DISCUSSION

Every Luther League carries on thods, although it is known that they involve more than talking at random. Certain educators and group leaders are giving serious consideration to improving the art of discussion.

Organized discussion has been called "cooperative education", "an exercise in concerted thinking." It is not two-sided as in a debate. Discussions are sometimes called round-table, and in fact experienced leaders recommend the seating of the participants in a circle as more conductive to mutual stimulation than to have them sitting in straight rows.

Psychologists tell us that we learn Psychologists tell us that we learn by doing. What we learn is what we do, One value to be gained by discuss-ion is the practice in clear thinking, effectively expressed. The ability to talk about spiritual truths is worth developing and needs to be carried over from the discussion group to conversation anywhere.

Members of the group should contribute from their own viewpoints to the development of a mutually euriched whole. Discussions should develop tolerance and respect for the interest of others. (Walter Bagelot said deas of others. (Walter Bagehot said that the greatest pain in the world is the pain of a new idea.)

Good discussions don't just happen. There are reasons for them. The leader must be well-informed, poised and alert. He should inject questions that evoke thought, but should be wary of expressing his opinion except tentatively, especially during the first part of the discussion. If the leader starts out with his opinion, it puts the members of the group in the position of agreeing or disagreeing with him when they speak. The chairman should bat back the ideas pitched to him and remember that he is only one of a team. The leader should summarize the discussion at convenient points.

Members of a discussion group should be cooperative and prepared if possible on the subject for discussion. Trite but true, people get about as much out of a discussion as they put -Arthur Hillman.
