The Bible Institute of A. L. C. Makes Final Arrangements.

The program for the Bible Institute of the A. L. C. which is to be held at Des Moines, Wash., July 24-30 this summer, has been completed as far as the general outline is concerned.

Accordingly the sessions open at 10:30 Monday morning, July 24, when the Dean gives a short devotional talk on "Seeking Solitude." This is followed by the first Bible study by Rev. O. Gornitzka on the Epistle to the Hebrews. The speaker for the morning devotions are as follows: Tuesday, Rev. A. K. Vinge; Wednesday, Dr. C. R. Swanson; Thursday, Rev. A. P. Strommen; Friday, Rev. C. Arthur Johnson; Saturday, Rev. E. C. Knorr.

The Campfire talks in the evenings are given by Rev. Enoch Sandeen, dean of the Institute, Rev. Theo. Hokanstad, Rev. E. R. Pfneger and Rev. Carl Lund. The "Tacoma Trio" will be in charge of the music during the week and on Sunday morning and Mrs. Carl Soderman of the Institute Chorus. The trio consist of Helge Nelson and Hilda Melia Capen, violin, Clarence Grahm, clarinet and Blanda Melin, piano.

Dr. Conrad Bergendoff has chosen as his lecture subject the Epistle of James and as topics for the evening talks: "The Roots of the Christian Life," "The Cultivation of the Christian Life," and "The Fruits of the Christian Life." The evening subjects of Rev. Gornitzka are: "Our Relation to God, to Sin, and to the World" and "Planning of our Life." Rev. L. Ludwig of Portland has definitely accepted the invitation to speak Sunday morning, July 30.

The Luther League Hour under the leadership of Rev. Elmer Johnson will have at least three interesting special features: a character reading of "The Rock" by Mrs. Ralph Ostrom, a lecture on the History of our Bible by Judge Adams Beeler of the State Supreme Court and "The Ideal Luther League Program."

Commencement Exercises at Pacific Lutheran College.

Pacific Lutheran College completed a very successful school year with beautiful and impressive exercises May 27 to 29, when 58 graduates received their diplomas.

Commencement festivities began immediately after the close of the final examinations, May 28, with a school picnic at Spanaway Lake.

Prens Delivers Baccalaureate Sermon.

The Rev. J. C. K. Prens, educational director of the Norwegian Lutheran Church of America, preached the baccalaureate sermon. With the college motto "Build for Character", as a starting point, the speaker pointed out three characteristics of a Christian character: a tender conscience enlightened by the Word of God, a Christian outlook on life, based on a deep understanding of the Scriptures, and a full and rich prayer life, in which the individual lives in daily communion with

God. The "Choir of the West" sang three numbers. The college pastor, Rev. O. Svane conducted the liturgical services. Lewis G. Hunter played a violin solo and Walter Ustad, soloist of the college choir, sang.

Superintendent Showalter Speaks.

Dr. Noah D. Showalter, State Superintendent of public instruction, gave the formal address at the commencement exercises Monday evening. In his theme, "The Need of the Hour," he dwelt at length on the importance of Christian institutions in the ideal de-

velopment of American life and civilization. The Rev. O. L. Haavik, President of the board of trustees, gave the invocation; President Tingelstad delivered the address of welcome; Prof. J. O. Edwards, Anna Mikkelsen, and the Faculty Ladies Quartette gave musical numbers.

Despite the financial depression, the school-year just closed has been one of the most successful in the history of the college. The enrollment, 264, is larger by two than last year's, and the morale has been excellent.

THE BIBLE INSTITUTE AT COLTON

The registration for the Bible Institute is larger than usual. A somewhat unique means of advertising the Institute has been used in the interest of economy. Three members of the Colton Luther League, the Misses Margaret Anderson, Vivian and Laura Chindgren, have very successfully presented the Bible Institute to different gatherings of church people by means of sketches of the Bible Institute grounds and activities, by dialogues and songs that have almost recreated the Bible Institute atmosphere. This together with the information that has been brought to the co-operating young peoples organizations by means of the church papers and special folders has evidently created a great deal of interest in the Bible Institute. Much work is being done to prepare the Bible Institute home, the Luther League Park, for the Institute family. The entire population of Colton is being drafted into service to complete the swimming pool in the park. Some days from 30 to 40 men are hard at work on it. This basin will be 125 feet in length, 90 feet wide and 12 feet deep. About 1100 feet of water pipes are being laid to bring drinking water into the park for the convenience of the Institute family.

The Bible Institute will open Sunday, July 16, with divine service at 10:30 a. m. and an opening rally at 3 o'clock p. m., address by Dr. Tingelstad. Rev. Carl S. Odell will conduct Bible studies in the Letter to the Romans from 9:15 to 10:15 every forenoon during the week, except Saturday. Dr. Tingelstad will give the inspirational address each day from 10:30 to 11:15. The last period of the forenoon will be set aside for a so called "Practical Hour." The following pastors will lecture and lead the discussions during these periods: Rev. L. Ludwig, Monday; Rev. Geo. Kochler, Tuesday; Rev. A. M. Knorr, Wednesday; Rev. Martin Olson, Thursday; Rev. Samuel J. Harson, Friday. The morning devotions will be lead by Rev. J. A. Martin and the congregational singing by Rev. A. J. Towe. In addition to the regular evening addresses by the teachers a special musical program will be rendered each evening by one of the co-operating church bodies. A pageant will be given on Saturday evening and plans are being made for a large united chorus to render parts of "Messiah" on Sunday afternoon, July 23. A complete program with registration blanks is being distributed among all co-operating organizations. If notified, the undersigned will gladly send this program to any one who may not have received it as well as any other information wanted concerning the Bible Institute.

The Institute is conducted this year in co-operation with the churches of the American Lutheran Conference and promises to be one of the best to date.

THE RELIGIOUS DRAMA OF THE INSTITUTE

There is a little town in the Bavarian Alps where the villagers, once in ten years, study all the Hebrew traditions and present as an act of worship the Passion of our Lord. To witness this production at Oberammergau for eight hours is to feel that one actually lived at the time of Christ. This year at the Young People's Bible Institute of the American Lutheran Conference at Draper's Park there will be presented scenes from the new Testament characters which will make them more real and human, than ever before.

The "Rock" is a character study of Peter — we find him an ambitious, materialistic fisherman — railing against fate that he cannot sell his fish to the caravans on the four Roman Roads; we leave him after passing thru the fire of the crucifixion a humble Peter — on fire to walk the four Roman Roads and "spread the gospel to every living creature."

This will be followed the next evening by a scene which takes place in the room where the last supper was held. The scene opens with Mary the mother recounting the scenes of the past week as found in Mark. Then Mary Magdalene comes with the news of the resurrection and the two Marys and Suzanna will interpret "The First Day of the Week." This will be followed by a talk on the theme "The new Life" suggested from this Bible scene.

Mrs. Ralph E. Ostrom on Thursday, July 27, at 11:20 a. m. as a part of the Luther League character study of Peter. She will also enact the character of Mary Magdalene in the drama "The First Day of the Week." The character of Mary the mother will be interpreted by Mrs. Robert F. Sandall, director of the Sandall Studio of Speech Arts, that of Suzanna by Gertrude Archer Boettner, dramatic teacher of Everett. The music will be furnished by the First Lutheran church of Ballard of which Prof. Ronald Hooper is director.

DISCUSSION

Every Luther League carries on some discussions, in business meetings and in study hours. Very little attention has been given to discussion methods, although it is known that they involve more than talking at random. Certain educators and group leaders are giving serious consideration to improving the art of discussion.

Organized discussion has been called "cooperative education", "an exercise in concerted thinking." It is not twosided as in a debate. Discussions are sometimes called round-table, and in fact experienced leaders recommend the seating of the participants in a circle as more conducive to mutual stimulation than to have them sitting in straight rows.

Psychologists tell us that we learn by doing. What we learn is what we do. One value to be gained by discussion is the practice in clear thinking, effectively expressed. The ability to talk about spiritual truths is worth developing and needs to be carried over from the discussion group to conversation anywhere.

Members of the group should contribute from their own viewpoints to the development of a mutually enriched whole. Discussions should develop tolerance and respect for the ideas of others. (Walter Bagehot said that the greatest pain in the world is the pain of a new idea.)

Good discussions don't just happen. There are reasons for them. The leader must be well-informed, poised and alert. He should inject questions that evoke thought, but should be wary of expressing his opinion except tentatively, especially during the first part of the discussion. If the leader starts out with his opinion, it puts the members of the group in the position of agreeing or disagreeing with him when they speak. The chairman should bat back the ideas pitched to him and remember that he is only one of a team. The leader should summarize the discussion at convenient points.

Members of a discussion group should be cooperative and prepared if possible on the subject for discussion. True but true, people get about as much out of a discussion as they put into it. —Arthur Hillman.
