FINE PROGRAM PREPARED FOR CONFERENCE CONVENTION

According to preliminary announcement of the Conference Luther League convention to be held at the Bethel church, Seattle, Sept. 3-5, the program will be of unusual interest. A light supper will be served in the church Saturday night between six and seven thirty o'clock, followed by a brief devotional and business session.

Sunday morning services will be held in all the churches of the city and visiting pastors are in charge of the services. The main service is held in the Bethel church, however, Rev. Carl A. V. Lund preaching the sermon. At three o'clock p. m. a great mass meeting is held when Rev. Carl Olson of Central Lutheran church will deliver the address and a large chorus sing. In the evening the three districts vie for oratorical honors.

Monday, labor day, promises to be a delightful vacation for the young people. An excursion on the beautiful Puget Sound has been planned by the Bethel leaguers, and hopes for a wonderful trip are high.

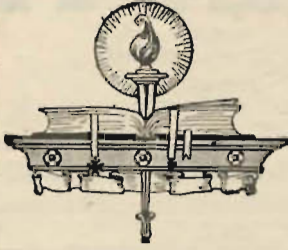
