In West Africa, a *griot* is a storyteller, a singer, a history keeper and an agent of cultural change. It is a role honored throughout the region.


Dianne Johnson, Associate in Ministry, Lord of Life in Renton, may not look like your typical griot, but she has joined the West African tradition — and she's telling the story of malaria at churches, synod assemblies and house parties.

It all started when Dianne was asked to post a sign-up sheet for a mission trip to Tanzania. Before she knew it, she joined the trip herself. It would be just the first of three trips to the country to offer her aid in schools and in health clinics through the Lutheran Church in Morogoro, Tanzania.

Dianne was excited to learn about the Lutheran Malaria Initiative (LMI), a partnership between LWR, the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS), and United Nations Foundation to end malaria deaths in Africa by 2015. Her congregation...was already active with the LWR Quilt & Kit Ministry, and the LMI gave her another way to mobilize her friends to help people suffering from malaria. A Word From The Bishop



The Rev Wm Chris Boerger

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Micah 6:8 NRSV

This verse from the prophet Micah is often quoted when the church addresses social issues. It is a foundation verse for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's "policies and procedures for addressing social concerns". We are called by God to be engaged in issues of justice and kindness as we live out our faith in Jesus.

The issue of social statements always brings out differences of opinion among

members of Christ's church. The Living into the Future Together task force of the Churchwide organization is proposing that the 2011 Churchwide Assembly adopt a review of the process of adopting social statements and until that review is completed that no social statements be adopted by this church.

There will be a proposed social statement, *Genetics*, *Faith and Responsibility*, acted upon at this assembly. I invite you to read this proposed statement and communicate with the members of that assembly from this synod in advance of the 2011 Churchwide Assembly. (See page 3 for those attending.) The complete text is available online at www.elca.org/assembly. You can click on the Actions link to find this and other issues coming to the assembly.

Work has already begun on the next proposed study: criminal justice. While the process of adopting it is undergoing review, the work of preparing it has begun. The first step in this process is engaging in study around the issue. The study guide *Hearing the Cries, Faith and Criminal Justice* is now available. This guide is for use in congregations, small groups, cluster studies or individual study. The response form is to be submitted by October 15, 2011.

This is one way in which members of this church can and do have input into the content of these statements. I invite you to engage in this study and submit a response to the task force that will write the draft statement. The prophet Micah spoke the word of the Lord to Israel and Judah and to us. Defining justice, kindness and humility are part of our call to be children of God. These are not simple discussions. They are necessary because God has called us to this work. There is much more that we should do. Our Social Statements are only the beginning. I invite you to this work.

LPPO Reflection

For the past year, the Lutheran Public Policy Office has shared a seminary intern, Ryan Cosgrove, with St. John United in North Seattle. This month's newsletter from the LPPO is part of and of the year reflection

Ryan's end of the year reflection.

My time at the Lutheran Public Policy Office is quickly coming to a close. It isn't hard to remember those first few days in the office. Overwhelmed by the workload and all the names of church leaders being casually tossed around. Over time I was able to settle in though, and what I saw was inspiring; the body of Christ living the baptized life.

Justice has always been important to me. I've always been inspired by those brave people who used their voice to advocate for the care of all people, especially the most vulnerable. I remember reading about Rosa Park's refusal to move to the back of the bus and being deeply moved.

Before this internship began, though, I think I had a bit of a naive understanding of these moments of justice. I had always imagined they sprang up immediately. That view, though, ignores all the planning, all the work that went into making that moment on the bus real and meaningful.

This year I've gotten to be a part of many important, but subtle, moments of social justice. I've seen how gently God works to make powerfully loving change in our world. I've spoken to people who have been calling these representatives for years about affordable housing, people who been gathering anyone interested together to raise awareness about human trafficking that happens in the Seattle ports. And the list could go on and on.

Slowly it dawned on me. These basement meetings over coffee are places where God is working. Meaningful change is going to take time, but when those moments are ripe, I can think of a number of congregations and people who will be ready to act.

I keep coming back to all those people working thanklessly and unrecognized day in and out to feed the hungry and change the structures that create hunger; these members of the body of Christ living the baptized life. I've been changed by these people, and I am thankful.

ELCA World Hunger does more than just give food to people who are hungry: it addresses the root of the problem. In addition to relief programs, ELCA domestic hunger grants fund projects in organization and development that strengthen the foundations of communities impacted by hunger and poverty.

In 2010 *Community Lunch on Capitol Hill* was one of the recipients. They received a \$2,000 grant. *Community Lunch on Capitol Hill* provides hot, nutritious, and highquality meals—on a shoestring budget—to hundreds of homeless and low-income people of Seattle. By sharing lunch twice a week, the congregation creates a community together.
