The Ministry to Chinese Students and Scholars in Seattle is a new mission of the Northwest Washington Synod, which offers Christ to China's future leaders.


We envision large numbers of mainland Chinese students, scholars, and their family members receiving Christian love in practical ways, and hearing an understandable

A Word From The Bishop



If an unbeliever invites you to a meal and you are disposed to go, eat whatever is set before you without raising any question on the ground of conscience. But if someone says to you, "This has been offered in sacrifice," then do not eat it, out of consideration for the one who informed you, and for the sake of conscience. I mean the other's conscience, not your own. For why should my liberty be subject to the judgment of someone else's conscience?

1 Corinthians 10:27-29 NRSV

As we go forward in implementing the decisions of the recent Churchwide Assembly, the question of "bound conscience" must be addressed among us. In some ways this has a very Lutheran sound to it. Martin Luther before the Diet at Worms said, "Unless I am convinced by the testimony of the Scriptures or by clear reason . . . I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience." Luther here introduces the language of bound and captive conscience.

Paul's letter to the church in Corinth speaks of respect for the conscience of the other. Too often the admonition of Paul leads to a debate over whose conscience is strong and whose is weak. I read the text as warning us not to use our freedom to harm the conscience of another person. We are both weak and strong at the same time.

As we move forward in this church, we will need to examine this concept in greater detail. Bound conscience is not a code word for freedom to sin. The law of God will still expose and convict us of sin. The bound conscience calls me to be attentive to the other and their view of sin. Out of love for the neighbor we are called to ask questions about where our consciences are bound. We are to be in communication and listen to the other.

A Word From The Bishop

This concept means it is not about me, it is about the other. God's love is for all of us. God's law speaks to all of us. Your sin and mine may have different symptoms or triggers, but I need to pay attention to how my actions will affect you. This is a call to live in community. It is my faith in Jesus that is a gift from God. It is also your faith. We now live in faith with each other. How will we respect and define our bound consciences will be a question with which we will continue to wrestle.

This fall there are two major statewide issues that voters will face as the informational pamphlets and ballots arrive in October: Initiative 1033 and Referendum 71. (Explanation: an initiative is "from the people" and if approved establishes state law. A referendum is also "from the people" but puts a state law before the people for a vote of approval or disapproval.)

Initiative 1033 concerns state, county and city revenue. This measure would limit growth in state, county, and city revenues deposited and subject to a state expenditure limit. This limit would be adjusted based on annual growth in inflation and population. This limit would exclude voter-approved revenue increases. Revenues that come in above the limit would be used to help reduce property tax levies.

The statewide council of the Lutheran Public Policy Office (LPPO) has decided to oppose this measure. Our primary reason is that this measure, if enacted, would not only severely limit the amount of revenue local and state governments can raise but would have the indirect consequence of potentially decimating basic services normally funded by government such as public safety.

Referendum 71 concerns the extension of marital rights to same gender partnerships and heterosexual partners over 62. This bill (SB 5688) was passed by the legislature and signed by the governor and only affects state registered domestic partnerships. General areas that this law addresses are health care related decisions, hospital visitation, etc.

LPPO statewide council decided to endorse referendum 71. Our primary reason is that we believe on the basis of equally, fairness and economic justice that state registered partnership should be entitled to the same basic rights that state registered marriages are privileged to have.

The Rev. Dr. George W. E. Nickelsburg, professor emeritus of Religion at the University of Iowa and internationally known New Testament scholar, will lead a three-week series on the Gospel of Luke.
