## Holy Spirit Lutheran Hosts "Love Fearlessly, Do Justice"

Dr Kurt Ver Beek addressed advocacy work in Honduras to a gathering at Holy Spirit Lutheran Wednesday evening, March 10. Seventy people from the Kirkland community heard Dr Ver Beek describe the justice efforts of AJS, Association for a More Just Society, which he cofounded. He spoke to students at Pacific Lutheran University earlier in the day.

Citing 1 John 4:18, Dr. Ver Beek urged his audience to be passionate and also be fearless in doing justice. He and his family have lived in Honduras since 1988. He opened a view that went beyond the statistics, giving examples of three Hondurans whom AJS has helped:

One was an abused boy, who was distraught and likely

headed for a life on the streets. Caring intervention healed and built him up and also achieved conviction of the abuser, resetting his future. Karla, his case worker, said, "If God has called us to help the people who most need it, then where they live is where I need to be."

An old woman did not have any ownership papers for her very modest home. The courts had stonewalled the cases of her entire community for 25 years. AJS attorneys won the case and she had her papers. In fact, in four years they have obtained 40,000 titles for poor people.

A pregnant woman working as a security guard worked 72 hours and more per week and was paid for 44 hours. Providing counseling and legal

## A Word From The Bishop

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you." John 15:12 NRSV

I have repeatedly said that 95% of the time I have the best call in the church. I really do believe that. I have opportunity to witness the varied ministries of this synod and have been privileged to see and hear about the work of this church and the whole church around the world. We have much to rejoice in God's work through the hands of Christ's church.

The other 5% of the time can be less than wonderful. It struck me on Maundy Thursday

that Jesus gives us a commandment, not a suggestion. I will grant that self sacrificial love for everyone in the Body of Christ is an impossible command. That fact does not diminish the law's accusing power in my life or in yours.

It appears to me that our polarized culture has so affected the church that we now say "love those who agree with you and speak ill of those who disagree with you." This command of Jesus is given at a moment when the disciples had little to no clue what was about to happen. There would be betrayal, denial, unbelief in abundance among this group of disciples in the coming days. These were not the best days for these leaders of the new church.

Jesus says to them, and to us, that in these unlovable moments we should love one another as Jesus has loved us. I do not have the authority to decide who my sister or brother is in faith. That is the work of the Holy Spirit. I have the responsibility to recognize the Spirit's work and to support those whom the Spirit has called, gathered and enlightened. At times I do not understand or agree with them, but they are still sisters and brothers in Christ.

Too often our culture likes to label the other person. You are liberal or conservative, evil or good, friend or enemy, in or out. Jesus commands that we love those who are saved through his death and resurrection. They could be any or all of the above. Our relationship is not based on our work or opinion; it is based on the actions of Jesus on our behalf and on the sister or brother's behalf.

Among all of the talk about what divides us I would propose that we begin our discussions with the reminder that we are the baptized children of God. We come to the Lord's Table in need of forgiveness and reconciliation so that we can love one another. We come to worship to be changed by God's Spirit working in us, not to be confirmed in our own preconceived notions. The church is a living, dynamic and ever changing community of the redeemed. It is time for us to act that truth in active love for one another.

## A New Ministry, A New Idea

#### Luther's Table

Gretchen Weller Mertes St Matthew Lutheran , Renton Many of you have heard of Luther's Table, the new ministry that is part of the Renton Lutheran Church Redevelopment Project that is working hand in hand with the new Veteran's Center being developed by the Compass Housing Alliance (formerly Compass Center) in downtown Renton.

This project has been a labor of love and passion and Spirit on the part of the South King Cluster, and will come to fruition this fall when the whole center opens. None of it would have been possible without the gift and passion

of the people of Renton Lutheran Church. As they were dying, they were able to see that new life could come, and that their heart for the community would live on through their generosity and their land.

One thing that makes Luther's Table unique is that it is not a ministry being started by one pastor in one place. Luther's Table is being designed and raised up by a whole scaffolding of people and congregations working together to make it happen.

Luther's Table is being spearheaded by St. Matthew's (SMLC) in Renton, but it has prayer, volunteer and financial support from many other congregations in the area. The pastoral team at SMLC is fond of saying, "Without our core of committed volunteers to do the heavy lifting, there is no way this project would ever get off the ground!" Pastors learn many things in seminary, but how to set up a non-profit entity, order equipment for kitchens, and lay out a flexible cafe and music venue are not part of the curriculum. In fact, pastors really have no business trying to start this kind of venture at all!

Luckily, we are blessed to have what we are calling a "steering team" of lay people who have expertise in various areas (restaurant, construction, marketing, project planning, volunteer coordination, fundraising, interior design, and more) who have committed major chunks of their lives to making Luther's Table a reality.

Many people have asked me, "What will you be doing down there at Luther's Table?" And I have to answer honestly that I'm really not sure. I know that we will have music and special art displays. I know that we will have "affinity groups" of people who gather for fellowship, conversation, food and drink. I know that we will be a place that encourages open and honest conversation around religion and faith. But after that, we're really hoping to be a place that meets the needs of the people who find their way in the door. We're hoping to be shaped organically by folks who find value in our core values of service, authenticity, the arts, and serving really good beer.

Luther's Table will be opening this fall, and it is certainly going to be an adventure. We hope that you will join us, and explore what God may be calling your community of faith into that you have no business doing!

help, AJS advocated for her and corrected this injustice. The Association has educated over 7,000 workers about labor rights. One attorney fighting for workers rights was killed by assassins.

The work is dangerous, Dr Ver Beek acknowledged, but we should not have fear. "God loves justice," he said, "He has shown his passion for protecting the weak." He cited in the three examples, that we need to view them as "my" son, "my" mother, "my" sister.

We cannot all go to Honduras, but Dr Ver Beek challenged Christians to act locally and love globally. Act locally by choosing a justice cause for which you care. Love globally by speaking out for people whose rights are abused. He suggested that when a U.S. Senator phones the President of Honduras, he answers the phone.

Holy Spirit Lutheran has been closely involved in supporting a home for abandoned children in Honduras. Since 2004 over 100 volunteers have visited the children there. Two years ago the congregation raised funds for a water treatment facility to give the children clean drinking water and proper sanitation.

Washington State Legislature ended its regular session on March 11<sup>,</sup> but because there was an impasse on the level and make up of the revenue package, which helps alleviate severe cuts and eliminations of health, human service, and environmental programs, a special session of 30 days had to be called by the governor. LPPO has consistently advocated for a revenue package and been a participant in a broad based statewide revenue coalition. LPPO has a summary of the outcomes of our legislative agenda that was emailed out to all who are a part of our statewide network and is now posted on our website at www.lppowa.org.

To keep our budget at the current level (which funds two FTE's and a shared seminary intern) we need to fundraise two-thirds of it. The first home where a child can rest easy, knowing their mommy or daddy is getting the help they need and they can sleep, knowing they are safe.

## Men's Gathering

Sleeping On The Street Every year Pastors David Parks and Mark Samuelson from Our Savior's Lutheran in Everett challenge their congregation to give to a cause. If the group meets the target for giving, the pastors promise a quirky public response. One year they kissed a

cow when the group gave nearly \$10,000 to Heifer International. The next year they ate raw fish when the children searched for coins to put in the baptismal font and raised over \$2,500 for clean water wells in Bangladesh.

This year they challenged the congregation to support a new Habitat for Humanity project that planned to build a house for a homeless family near the church in Everett. If the group raised \$1,000, the pastors promised to sleep on the street to raise awareness of what the homeless experience every night. "After all, according to the Bible story, the Holy family was homeless from the night Jesus was born and for the following two years when they had to flee to Egypt", Pastor Samuelson wrote to the congregation in the newsletter, "I think God has a heart for those with no home".

Everett Mayor Ray Stephanson immediately responded to the challenge citing the commitment the city has to end homelessness by the year 2016. Snohomish County has adopted an Initiative to End Homelessness as well.

Others who also spent the night out on the streets included the directors from the Everett Habitat for Humanity and Housing Hope. Other officials, members of the church and directors of non-profits also joined the pastor and mayor.

On Easter Sunday the Everett Habitat for Humanity received \$4,589 from the congregation in response to the need and challenge.

Join others this summer for a guided fiveday float through the canyons, forests and rural landscapes of Montana's beautiful Blackfoot River. The theme is: *Theology on the River: Conversations about healing our relationship to Creation.* 

This five-day guided float trip will take place from July 30 through August 4. This trip is for clergy, rostered leaders and staff (spouses/partners are welcome). Cost is \$550.

This course is designed as a conversation in context that draws both from our journey and a preassigned reader.
