A Youth Perspective

The 2009 ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans, LA provided my youth group, Lutheran Youth of North Seattle (LYONS), an opportunity to more fully understand our potential to make a difference, spreading God's message of compassion and service. As humans we have the obligation to provide assistance and kindness to others. The people of New Orleans showed their gratitude, insisting that the impact of 38,000 pairs of hands and hearts would be significant for their devastated communities.

One day our driver told us that she had driven her charter bus for evacuation purposes during the hurricane. She said

it was the most horrific event she had lived through. She witnessed people aggressively trying to survive and find security. She thanked us for coming and stated that our presence was a blessing simply because it reminded them that others were still concerned for their well-being four years after the event... Our world, today, suffers with countless issues, and the overwhelming quantity can distract us from providing adequate support to each matter individually. Some of these people feel as if they have been left behind. God's work must be fulfilled by us; he encourages us to face adversity and witness the tribulations found in our

A Word From The Bishop



Let no one despise your youth, but set the believers an example in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity. Until I arrive, give attention to the public reading of scripture, to exhorting, to teaching. Do not neglect the gift that is in you, which was given to you through prophecy with the laying on of hands by the council of elders.

Luke 21: 3-4 NRSV

I am hearing from some of you that this recession is affecting the way you are planning and carrying out your ministry.

At the Synod expression we are reviewing our financial policies so that we have our order of payments known and our contingency plans in place. All of this is good business sense and is necessary in these times.

I also want to raise a theme that I am finding somewhat lacking in the current discussions. Stewardship is about God and God's blessings to us. It is secondarily about budgets and orders of payment. Left to our own choices, there would never be enough money to do the things we are called to do. Giving is about God.

To paraphrase the letter of John, we give because God first gave to us. The question is still what is God up to with us and through us in the world. At the ELCA Youth Gathering I reconnected with Pastor Bruce Davenport of St. John #5 Faith Church in the 7th Ward of New Orleans.

I was first introduced to Bruce and his family by Pastor Glen Aaberg, Cross and Crown in Renton, when Bruce and his family visited in Seattle last year. Bruce is an African-American Pastor working in one of the poorest communities in New Orleans. His church is responsible for an HIV/AIDS testing center, a mentoring program,

clothing distribution and works with troubled teens, pregnant teens and pre-teens. This work is done from a church building that was significantly damaged by Katrina. He is a regular fixture on the streets of the 7th Ward.

I know that Bruce does not have the money he needs to do all that he is attempting to do. In conversation with him the talk was all about what God is using him and his congregation to do “in the hood”. His talk was all about God. Obviously he is finding money to do his work, but his talk is not about the money, it is about God’s work. I am sure that Bruce and I do have theological differences. That being said, he is a brother in Christ who is acting on the ELCA tag line “God’s Work, Our Hands”.

It is important that we be financially wise in the coming days. It is more important that we remember that we are the church. God continues to bless us. Our financial stewardship is a strong statement of faith in the call and equipping that already comes from God.

world. We cannot leave God's work undone; he gave us a mission—to take action to relieve suffering and to never forget about those who continue to suffer.

Every night a massive flood of youth ran through the gates of the Superdome for the evening mass gathering. The program began with a combination of energizing and reflective songs which most energetically sang and danced to. The speakers seemed to address the mass of youth individually, making each person feel more empowered. Their inspirational stories of struggles overcome by hope caused an overwhelming silence throughout all four levels of the stadium. This mutual respect was overpowering. We were all there for one reason—to serve and spread God's love...

Regardless of the day's difficulties—the heat and humidity, our own exhaustion, or the heartbreak of witnessing destruction and dire circumstances—this program helped to restore an excitement in all of us, giving us an enthusiasm to continue serving and observing the hardships of the world that require the work of our hands.

On our service day, we were given the task to survey neighborhoods. We were told to talk to the youth of the houses and ask what sorts of recreational activities they enjoy and what they believed their community needed. While my group was surveying, we met a spirited, chatty lady who immediately summoned us inside for water and

to show us her home. She was the most hospitable. She stressed how important it was that volunteers came to provide support to these communities. She was tremendously grateful that a missionary group from New York came down to New Orleans to help her. However, she also knew that many other people didn't receive as much aid. She said, "If your group could bring one family home, this whole effort would be enough."

Afterwards, we listened to a young 16-year old speak as we toured the Ninth Ward. She spoke of her personal experiences as a young child surviving through Hurricane Katrina, the distress, death, violence, and hopelessness with such ease and acceptance that it shocked most of us. These gracious, lovely people, struck quickly with adversity, couldn't avert their eyes from the damage awaiting them in their hometown. They had two choices: to face the destruction caused by Hurricane Katrina or leave their lives behind. I cannot picture dealing with similar situations that these people were forced to handle. If anything, people lucky enough to be spared such difficulties should give themselves to the cause. That's the least we could do.

Walking around French Quarter, we experienced the vibrancy of glittery street performers, the antique, intriguing Mardi Gras shops, and café du monde with the trumpet player playing spiritual anthems. We experienced the city in its triumphs and its hardships which gave us a greater perspective on how much work has been left undone. We witnessed locals attempting to renew their spectacular city. There was a sense of hope, as if we could not only fully restore New Orleans, but spread faithful assistance, justice, and love to others as well throughout our lifetime.
