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

Message from Bishop Jaech



"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." Hebrews 13:2

We enjoyed a wonderful Synod Assembly in late May, reflecting on the theme of Hospitality and practicing hospitality with one another. Both our Assembly planning committee, chaired by Pastor Ron Kempe, and the entire congregation and staff of Trinity Lutheran Church, who hosted us, deserve our deep thanks for the constant hospitality they offered.

How do we practice hospitality in our life and ministry as congregations? Here's a brief summary of what we considered at the Assembly.

In the New Testament Gospels, we see two important types of hospitality being offered. When Martha and Mary welcome Jesus into their home in Bethany, they are giving a wonderful example of Home Hospitality. Home Hospitality is when we open our hearts, homes and congregations to all who enter, providing them a place to be welcomed and nourished by the Spirit of God through Word, Sacrament and Holy Community. Home Hospitality is essential to our work as the community of Christ's people.

Jesus also demonstrates another kind of hospitality, which can be called Road Hospitality. In his parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus describes three ways that we treat each other when we meet on the highways of life. We do Road Rage, like the robbers who beat up the man who was on his way to Jericho. We do Road Avoidance, like the priest and Levite who "passed by on the other side" in order to avoid getting involved with the wounded man lying on the ground.

Or, says Jesus, we can do Road Hospitality, like the Samaritan, who went to extraordinary lengths to care for the injured man.

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Both Home Hospitality and Road Hospitality are necessary parts of our ministry as Lutheran congregations in the Southwestern Washington Synod. First, they are the natural outgrowth of God's grace and love stirring in our lives. We are all travelers through life and God continually meets us on the road, wherever we are, and heals us, welcomes us home, and nourishes us as dear and beloved children.

Second, Home and Road Hospitality are crucial for our future existence as a church. Not as many people are coming through our doors on Sunday morning as they used to. Therefore, we need to go out those doors to find people wherever they are hurting and minister to them in Christ's name. We would do that in any case because it's the Way that Jesus leads us. We also do Road Hospitality because it's a key way to meet new people and form trusting relationships. It will lead people to say, "Who are these Lutherans who seem to care so much about us, our cities, and creation itself? Maybe I might like being part of their community?"

God bless you as you gather each week in your church homes to be fed, filled and renewed by God. God bless you as you go out on the roads each week to bring God's love to your neighbors. Through that interwoven pattern of Home and Road Hospitality, the Holy Spirit keeps us alive.

Shout-out for Team ELCA

A call to all for greater, deeper and unapologetic participation in this church

We are in the middle of synod assembly season. All synods will meet, vote, discuss, worship and sing. I will be at five of these and can assure you that, though there are delightful regional flavors, they will be remarkably similar. If we were to take a voting member from the Pacifica Synod meeting in Hawaii this year and plunk her down in the hills of Pennsylvania at the Allegheny Synod Assembly, she would recognize what was going on.

Each year from April to June a remarkable thing happens across this church. We come together. Members of synods participate together in the work of the ELCA and like it! Congregations see the work we do together as the ELCA all across this country and around the world and have a sense that they are part of something greater than themselves and are proud of it. For a few shining days we believe and live the words of Paul: "So we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Romans 12:5).

And then we go home.

In the Dr. Seuss story *Horton Hears a Who!* there is an entire civilization existing on a speck of dust. The moral of this story is that, though it might not be part of our experience, we shouldn't discount the experience of another. After all, "a person's a person no matter how small." But I think there is another less perky lesson to be drawn, and that is, until they got into trouble the citizens of Whoville were quite content to believe their speck of dust was the whole world.

We're not so different. Congregations can, and often do, fall into the trap of believing that they are the church, the whole church, all by themselves. Coupled with some of the most frequently asked questions usually raised around budget time—"What do we get from the synod?" and "What does the synod do for us?"—this understanding of church becomes what I call "Transactional Whoville Ecclesiology." Transactional because the motivation for participating in a relationship is what can be gotten out of it. Whoville because the individual or the congregation or the synod or the region or the churchwide organization believes it is entirely the church.

I'm not sure which part of Transactional Whoville Ecclesiology is most distressing. This ecclesiology arises from a transactional understanding of our relationship with God. If I go to church, if I keep the commandments, if I follow Jesus, then God will do something for me. The gift of resurrection itself becomes a transaction. It's like someone saying to his or her spouse, "I love you honey, but I'm only in this marriage to get your pension when you die." It's the opposite of "We love because [God] first loved us" (1 John 4:19). It's "we love so God will love us." This is a grace-less ecclesiology.

The question should not be "What does the synod do for us?" or "What do we get from the synod?" Rather, transformed by the love of God in the death and resurrection of Christ, the question should be "What are we able to do together as synod?" or "What do we get to do as synod or as the ELCA?"

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Whoville ecclesiology is isolating. It's also really American. We celebrate the concept of the rugged individual. We value self-determination. Autonomy is prized. We are suspicious of claims on us by a greater whole. The concept of church as the body of Christ and that we are members one of another, then, is very countercultural.

But the baptized aren't just a collection of individuals in the church for what they can get out of it. We have been claimed by Christ. Paul reminds us, "You are not your own" (1 Corinthians 6:19). The Marine Corps has billboards that proclaim: "Serving something greater than themselves." How is it that they are better at articulating what it means to be church together than we are?

This isn't a plug for institutional survival or mindless loyalty. It's a call to each of us and all of us to greater, deeper and unapologetic participation in the part of the church known as the ELCA. We can have a little pride in who we are without irony. I believe I've established my theological heft so I am allowed a little hokeyness. Here it is: We are Team ELCA.

End of Formatta for Pastors in Transition

4 Powerful words for Facebook

There are a number of what I call tactics that people use to "fake" engagement on Facebook. But there are 4 simple words that you can use that will be more effective in the long run.

"This week we helped."

Seems simple enough, right? But, more often than not, what we actually see is – Look what we can do for you! Aren't we great? Call today to schedule your appointment for that root canal! What is in common about all of those statements is they are PUSHY - or they may come off that way.

Social Media is about a pull, rather than a push and that is what can make "This week we helped" be your new best friend and way to pull clients and referrals to you and your business.

Let's look at a "Tale of Two Facebook Posts." For example purposes, we'll use an insurance company.

Post #1 – Do you have a new driver in the house? Call us today to update your auto insurance.

Post #2 – This week, we helped a family with a new teen driver. We updated their policy and talked to them about adding an umbrella policy as well.

The difference is subtle, but I hope you can see it.

In post #1, if your "fans" or followers do not have a new driver in the house, they will mentally answer no and move on. Post #2 may inspire a different response. As you read that post, is your brain shuffling through people who you might know with a new teen driver? I am guessing it does. Or, maybe it has you wondering about an umbrella policy and if that might be something you need.

Either way, it's pulling rather than pushing. And, who doesn't like people who help?

In addition, it helps tell the stories about your business (congregation) and the services you provide!

A DAY OF LEARNING, WORSHIP AND INSPIRATION

WORD: The people in worship:

Session 1 – Rev. Dr. Jana Childers - Who does this involve? Attention to how we prepare ourselves as participants in worship leadership (clergy and lay). Best practices for embodiment of graceful and grace-filled leadership. To include practical consideration of body language, use of personal space, and voice in the leadership of the assembly.
