

#### A Word From The Bishop

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.

Jeremiah 29:11



I am playing fast and loose with the text, but I want to ask what is your ministry plan. We go through phases of emphasizing strategic planning in the church. My observation is that some of us do this very well and others ignore the process. Too many of us establish plans that sit on the shelf until the next planning process replaces what has not been used in the past.

The fact remains that planning is an important tool to prioritize our work and to measure our effectiveness. To have a plan is to establish a direction that we personally and corporately want to move towards.

I want to suggest that it is important for individual pastors to have ministry plans. The work we do can often look like firefighting. We respond to the individual pastoral care issues that happen. That is significant, but it can also undermine our goals to reach out beyond our congregations into the communities we are called to serve.

So the questions remain, what do you plan to accomplish this year or in the next five years? How will you know if you are reaching your goals? Do you have anyone looking at your goals to help you revise them if needed?

We ask congregations to envision their preferred futures as part of the call process when there is a pastoral vacancy. How those visions are put into place is important work for the new pastor and the congregation.

One of the continuing goals of the Synod Staff is to support the work of congregations. That is a very broad goal. Our view is that helping you in the planning process

#### Here 'n There

The Synod Stewardship Team sends its appreciation for your faithfulness in the 2009 mission support. Some of our congregations are facing difficult financial situations while others are not. The mission support received by the Synod is down approximately \$44,000 compared to this time last year, and expenditures are being monitored carefully. As we exercise interdependence across the synod, a special thank you to those congregations who are able to step forward with additional support.

- Members of Trinity Lutheran in Freeland will attend a worship service at Bethel Ethiopian Church in Seattle on June 28. The reason? Trinity Lutheran is beginning a companion relationship with the Lutheran Church in Ethiopia and the congregation wants to experience worshipping with a Lutheran Ethiopian congregation.
- Each fall the Sunday School children at Faith Lutheran in Redmond put together a list of charities to receive their offering money. Then the children vote on their favorite two causes. Tsegie will be in our synod from July 11–19. She will be available to meet with different congregations during her visit to share her faith and her country. She is currently serving the Lord in her church as a choir leader. She loves to play guitar and keyboard. Her hope is to let others know about her church, culture, worship style and share the Mekane Yesus way of preaching with congregations. Tsegie would like to meet with youth from your congregation, especially if you have youth going to the National Youth Gathering.

Total cost of this experience is \$4,000. Churchwide is paying half. We need to raise the other \$2,000. Some money has been pledged already. Any amount is appreciated. We are excited that our youth will have an opportunity to meet a teenager from Ethiopia.

There are three needs: Two or three host families with whom Tsegie may stay; congregations who wish to have Tsegie visit their youth for a day or evening; and funds for her stay. #### Sharing Its Own Good Fortune
