A New Ministry And Immigration

This past August I attended the Eleventh ELCA Churchwide Assembly and witnessed a 873 – 82 vote that called for a comprehensive reform of U.S. immigration policies and processes, called for suspension of immigration raids until reform is enacted, and asked for a message on immigration this year.

In our synod, we have several ethnic specific ministries predominately serving immigrants, both documented and undocumented. These folks came to United States for a better life, fleeing persecution, oppression in their home country or for economic justice. They left everything: their house, their jobs, their friends,

their lives. The only thing they carry with them is their hope.

We know that being hopeful is not about doing nothing while hoping that somehow everything will change for the better. We know out of hope our parents or grandparents, or maybe great-great-grandparents, made it in this land far away from their country.

From my experience the stories of today's immigrants, who are in the midst of our congregations, are very similar to our ancestors. Whether they are Scandinavian, Latino, German, Chinese or Indonesian they are hard working people.

I have been asked by a group of pastors to be available to answer questions related to the sexuality decisions at the recent Churchwide Assembly. One such meeting is from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, Nov. 14, at Prince of Peace in Everett (9320 Meadow Lane).

As I said in my pastoral letter to the Northwest Washington Synod after the assembly we need to continue in dialog post assembly. This meeting on November 14 will be an opportunity for you to ask questions about the Churchwide Assembly and the recent Conference of Bishops meeting regarding the human sexuality social statement and the ministry policy decisions.

We have known for years that we have a number of different interpretations of scripture related to homosexuality. This church has been involved in study for the past eight years on various topics related to this subject.

The decisions of the Churchwide Assembly continue to reflect the differences of perspective about how to respond to questions of sexuality and qualification for rostered leadership in this church. I hear a variety of rumors from across the church and the synod about the meaning of these decisions and the responses of congregations and individuals to these decisions.

Paul admonishes the church in Philippi to strive side-by-side with one mind for the faith of the gospel. I agree. That will not come by the bishop saying this is the one mind we are to have. It will come as we remember our calling through baptism into the Body of Christ. It will come as we focus on the ministries that God has placed before us to accomplish in the name of Jesus.

Archbishop Wilton Gregory at the 10th anniversary service for the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification noted, “None of us can clothe ourselves in Christ without putting on the whole Christ. We are made righteous so as to be in a communion of shared love with the whole body of believers from whom we can learn so much and to whom we can give so much if we seek the path of unity. That is Christ’s path, and He longs to take us with him. Let us go with him, singing for joy! Amen”

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Jon and Juni Recognized

The Rev. Jon (ret) and Juni Nelson, long-time social justice advocates in our region, were given the Gertrude Apel Pioneering Spirit Award at the 90th anniversary of the Church Council of Greater Seattle on September 30.

Jon is best known for his outspoken criticism of the Trident submarine base where he was arrested several times and for his long-time (more than 30 years) involvement in a prison ministry at the state prison in Monroe. Juni is best known for her amazing work with children through her child care center as well as raising 14 children (three by birth and 11 by adoption; as well as dozens more that they foster-parented for varying periods of time). They both say that their witness to the world would not be possible without the other.

The Gertrude Apel award is named after the first woman to serve as the Church Council's executive director (1930) and, to this day, is the longest serving member. In a time when women did not "lead" organizations, Rev. Apel was a tireless ecumenical leader and amazing organizer. She had a talent for fostering cooperation and always getting things done.

LPPO Update

Greetings! This is Matt Keadle, the new LPPO seminary intern for 2009-2010. It is with joy and anticipation that I begin this year among you in the state of Washington. As with past interns, my time will be shared between LPPO and St. John United Lutheran Church in Seattle.

A few words about my own story:

I grew up in the northwest suburbs of Chicago, graduated from Valparaiso University, and then accompanied my wife, Chris, as she did her first years of graduate work at Indiana University toward a PhD in Latin American History. In 2006, I entered seminary at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, and my early pastoral identity was shaped by my experiences in the city, working at a homeless shelter and in culturally and racially diverse urban congregations. Most recently, my wife and I spent a year in Mexico, where I took seminary classes in the first-ever Mexico Semester Program at the ELCA's Lutheran Center in Mexico City.

While I have only been on the job for a few weeks, one thing has already become very clear: Relationships are critical to the work that we do at LPPO. This may seem obvious, but it can easily become lost in a sea of policy details and theological principles. Our relationships, in fact, make up the bridge that gets us from faith to effective action. It is partly for this reason, then, that my work this year at LPPO will center on building closer relationships between LPPO and the ELCA congregations of Washington State.

One way we hope to build these relationships is through our Advocating Congregations Program. Advocating Congregations become congregational partners with LPPO, working closely together with us on educational efforts, public witness on legislative issues and financial support. In doing so, these congregations add

The Book of Faith Workgroup is hosting several opportunities for engaging in conversation with and about scripture. Each of these opportunities helps us as a community to enter into conversation so that scripture becomes more familiar, we become more fluent in our first language of faith, and we understand the texts better.

Dr. George W. E. Nickelsburg, professor emeritus of New Testament at the University of Iowa, is leading a series of conversations on the Gospel of Luke. These conversations help us better understand the Lukan gospel tradition. The topics covered are: *Luke Among the Gospels; What Makes Luke Special?*; and *The Passion and Resurrection of Jesus According to Luke*.

The next series will be held at Central Lutheran in Seattle on November 1, 8 and 15. The last series will be at Holy Spirit in Kirkland on December 6, 13 and 20. The session begins at 12:30 p.m. with a light lunch followed by conversation from 1 p.m. until 2:15 p.m.

A series for rostered leaders on gospel pericopes or weekly lessons for Series C is scheduled:

- Conversations on Tuesday, Nov. 10 at First Lutheran in Mount Vernon with Pastors Chris Berry and Gretchen Cohan; and at Bethel Lutheran in Shoreline with Pastor Wayne Bacus and Dr. Roger Anderson will look at texts for Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany.
- Conversations on January 26 at Central Lutheran in Everett, led by Pastors Lydia Wittman Grebe and Walt Rice, and at St. Luke's Lutheran in Bellevue, led by Pastors Jane Prestbye and Erik Wilson Weiberg, will look at texts for Lent, Holy week, and Easter.
