu smärta var, aldrig någons varit har."

Tänk bara på törnekronan på hans heliga hjässa! Han var förtrogen med lidandet, men forst efter sin mandomsanammelse erfor han detta. Efter sin upphöjelse är Han ju skild frân syndare och högre ân himmelen. ănnu en gang. mer छenom att stă 1 andegemenskap med sima troende fär han genom dem vara fortfarande förtrogen med lidandet, om vi fatta detta rätt. Tänk huru de kristna i allt varit förtrogna med lidandet. Jag behöver bara nämna apostlarna. Läs $t$. ex. Pauli självforsvar i 2 Kor. 11 kap. Läs sedan martyrhistorien, icke endast under de tre första århundradena, utan àven vad som timat $i$ detta stycke upp till vårt eget tidevarv. Att vara en kristen har stor vinning med sig, mera än vi äro mäktiga att uppskatta, men vilken kristen kan säga, att han ej erfarit naggot av vad det vill säga att vara fortrogen med lidandet i Jesu efterföljd? Slâ upp brevet til hebreerna, det 12 kap.

Ja, Jesu historia visar oss, att han var "lik en för vilken man gömmer sitt ansigte, föraktad, och vi aktade honom icke." Ändă var han Guds enfödde son, den däjligaste bland jordens söner och högre än himmelen. Vem är dã här på jorden sả stor och härlig som en kristen, fastän så föraktad? Fjellsted säger följande bevingade ord ëver vàr underbara text: "Herrens tjenare Job, som var rättärdig och from, men blev utsatt för obegripliga lidanden genom Guds underbara tillstädjelse, och misskänd av sina egna vänner, var ell lärorik förebild av den lidande, föraktade och misskände Messias, och av Jobs lidande använde profeten mảnga drag för att beskriva Messias förnedringstillstând. (Se Job 2: 7,8). Job blev föraktad av sina vämer; Kristus föraktades av sitt eget folk (Joh. 7: 48), och genomgick alla li-
danden och prövningar såsom en, för vilken man bortgömmer ansigtet (Ps, 31:12). Den otrogna världen föraktar honom nu, likasom de otrogna judarna korsfäste honom såsom en missgärningsman och ristade sina huvuden emot honom.'

Vad det nu än må kosta, "lãtom oss gä utanför lägret med honom för att lida hans smälek," ty sent omsider skola vi fă regera med honom. Vad allt detta innebär fā vi kännedon om i de rältfärdigas uppstãndelse.

Herre Jesus Kristus, du smärtornas man, hjälp mig att under denna fastlagstid innerligare blicka upp till (lig än naggonsin före, att jag mả, ay hiärtat tacka dig för vad du gjort fôr min frälsning. Hjälp mig att villigt tjaña dig såsom ett tacksamhetsoffer vad det än mande kosta ay smälek, förakt och smärta. Min frālsare! Mâte du under denna heliga fastlagstid vinna mânga sialar getrom vituesbrirdet om din fösoningsdöd, du Guds lanm, som borttager världens synder.

När jag skall gả över dödens mörka flod, matte dâ glansen frân de sår, som törnekronan, gisselslagen, spikarna och lansstynget vallade dig, lysa mig tills jag hunnit fram till perleportarna till det nya Jerusalems härliga stad. Men käre Frälsare! Jag behōver ock ljus pã törnbeströdd mörk levnadsstig. Amen.

## Herrens ljuvlighets ström

Av din ljuvlighets ström giver du dem att dricka. (Ps. 36: 9.)

Det är av Guls dyrbara nảd psalmisten fâtt njuta, och däfôr sjunger han i helig hänförelse om Guds ljuvlighet\} ström. Han ser den rinna fram i Herrens gàrdar. Han talar nämligen i detta sammanhang om templet, ty om dem, som taga sin tillflykt under Herrens vingars skugga, säger han, att de varda mättade av Guds hus' rika hàvor.

Passionstidens huvudämne är Kristus it sitt bittra lidande och död till vàr frälsning. Med detta vilja vi sammanstalla det ämne och det bibelord, inför vilket vi nu önska att stanna. Herrens ljuvlighets

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ström blir dả det blod, som, till försoning för våra synder, rann ned för korsets träd. Det var visserligen icke en ljuvlighets ström av vilken Jesus drack. Nej, det var en bitter kalk han tömde. Den var så bitter, att han i örtagården i den förfärligaste ängslan och vånda bad: "Abba Fader! Allt är möjligt för dig: om det är möjligt, gange denna kalk ifrån mig. Dock icke sảsom jag vill utan som du.' Den var sä bitter, den kalken, att Jesus på korset fick erfara den förfärliga hemskheten utav att vara av Gud övergiven: "Min Gud, min Gud, varför har du övergivit mig?" ropar han därför under de svàraste kval. Ja, tänk vilken bitterhetens ström det var av vilken Jesus fick dricka. Han var en smärtornas man och lik en för vilken man gömmer sitt ansikte. "Såsom Jesu smärta var, aldrig nägons varit har."

Jesus drack lidandets bittra kalk, på det att vi i honom måtte hava ăterlolsningen genom hans blod, syndernas förlätelse genom hans nåds rikedom. (Ef. 1: 7.) Han frambar uti sitt lidande och genom sin död ett försoningsoffer, det evinnerligen galler. Han gjorde allt pả det att vi måtte finna nảd hos Gud. Han drack korsets bittra galla, att vi evigt måtte undslippa fördömelsens hemska dryck.

Av Herrens ljuvlighets ström fả vi nu dricka. Det är Herren som räcker oss den drycken. Den räcktes oss genom den nåd, som vederfors oss i dopet. Vilken ljuvlighets ström vi drucko av, då Herren Gud gjorde oss till sina barn. Huru rikt nådens källa framvällade för vår späda invärtes mảnniska, som vi i dopets bad blevo rentvagna. Ja, om dopstunden sjunga vi ju i psalmen: "Då blev hjärtat rikt begåvat av en himmelsk far och vän." Men vad var det för nảd, som oss i dopet sả härligt vederfors? Jo, det var "nảden i Guds hjärta, den Jesus bragt oss fram, dả han för oss i smärta blev död på korsets stam."

Av Herrens ljuvlighets ström få vi dricka vid nattvardsbordet. Där āta vi ju och dricka till Jesu döds åminnelse. Där skänker han oss sin egen pá korset brutna lekamen och sitt eget på förbannelsens träd utgjutna blod. Vilken ljuvlighetens ström vi här finna! Det är ljuvligt för den efter rättfärdighet hungrande och törstande själen att vid Jesu bord bliva bespisad och vederkvickt med hans himmelska rätter. Det är ljuvligt att inför Jesus få knäfalla för att av honom bliva vederkvickt till själen, stärkt till den invärtes människan. Det ar saligt att komma inför Jesus vid hans bord för att där bliva stärkt till tro och för att där fá mottaga förnyad förvissning om syndernas förlâtelse. Saligt är det att fâ göra allt till Jesu åminnelse: att få besinna, att det icke är för egna dygders skull, som jag får se himlavägen öppen framför mig, utan att det är för Jesu lidandes och döds skull, som jag fâr vänta att till sist ärva evigt liv. Saligt det är för den syndbelastade att på Golgatha höjd fâ finna pà de "fem källor smâ, som giva liv och hälsa."
I Guds ord rinner Herrens ljuvlighets ström fram. Här ha vi nämligen det evangelium, som har såsom sin grundton, att Jesus har köpt oss àt Gud med sitt blod. Ja, här ha vi förkunnelsen om den rika och överflödande nâden. Guds ord var ljuvligt för psalmisten; "Din muns lag är mig bättre än mấng tusen stycken guld och silver." "Huru ljuvt för min mun är icke ditt tal! Det är ljuvligare än honung för min mun." Och vidare säger han: "Din nād vare min tröst, såsom du talat till din tjänare." (Ps. 119: 76.) För vems skull vederfors honom dà denna nåd? Jo, för Jesu skull. Korset höjer sig, fast ännu profetiskt, i det lilla ordet nåd, såsom det i gamla testamentet brukas. Även för Psalmistens synd led Jesus. Ja, t. o. m. Israels folk fick under ökenvandringen dricka av nådens 1juvlighetsström, som framväller i Jesus. I det nytestamentliga ordet heter det nämligen, att en andlig klippa medföljde Israel, ur vilken detta folk fick dricka, och klippan var Kristus.
Vi ha denna andliga klippa uti Guds ord, i korsets evangelium. Ur denna få vi dricka under ökenvandringen. Genom sitt evangelium talar Jesus så trösterikt till alla fattiga syndare. Till den samaritiska kvinnan talade han om det levandet vattnet. I passionshistoriens ord, i korsets evangelium talar han ännu till fralsningssökandes vederkvickelse. Här giver han oss ännu av sin ljuvlighets ström att dricka. Med sångaren böra vi därför i helig hänförelse särskilt under fastlagstiden kunna sjunga: "Den klippa som följer med springkällans vảg, År Kristus, hans renande blod. Där lever vårt hjärta, Där lever värt hjärta, Där fröjdas värt hjärta, Där livas vårt mod."

## Annual Report of the President of Mt. Baker District

## (Cont'd from January issue)

Thus effective evangelistic work on Lutheran principles might be carried on and greater results obtained. As it has been the pastors and the local congregations have received great blessings through these meetings of the district, but it is questionable whether the district has sought to enlarge its borders as it should and gather in the unchurched who can often be reached only by special efforts. The problem is one well worthy of our serious and prayerful consideration and should receive this consideration at our annual meeting today.
The district is not without its difficult problems that call for a satisfactory solution. There are old fields in need of better care and new fields calling for help. The Anacortes field is one of the former. What to do with it has been a troublesome question through the year. As it is; it must be served by a non-resident pastor who can hold services only in the afternoon. This is very unsatisfactory. It is a mooted question whether the field will justify placing a permanent man there. Discotraged by the uncertainty of their status, the congregation at Anacortes decided it its annual meeting to discontinue all its services for the present but to continue its organization, also the Ladies' Aid. Perhaps this was the only thing to do. If not, the District should today take definite action to remedy a situation which can not long continue with blessing to our work.

The Immanuel congregation at Edgecomb presents another difficult problem. Upon the completion of the Marysville cut-off last fall, a highway improvement which brings Edgecomb within a distance of 12 miles from Everett and some of the members still nearer, the district reconmended to the Immanuel congregation to merge its work with that of Zion church of Everett. This recommendation was passed also for the reason that the membership of the Immantel congregation is very small and it is doubtful that the field will justify continued effort there in the future unless a renewed interest on the part of the present members and the people of the community is manifested. Even then the field is very limited. The recommendation was presented to the Immanuel congregation but no action was taken until at the annual meeting. The sentiment there was strongly against merging with Everett. A very marked sentiment to abandon the work was also evident. Upon a suggestion from the pastor it was finally
decided to ask the president of the Conference and a representative from the Conference board to meet with the Immanuel congregation with a view to ascertaining the course to be followed. There the matter rests at present.

The past year has witnessed the removal of one brother from the ranks of the pastors and the coming of another. The brother who left us and whose splendid gifts we hope are being used in the service of the Lord on the field in Alberta, Canada, left a great void not only in our midst but in our hearts. Truly we miss the inspiration of the sanctified and consecrated brother, Rev. Otto Eklund. Wit! the mother of Jesus we say, "Son, why hast thou thus dealt with us?" But we are grateful to God who in His mercy has already filled the ranks left open by brother Eklund's departure. As a district we consider ourselves fortunate in having been permitted to welcome to our midst the Rev. Dr. Joseph A. Anderson from Boxholm, Iowa, and brother of the sainted Dr. G. A. Anderson, also for many years secretary of the Augustana Synod, past president of the Iowa Conference and member of the Board of Directors of Augustana College and Theological Seminary. With his wealth of experience gathered through long years of service in these various capacities we feel that our ranks have been strengthened with no small reinforcement. by the coming of Dr. Anderson. Again we bid him welcome and wish him much joy and blessing in the work of the Mt. Baker district.

The work at Vancouver, B. C., has been cared for by brother A. G. Anderson since the removal of Rev. Eklund. On account of this the work on the field in B. C. has been greatly neglected the past half year. It is hoped that a pastor will soon be had for the Vacouver congregation so that Rev. Anderson can again devote his time to his regular work on the difficult field in the camps and mining towns of British Columbia. The Rev. J. E. Rydback of Cadillac, Mich., has been called to Vanconver charge and it is the sincere prayer and hope of the district that this brother will accept the care for the work in this important place. Brother O. W. Westling now in charge at Lynden and Clearbrook has been called to the field in New Westminster, B. C., and near-lying points. What this good brother will do is unknown as yet.

Regarding the external achievements of the congregation little need be said in this report since the report of the statistician will cover that. Reference should however be made to the completion of the splendid new edifice in which we meet today. We as a district rejoice over this outstanding achievement in our midst. While this and other improvements may not always be the
measure of real saving faith and genuine Christian love in the hearts of the people, they are indications that the seed of such faith and love has been sown and that the sowing has not been altogether in vain. We congratulate the Salem congregation upon the completion of their new church home during the past year and wish them Gods richest blessing in the work of completing the task of eradicating the remaining debt. Dr. Anderson reports the purchase of a commodious parsonage by the Bethlehem congregation of SedroWoolley which has also been very much improved since it was acquired. This too is a very commendable step. The Bellingham congregation has renovated its parsonage and important changes have been made in the church kitchen. The Zion congregation of Everett has reshingled the roof of its parsonage and installed a new furnace in the church at a cost of $\$ 500$. As far as we are able to ascertain all congregations have met their obligations to the Conference and Synod.

As to the spiritual condition in our churches much might be said but perhaps it can be briefly summarized in the statement, "there is room for improvement." We liye in a materialistic age and materialistic influences and viewpoints wedge in here and there even in the church. Worldliness, formalism, machinery! Of this we have plenty, but of fellowship with God in prayer, praise and thanksgiving and of burning self-sacrificing love that gives of time, talents and effort that souls might be won for Christ-what a dearth. God have mercy, God forgive. Oh that there might be a revival of faith and love in our hearts, an outpouring of the Spirit of God in Pentecostal power, a revival that will bring men and women to their knees in true contrition and repentance and bring about a consecration of the whole being to the Lord and the work of His glorious church. For that we should pray. To that end we should preach. With that in view we should start the work of the new year in our district and continue to pray, preach and labor until a revival comes. Pastors and laymen, let us not fear that word. It is biblical. It is our great need, and it must begin with the people of God.

The undersigned begs to be pardoned for all inefficiency and short-comings in his work as chairman of the district since the departure of the duly-elected chairman, Rev. Otto Eklund, and also to express his thanks for the confidence reposed in him and for the privilege of serving in this capacity. May "now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make us perfect in every good work to do his will, working in us that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever.

Our good brother, who was our host, had returned from North Easton, Mass., the evening before, where he had been on the sad mission of laying hits sainted mother to rest under the sod "in God's acre." The Mount Baker district tenders its sincere and heart felt sympathy to Rev. M. L. Swanson in his bereavement. We know that his mother, Mrs. Swanson, was a warm-hearted Christian, who reared her son in the "fear and admonition of the Lord." This noble mother gave us this splendid pastor, who so faithfully serves Christ and His church, and our Columbia Conference as well. We thank God for this mother in Christ for what she was in her home and in His church. Now she is at home waiting for her dear ones, just like other sainted ones, in their "mansions" are waiting for us.

began in Jesus name and concluded it around His Cross at the Holy Communion table together. Here the delegates to the Women's Missionary Society's annual meeting together with the lay delegates and pastors of the district knelt at the same holy table. There grace and forgiveness were given for transgression and $\sin$. We received added strength to continue our work as a district and individual congregations.

Our district meetings are spiritual retreats. We value them beyond measure. There is something divinely attractive about the Lutheran parsonage. The atmosphere in the Salem parsonage is invigorating. We experienced this at our meeting. There is co-operation of pastor and members. This came home to us with renewed meaning, when we sat down to the tables filled with palatable food. On behalf of the Mount Baker district we thank Rev. M. L. Swanson and wife for their kindness to us during our third annual meeting. We also thank those who housed us; and grateful thanks to those women who fed us. Lastly, hearty thanks to the pastor again and to the members of Salem.

Dear fellow members, grace and peace! Another year has passed and we have again gathered together as a district to summarize the work of the past year of the Women's Missionary Society to see what we have gained, where we have failed and study together the problems which confront us during the coming year.
It was truly interesting and a joy to read the letter which came with the various reports from the local societies. In so many cases the writer said, "We have done as much as we could" or "Next year perhaps we can do better." It proves to us that the Lord is blessing them in their work and inspiring them to bigger and better things from year to year.

May He ever lead us on to greater endeavor, so we can serve Him and His kingdom in larger ways. Let us not only serve Him, but truly follow Him as well, that others may catch our inspiration and join us in our activities and with us reap the joys and privileges of such a service under such a leader as our Savior.
Some reports show a good gain and others a slight decrease in activity and accomplishment. But we should not allow this to discourage us. Sometimes these declines are caused by various local circumstances and conditions that cannot be controlled.

Sometimes the reports from the various societies were inconsistent and do not bal-
ance with previous reports, so it is impossible to render an entirely accurate account of statistics. We hope by another year, headquarters will devise a more simple report blank, so it will be possible for the local societies to send in an accurate and clear report.
There is a slight drop in membership during the past year in both the adult and junior societies. We now have a total of 259 adults and 143 juniors, making a grand total of 402 .

We have 67 life members, 62 adult and 5 junior. Please remember the funds for life members are now divided between Bethphage and the Seamen's and Loggers' mission.

We are glad to report that we now have 168 Mission Tidings subscribers, which is a gain of 25 over last year. But this is still less than 50 per cent. of our membership. Let us continue to work for more Mission Tidings subscribers. It is only through studying and becoming informed, that we truly become interested in this great field of activity.

The music of the evening was furnished by a missionary chorus composed of women from the various local societies.
We have had interesting visits during the past year from Anna Olson, Miss Anderson and Augusta Highland. The two missionaries visited some of the congregations several times and all brought a good deal of information and inspiration.
Please let us urge you to work for a much larger missionary membership during 1928. There are still 50 per cent. of our women and Sunday school children who are not yet engaged in this wonderful field of labor. Isn't it possible to make every local society 100 per cent. members during this year, and as a result double our district membership and help swell the Conference membership to 2,000 by 1929.
One member is offering a $\$ 10$ donation to the adult society in the district getting the greatest number of new members during February, March and April. Let us
accept this challenge and double our district membership.

Let us also organize young women's societies wherever feasible.

May God richly bless us during this coming year and help us to work with greater zeal and energy that His kingdom may be extended throughout the world.

May we not see an improvement by next year?

## Columbia Hospital, Astoria

In compliance with the request of the editor the undersigned is happy to report the following news from our youngest institution of mercy, the Columbia Hospital, Astoria, Ore. The Conference Board of Trustees met at the hospital Wednesday, February 1. The afternoon was spent in considering matters of importance in the general work of the Conference. All the rembers of the board were present. We were pleased to receive communication from Rev. G. A. Herbert, accepting the call as editor of the Columbia Lutheran. Rev. Ben Erholm informed us that he will serve as manager of the paper until he moves to another field in June. Rev. E. A. Larson informed us of having accepted the call to the Tacoma-Auburn field, and that he was already on the field. Rev. O.
W. Westling formally accepted the call extended to him to serve in New Westminster and surrounding territory as missionary pastor. Dr. Albert Okerstrom was formally welcomed by the president of the board, Dr. C. R. Swanson. So much for the business session that might be of general interest.

The board went to Astoria this time to hear how the new hospital is functioning, and to welcome its new superintendent. From the reports given we have reasons to believe that the institution will be a success. Mr. J. A. Nordeen has served faithfully and well since the untimely demise of Rev. A. V. Anderson, as superintendent. There were at the time of this meeting about forty patients in the hospital. The institution enjoys the good will and interest of the citizens of Astoria and vicinity. It has made a good beginning in spite of difficulties. We feel that the future of the institution is safe in the hands of the new superintendent and the splendid men who constitute the hospital committee.

An informal reception in honor of Dr. Okerstrom and family was held in the evening. The medical staff of the hospital was present together with a number of other prominent citizens of Astoria. Dr. C. R. Swanson presided. In his address of welcome to the new superintendent and his family Dr. Swanson told the story of the hospital in brief, and expressed the hope that Dr. Okerstrom may see it develop in its great mission into an institution of which the Conference and the community may reap many blessings. Dr. Toivo Forsstrom, president of the medical staff, speaking in behalf of his colleagues, emphasized that the fact that Dr. Okerstrom is a medical man will mean much to the doctors in the solution of their problems from time to time. The next speaker on the program was Hon. David Lofgren of Portland. Giving some personal reminiscences from his association with the folks in Astoria he expressed the hope that the people of Astoria may rally to the support of the new superintendent and his good wife in their labor among them. State Senator A. W. Nordblad spoke very forcefully on the impression this hospital already has made on the community and pledged his support. He also said some very fine things about Mrs. Okerstrom, judging her from her appearance, in the light of twenty years of experience with people in the legal profession. Mr. J. S. Dellinger, publisher of the Morning Astorian, expressed his hope that the Doctor and his wife and son will find Astoria a pleasant and hospitable community in which to live and labor. There was a happy note in all these speeches, full of appreciation and hope for the new institution.

The responses of Dr. and Mrs. Okerstrom deserve a paragraph of their own. The Doctor spoke of his early experiences in the medical profesison and of the church which during his service of seven years has grown to one of the strongest Lutheran churches in the great city of Detroit, Mich. He said that he had cherished the hope to come to the west, but had never thought that he would get here so soon. He was favorably impressed with the institutions and the people connected with it and promised to enter into the work whole heartedly, with the hope of full cooperation and support of the Conference and of the people of Astoria. The last speaker on the program was Mrs. Okerstrom. She proved to be just the person prophesied by Senator Nordblad. They all said that she made the best speech. She told some very interesting things about her husband. She said that, inspired by the beautiful hair of our venerable Conference president, Dr. Okerstrom had come out here in the hope that he, too, might develop a new crop of hair. She said something about the rainy season and August for which Astoria is famous; but she hastened to add that she had already learned to like her new home and that she wanted to be an active member of the church and social family of the city.

A social hour followed during which refreshments were served by the nurses, under the supervision of Mrs. Okerstrom and Miss Nannie Munson, the superintendent of nurses.

## Central Lutheran Church, Yakima

The last two years have seen quite a change in our work on this field. Three former congregations have merged into one and affiliated with the Columbia Conference. This is of great significance in the solution of our home missionary problems. It proves that where there is a will and a larger vision on the part of our $\mathrm{Lu}-$ theran people they will unite their forces into a common effort for a wiser distribution of men and means and for the creation of a Lutheran consciousness on the basis of the Augsburg Confession rather than along the line of nationalistic peculiarities and differences, We who are engaged in this work realize its difficulties. We may not live to see this new thing in its development after it has passed the stage of "getting started," and this stage may be long and knotty enough, but, knowing that we are on the right track, we do not mind being spent in the effort. There are other places where similar mergers could be made, but for the lack of vision and love for the kingdom on the part of our people. We know from bitter experience that this is true. As soon as this church had voted in favor of
affiliating with the Columbia Conference there were a number who lost interest in it. They said: Now it is a Swedish church, ergo we can't belong. On the basis of this sentiment, for it is a sentiment only, they dropped out, to our sincere regret. But the great majority said: Never mind, we are determined to sacrifice our own preferences, if such there be, and line up with this new church in which we see the only hope fo success. They did, praise God! The Swedes ought to be satisfied. I think they are, as a rule. They certainly ought to be. The Norwegian brethren are satisfied. To the honor of these brethren we can truthfully say that they have never expressed any dissatisfaction with the decision, and they are heart and soul in this work. The same is true of many of the former Holy Trinity group. With the support and sympathy of the Columbia conference, and with the good will and confidence of the other two bodies making this church possible in the first place, the Central Lutheran Church has adopted the rules of conduct as advocated by the great apostle Paul in Phil. 3: 13-12, "But one thing I do, forgetting the things which are behind, and stretching foreward to the things that are before, I press on toward the goal unto the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."
Our services are generally well attended. This is true regarding the morning services. The evening services are a source of grief for poor attendance, as a rule. Our early service Christmas morning was well attended. The early service is very much favored also with those of our members who were not accustomed to it before. The Pastor received an offering of $\$ 40$. The children's program, held the day after Christmas, and the sacred concert, rendered by the choir under the efficient leadership of Miss Agnes Anderson and our organist Kenneth Wahlstrom on New Years' day in the evening, were well attended.
Our annual business meeting was held Friday evening, January 13. Among items of interest may be mentioned that according to the report $\$ 1,755.61$ had been paid during the year on the debt of our present church property. A lot adjoining the church was purchased during the year for the sum of $\$ 600.00$. Only part of this sum has been paid to date. The property of the former Immanuel congregation was sold during the year for the sum of $\$ 1$.500.00 cash. It was decided to remodel the basement of the church during the year and to make necessary repairs on the roof. The organist's salary was raised to $\$ 240$ for the year. The membership of the congregation is 168 communicants and 58 children. Fifteen children and two adults were baptized during the year. Four


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adults and twelve children were confirmed and sixteen communicants and twelve children were received on confession of faith.

On Friday evening, February 3, a Father and Son banquet was held. It was the first of its kind in the history of this chureh, and it was a wonderful success. About seventy men and boys were gathered around the tables. As we have no brotherhood as yet, the board of deacons, assisted by a committee of women, had charge of the affair. Rev. G. K. Andeen of Spokane was the speaker for the evening; and he did well. Our men were inspired and almost convinced that they are not fulfilling all righteousness as church nembers; and some of them indicated that they were thinking seriously of reform. An evening like that, facing the problems together, means much to our men.
