### Earn Dollars Through The Health

### Assessment

As I hope you've heard, synods, seminaries and churchwide ministries have the opportunity again in 2009 to earn a 2% discount on ELCA health contributions by achieving 75% Mayo Clinic Health Assessment participation.

Here are a few things to note about the discount in 2009:

- The 2009 assessment is open Jan. 1 - Sept. 30 on the EmbodyHealth webportal at www.elcaforwellness.org.
- Your 75% health assessment participation comes from ELCA-primary plan members and eligible spouses. ELCA Medicareprimary plan member are encouraged to complete the assessment, but do not

- count toward your 75% participation.
- Each synod, seminary and churchwide ministry starts at zero. The percentage of your ELCA-primary plan members and eligible spouses who took the assessment in 2008 does not count toward your 2009 participation. The slate has been wiped clean and everyone is starting fresh.
- Those achieving 75% participation between Jan. 1 March 29 will receive the discount for the entire year (retroactive to January). Those reaching it after March 29 will receive the discount starting the month after reaching 75% health

### A Word From The Assistant to the Bishop



"You are the light of the world. A city on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven.

Matthew 5:14-15 NRSV

The packages have all been opened; some of the toys have already been broken. The cookies and candies are all gone (mostly to waist) and our resolutions to lose that "waist" have already been broken as well. The lights, decorations and the tree have been boxed or discarded, the needles have been vacuumed out of the carpet, the holly and greens, the

red ribbons, and the Christmas music have been shelved for another year. All of the outward signs of Christmas are gone...but we still live in the days of Epiphany... the Greek word meaning "appearance."

So how does Christmas make its "appearance" in January and February and the rest of the year? You know the answer; through the body of Christ. So the question we must ask ourselves is: How does our congregation, the part of the body in which we reside, reveal Jesus? How do we "appear" to our world, to our communities and neighborhoods, to our families?

Some congregations within our synod are making Christ known around the world. Edmonds in Edmonds, Trinity in Lynnwood and Trinity in Freeland are partners in providing wells for clean drinking water in Africa. Already they have received thank you notes from villages that now have "water without worms." Grace in Des Moines has led the ELCA in funding ELCA World

### Gethsemane Update

Last November members of Gethsemane in Seattle overwhelmingly voted to redevelop the church's structures and allow approximately 40 units of affordable workforce housing to be built on site.

To accomplish the redevelopment, Gethsemane has entered into an agreement with the Lutheran Alliance to Create Housing (LATCH).

The development includes remodeling of the existing sanctuary and the basement below it, and includes new construction of a two-story wing to house church fellowship and administration functions. The church plans to lease the air space above the new wing to LATCH who will construct approximately 40 units of affordable housing. Construction is targeted to begin in September 2010 with completion set for December 2011.

Seeking opportunities to provide affordable housing has long been a goal of Gethsemane, seeds that were planted in 1990 as one of the founding churches of LATCH. Gethsemane's renovation includes plans to expand on its current social ministry programs.

Hunger. Shepherd of the Valley in Maple Valley has made an annual trip to a village in Nicaragua providing food and medical supplies to a whole community. Several other congregations have built relationships in Guatemala, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Russia and China. These congregations will tell you that

the satisfaction they receive in this effort has strengthened their own faith as they make Christ known in a tangible way.

Many congregations in our synod are connected to their communities and neighborhoods directly through local food banks and meal programs. As we sit in the synod office, we are reminded weekly of the number of people who are nourished by Christ through bread as St. John United hosts a hot meal at lunch time. Prince of Peace and Bethel. both in Shoreline, Morningstar in Monroe and Central in Seattle also have ongoing meal programs at their churches. Gethsemane in Seattle has meals and movies on Saturday for people who live downtown on the streets or in lowincome accommodations. Some of those same churches also provide shelter at night. Immanuel in Seattle has a regular community of residents in recovery in partnership with the Matt Talbot Center in Seattle. These congregations have found that the epiphany of God, that is, the appearance of Christ in the work they do, has attracted new people to the congregation who are inspired by faith in action.

Other congregations support their communities through our extended ministries: Lutheran Community Services, Lutheran Alliance to Create Housing, Compass Center, Lutheran Public Policy Office, Lutheran Campus Ministry, Hearthstone Retirement Center, Bethany of the Northwest, Josephine Sunset Home, Columbia Lutheran Home, and Foss Home and Village. Every year each of these organizations invite congregations to join in their ministry through regular funding and volunteer participation. Gethsemane,

Crown, and Northlake have partnered with LATCH to create housing on or adjacent to church property making it possible to continue the relationship with people who receive LATCH services. St Luke's, Bellevue, University Lutheran and St. John United have been consistently faithful in their support of LPPO. Thirty or forty congregations provide visitors, board members, and funding for our nursing homes. Peace in West Seattle, Faith in Everett and Prince of Peace, SeaTac have taken leadership roles in their support of Lutheran Community Services. Congregations which actively make Christ known through these agencies and organizations find that everyone in the congregation can participate at some level and it helps to focus the mission of the congregation outward.

Some congregations focus on the nurture and faith formation of families. Trinity in Lynnwood and Edmonds in Edmonds support the Jeremiah Center which ministers primarily to unchurched young people. Glendale in Burien and Faith in Redmond have established a grade school affiliated with their congregation. First of Richmond Beach in Shoreline, Edmonds in Edmonds, St. Paul's in Shorewood, Trinity in Lynnwood, First in Mount Vernon, Zion in Kent, Gloria Dei in Alderwood Manor have preschools and kindergartens affiliated with their congregations, which they have found an asset in ministering to families in their congregation as well as in the community.

There are many more ways to make Christ known as we celebrate Epiphany, the season of making Christ known but for disciples of Jesus Christ, Epiphany is not a season, Epiphany is our calling. As we move into Lent, let's continue to consider new ways as well as old that each of us can "make Christ known."

### Looking Back at 2008

### Lutheran Disaster Response

(excerpt from Year in Review on LDR's website at www. ldr.org) What a year! In the early spring, it seemed like tornadoes were going to be the main cause of human need for the year. According to the National Weather Service, there were at least 500 more tornadoes in 2008 than in 2007. Then, the summer brought widespread flooding across the Midwest, where some places experienced 100-year, and even 500-year, flood levels. In Iowa alone, over 40,000 households registered for assistance

through FEMA. The late summer brought one of the most active Atlantic hurricane seasons in recorded history. For the first time ever, six consecutive named storms made U.S. landfall, including the four distinct landfalls of Tropical Storm Fay which caused watches or warnings for the entire Florida coast. Along the way, there was an earthquake and wildfires. And all of this was competing for media attention with a Presidential election and the unfolding of a damaging recession.

Considering all of these things, it might seem that this was a difficult year for Lutheran Disaster Response as a ministry. But though it was not without its challenges, this year was incredible and notable less for the number of disasters and more for the incredible way in which local Lutherans, and Lutheran congregations, stood up and served as Lutheran Disaster Response for their communities. In the midst of one disaster after another, we learned of the courage, strength, and perseverance of Lutherans around the country, and their willingness to be the first form of this ministry to their neighbors in need.
