

## **Message from Bishop Jaech**

## The Gift and Responsibility of Good Government



As Lutherans we cherish Martin Luther's insight and emphasis concerning the priesthood of all believers. Luther said that it is not only the priest that serves God, but we all serve God in response to the call we received in our baptisms. Our priestly service

itself through the specific roles or vocations that we choose: teacher, medic, parent, businessperson, scientist, carpenter, hi-tech worker, etc. Among these vocations, Martin Luther specifically mentioned the city mayor (burgermeister) and all government officials. Government, said Luther, is one of the institutions that God gives to us to provide a safe and healthy structure to our lives. Its purpose is to support the good and deter the bad in all public affairs. As one of the godly vocations, the Christian community is then called to offer guidance and support to public workers as they do their work.

In early April, I joined with 30 other ELCA bishops who gathered in Washington DC to meet with our congressional leaders. This event was organized and funded by our churchwide ELCA Office on Advocacy. We met with 75 senators and representatives and their top staff, learning about their work and concerns, offering our prayers and support and also voicing our hopes and recommendations on specific issues they are addressing. For example, I work with a team of ELCA bishops who focus on the complex issues in Israel/Palestine. When we were in Washington DC, our specific goal was to inform our government leaders about the important work of Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem and ask for their support for the hospital. Augusta Victoria, operated by the Lutheran World Federation, is the one top quality hospital in Jerusalem that treats Palestinian as well as Jewish patients. One of their specialties is cancer treatment for Palestinians from the West Bank and Gaza Strip who otherwise would have no adequate treatment available to them.

During the two days in Washington DC, I was able to meet with Rep. Denny Heck (who attends Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Olympia), Rep. Derek Kilmer and Rep. Adam Smith. In addition I met with the staff of Representatives Jamie Herrera Beutler and Dave Reichert and Senators Patty Murray and Marie Cantwell. They were all very responsive to the important work of Augusta Victoria Hospital and pledged to support its work. I was thankful that the Rev. Paul Benz, director of Faith Action Network (FAN) in the State of Washington, accompanied me on these congressional visits. FAN (which is a merger of the Lutheran Public Policy Office of Washington and the Washington Association of Churches) is a ministry supported by all three ELCA synods in Washington State including our Southwestern Washington Synod. FAN monitors and supports the work of good government at the state level, just as the ELCA Advocacy Office works at the national level. Like Bread for the World, FAN promotes grass-roots ecumenical and interfaith response to the pressing social needs in our state. Along with supporting FAN in our synod budget, a number of synod congregations are advocating faith communities of FAN. 

### My hope is built on nothing less...

My hope is built on nothing less...

Three things remain, faith, hope, and love...

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

The concept of hope has guided people and communities of faith for centuries, reflected in scripture and hymnody.

Hope orients people of faith toward the future, a future that puts people and communities in a better place. For Christians, that future orientation is established through trust in God, because of what God has done in Christ. Hope is rooted in the resurrection of Jesus, an event that points to the work of God throughout history. It is in that trust of God's action that we orient ourselves toward a future where God continues to act. This is our hope.

The problem with hope in our present context is that it's often attached to a mere wish. We might say, "I hope this turns out well" or, "I hope I get that job" or, "I hope things will get back to normal." The mere wish is to be comfortable. This is not hope. Hope for a Christian is rooted in bold action that trusts God will continue to act. It's amazing what kind of work is possible in life when there is trust. When there is trust, there is hope for a good future. Both God and children of God work together.

The renewal of congregations must be rooted in hope, and not a mere wish to be comfortable. Sometimes we believe that money will make us more comfortable. Money can be a good tool, but without bold, mission-oriented action to serve our neighbor, money does little, if anything in congregations.

Interestingly enough, the Southwestern Washington Synod now has a Hope Fund. Because of the particular future orientation of Hope Lutheran Church in South Tacoma, they knew that their resources would serve their neighbors better if they could resource renewing congregations. In the death and closure of Hope Lutheran Church, new life in serving neighbor can be resourced through the money Hope gifted to the Southwestern Washington Synod. The questions for congregations about whether they are in renewal boil down to a few. Is renewal a wish to be comfortable? Or is renewal rooted in community-specific actions that reflect our trust in God and hope for our neighbors' future? The Outreach Board of the Southwestern Washington Synod will distribute the Hope fund to congregations that boldly embrace such hope, trusting that God will be in their future. Congregations and ministries supported through the Hope Fund will demonstrate vision and capacity to equip disciples, engage in evangelical outreach and form community partnerships. While the Outreach Board can accompany a few congregations with financial support, the Board continues to provide annual educational events for equipping congregational leaders for embracing hope for their future. ## **ELCA's Alt Year Experience**

As a new ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Abundant Life Together provides young adults with a year apart in intentional community to explore vocation through theological, practical, and shared learning that transforms communities as participants grow together through personal reflection, rich relationships, leadership, and service.

While other "gap year" experiences take you deeper into a specific experience (often one specific full-time service), or are very loose about what the experience is (such as a travel gap-year), the ALT Year Experience combines a wide variety of experiences that encourage personal formation, faith exploration, and vocational discernment. The 2013 Pilot Site is in Toledo, Ohio and is hosted by Saint Paul's Lutheran Church in the heart of Toledo. If you are a part of the ALT Year Experience you will spend half of your time in structured community life and half of your time will be free for your own exploration, exercise, and rest. You'll be amazed what we can do together and how much you will grow as a person, through this mix of community structure and personal freedom.

Abundant Life Together is guided by the following core values

Young Adults: we value the strengths, energy, and questions young adults (age 18-25) bring to God's ongoing activity in the world.

- **Cultivating Faith:** we are inspired by the joys and challenges of a relationship with Jesus that leads us into an adventure of faith given through the gift of the gospel.
- Courageous Experimentation: we promote creativity, curiosity, critical reflection, and proactive initiative as a way of living out discipleship at the intersection of church and culture.
- Abundant Community: we value the wisdom and gifts discovered through relationships and collaboration between the host communities, ALT participants, and local congregations, bringing people together of different generations, cultures, and life-experiences.
- Vital Partnerships: we value the community and mutuality that forms when trust and respect
  permeate our relationships with each other and with the local and larger church, allowing for
  growth, learning, and transformation.

There is currently no tuition cost for an ALT Year. The ELCA is seeking to make this experience as inexpensive as possible so every young adult can have the opportunity to participate. The generosity of the ELCA, partner synods, partner congregations, and generous donors provide for the cost of administration, the director's salary, and the national and local budgets.

Participants are asked to pay for Living Expenses for the 9 month experience, which includes room, food, supplies, travel costs, and a monthly stipend-about \$5000. A portion of that cost is expected to come from a participant's own summer earnings or savings. To learn more www.altyear.org

## Ambassador Daniel V. Speckhard Named President and CEO of Lutheran World Relief

Baltimore, April 11, 2014 – Ambassador Daniel V. Speckhard, of McLean, Va., will be the next president and chief executive officer of Lutheran World Relief (LWR), effective July 1. Speckhard succeeds the Rev. Dr. John Nunes, who served from 2007 to 2013. Speckhard will be the fifth president in LWR's 69-year history.

Currently a senior advisor at Palantir Technologies and a non-resident senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, Speckhard has served in various high-level diplomatic roles in both Republican and Democratic administrations. Most recently, he was U.S. ambassador to Greece from 2007 to 2010. He has also served as deputy chief of mission at the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad, director of the Iraq Reconstruction Management Office, deputy assistant secretary general for political affairs at NATO, and the U.S. ambassador to Belarus. Earlier in his career he was an expert on foreign assistance programs and the challenges facing countries in transition. He speaks Russian and French and is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the Atlantic Council.

Speckhard holds master's degrees in economics and in public policy and administration from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

## **New President/CEO for Lutheran Community Services NW**

Following an extensive nationwide search, the Board of Directors of Lutheran Community Services Northwest (LCSNW) has selected David Duea (pronounced "dew 'ee") as their new President/CEO, effective July 1st.

David comes to LCSNW from HopeSparks Family Services in Tacoma, were he has been President/CEO since 2001. He has served in the non-profit field since graduating from Pacific Lutheran University in 1989 with a Bachelor's degree in Social Work. David has extensive experience working with non-profits that focus on youth and families. His passion is seeing hearts restored. His Lutheran roots run deep and you could say that his affinity for social ministry is even in his DNA - his father, Bob Duea, was Executive Director of Lutheran Family Service of Oregon in the late 1970's and early 1980's, and later worked for Lutheran Social Services of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. # **Aligning Carbon Neutrality Goals with Educational Mission: Onsetting**

Pacific Lutheran University is piloting an educational and participatory program to begin mitigating one of the largest contributors to PLU's carbon emissions – study abroad air miles. When the new president reaffirmed PLU's commitment to carbon neutrality by 2020 by



signing the American College and University President's Climate Commitment (ACUPCC), the study away and sustainability centers partnered to meet this goal in a meaningful manner. Global education is a pathway to distinction at PLU. However, as a result our study away program contributes 19.4 percent of the university's total carbon footprint at over 3,700 MTCO2e.

PLU entered a short video highlighting climate innovations on campus. The contest is part of the ACUPCC. Planet Forward is partnering with Second Nature to host this Climate Leadership Awards Video Voting Competition. <u>Second Nature</u>, which seeks to create a sustainable society by transforming higher education, has selected the top climate-related ideas from colleges across the country. ## **Congregation Happenings**

#### **Route 56ers in Vancouver**

Route 56 is **Family of Christ, Vancouver**'s 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade youth group that uses the theme: "Route 56-Driving with God in Faith, Fun, and Service". Congregational Life Ministries Coordinator, Susan Dollinger, has empowered the kids to help each other learn about their partnership with Good Samaritan Ministries, of Beaverton, Oregon, who works with two schools in Zambia to help build desks for the children.

They learned that the children from Zambia have lost one or both of their parents, often to AIDS. Dollinger said, "Zambia is one of the world's poorest countries, but students there really want to learn. Some children will walk two hours to get to school and then sit on stumps and write on their laps. The Route 56'ers asked the congregation to bring in their empty bottles and cans, which were sorted, cleaned and given to people at Good Samaritans Ministries". The money from the bottles and cans go to carpenters in Zambia to build the desks for \$10 each (equivalent to 200 cans and bottles). These desks also serve as church pews on Sundays. Some money is also set aside for repairs to the schools that they work with.

Dollinger happily announced that, "as of today, the 5th and 6th graders have collected and processed 1700 cans and bottles and more are coming in. They will celebrate the joy of exceeding our goal by talking about: how it feels to set a goal and achieve it; how they saw God in the service project; how it feels to do a service project, especially for other children; and how this has made a difference in their own lives and in the lives of others."

Our Saviour's, Bremerton supports "OneChurch-One Family", a strategic partnership with local churches providing financial assistance to homeless families in Kitsap County. The mission of OneChurch-One Family is to demonstrate the love of God in Kitsap County by bringing homeless families into nurturing relationships with support teams from Kitsap County's churches, resulting in the families' ability to obtain long term housing, increasing their growth and stability. The church helps to provide a home for families to live in and then the church serves as mentor to provide spiritual and emotional support until that family can get back on their feet. Our Saviour's also partners with Kitsap Community Resources and Youth For Christ that do all of the pre-qualifying of the families. 74% of the families they work with move on to permanent or transitional housing.

**Faith, Elma-** Almost 25 years ago, the first Sunday of the month was designated as Pantry Sunday when they give non-perishable food and other items to food banks in Elma, Montesano and MCleary. They've continued this every month for the past 25 years.

**Faith, Shelton-The "Waves of Change" program takes** spare change on the second Sunday of every month in an effort to support the development of sustainable, clean water sources and provide funding for water transport, purification and storage for selected people through the world where water is not readily available. In February, they brought in over \$362 on that one Sunday.
