Taking Care Of Our Veterans

The Compass Veterans Center in Renton (located above Luther's Table) opened just over a year ago. By Veterans Day (November 11) 2010 all of the 58 apartments were occupied by veterans and veterans with families.

Since that time, 89 adults and 29 children have called the Center home.

Our children's advocates are doing a terrific job creating fun programming for the kids. They have gone on field trips, created art, and hosted birthday and holiday parties. They have also had youth groups and churches visit to provide meals and lead activities.

Residents at the Veterans Center are building a strong community. They have organized their own weekly BINGO game which has been held consistently for more than 7 months. There is also a weekly women's group that does art and other activities.

And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.
Luke 2:7 NRSV

As you read the Biblical passage that leads into this column I ask you to remember that this is the season of Advent, which is the season of preparation. The fact that there was no room in the inn is well known to us. We quickly create romanticized pictures of a clean and peaceful stable. The fact is that Mary and Joseph were homeless when Jesus was born.

I write this coming from the annual meeting of the denominational executives and the Governor's office in Olympia. The news on the economic front for this state is sobering. There will be more significant cuts in state spending. I am well aware that this synod has members on all sides of the political divides. I am not proposing a solution to the state budget woes.

I am looking at the reality that the cuts in services will impact many of the people who are already coming to your congregation for help. We should use this Advent to prepare for those who will be coming. This could be the homeless, the hungry or those who cannot afford health care. They will be coming and we have a long history of helping in a variety of ways.

Now is the time for congregations and ecumenical associations to begin the discussions on how the people of God will respond to our neighbors in need.

Each community is different and one size does not fit all. The fact is that we are called to feed the hungry, clothe the naked and visit those imprisoned, even those

imprisoned in their own bodies due to poor health.

The coming years will be difficult and we can argue about how we got here and how best to fix the problem. The fact is that those most affected by this situation will be coming to us. We are the keepers of the inn. Do we have room?

Letter To The President On

Immigration Reform

November 1, 2011

Dear President Obama:

As the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and a member of the Advisory Council on Faith-based and Neighborhood Partnerships, I write to lift up the support of our national church body for comprehensive immigration reform and the DREAM Act.

We are a church that belongs to Christ, and we believe God calls each of us by name. Therefore, the ELCA has repeatedly affirmed the biblical witness and our shared experience of working with and on behalf of America's newcomers through our ministry with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service.

The 2011 Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA voted overwhelmingly in support of immigration reform and the DREAM Act. The churchwide assembly is the ELCA's highest legislative authority serving on behalf of 4.2 million baptized ELCA members.

The biblical call to hospitality also inspired Lutheran congregations across the country to discuss transforming communities into centers of hospitality through relationship building and advocacy. In addition, congregations are holding DREAM Act Sabbaths to lift up the experiences of undocumented youth and encourage broader public support for the legislation.

The need to overhaul the U.S. immigration system is becoming ever more urgent. In the absence of comprehensive immigration reform, states have felt compelled to write their own immigration laws, which are often shortsighted and misguided. The ELCA needs your leadership. We urge you to continue to speak to Congress and the American public to take action on comprehensive

immigration reform and the DREAM Act and to explore other compassionate policy reforms that advance the common good.

As a national church body, the ELCA -- our congregations, bishops, schools and millions of individual members -- continues to preach, teach, advocate and work with and on behalf of America's newcomers. This nation has achieved such greatness due to the resilience, labor and intellect of immigrants. We will roll up our sleeves and work tirelessly until this nation is once again a place of welcome and justice for newcomers.

The ELCA has pledged \$250,000 to support Lutheran World Relief's (LWR) anti-malaria work in Tanzania through the Lutheran Malaria Initiative (LMI).

Malaria is a devastating disease that kills nearly a million people a year, mostly children under age 5. Spread through the bites of infected mosquitoes, malaria is preventable and treatable. LMI is part of a global effort to end malaria deaths by 2015.

LWR works with its longtime partner, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT), to educate people about prevention, symptoms and treatment of malaria.

Since 2007, the project has reached more than 1.7 million people across 13 ELCT dioceses with critical information about prevention and treatment.

- **Members of Kent Lutheran in Kent** participated in this year's Crop Hunger Walk which has raised more than \$13,000. H.O.M.E and Kent Community Supper will receive 25% and 75% goes to Church World Service.
- During November members at **University in Seattle** are serving lunch for Community Lunch on Capitol Hill every Friday. And, in December, members at **Central in Seattle** will be rolling up their sleeves to prepare and serve a good hot meal each Tuesday and Friday for the hungry. More than 200 impoverished and homeless people are fed twice a week through this program located at Central in Seattle.
