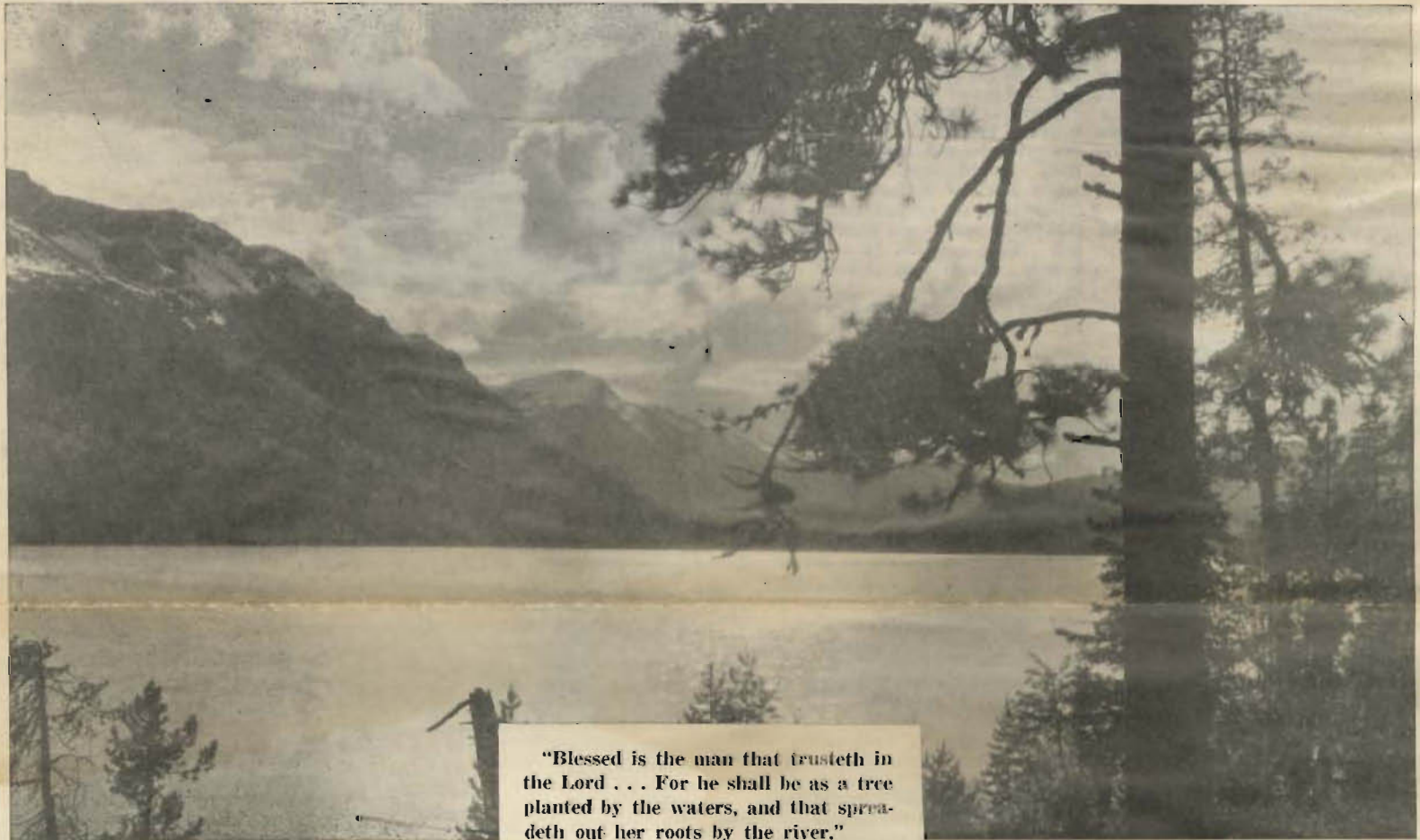

## Church Paper Week Observed October 22-29.

The annual church paper week, instituted by the Augustana Book Concern, Rock Island, Ill., will be observed next week, Oct. 22-29, by all the congregations within the Synod. This movement is purely synodical and does not include the conference papers, although in many instances the membership remembers all the publications, whether of synodical or conference scope. In former years the Columbia Lutheran drive for new subscriptions happened to coincide with the synodical movement, but this year the management has withdrawn from any official participation except for support of the efforts to place a church paper in every home of the Synod.

We take this occasion once more to stress the need of church publications. The Lutheran Companion, being the English spokesman of our church press, is of special interest to our readers. It includes devotional readings for every day, synodical and missionary news, reports of conventions, editorials of synodical scope, Luther

League and Lutheran Brotherhood programs and suggestions, etc. As such it calls for the attention of all the members of our congregations.

In the meantime the Columbia Lutheran also serves a purpose not to be forgotten. It claims to be a supplement to the Lutheran Companion, not a substitute. No Synodical publication can possibly give complete news of the local work, nor can a sectional magazine cover the entire Synod. A Lutheran Companion AND a Columbia Lutheran should therefore be the ideal for every home.

Without church publications there cannot be a well informed membership. It is a fact that, as far as our own conference is concerned, all the spiritual leaders within the congregations are subscribers to the Columbia Lutheran. Looking outside of the subscription list we find no one deserving the name of a leader. And how could it be otherwise? If a person is not interested enough to pay fifty cents a year for information as to his own work, how could there be interest enough to serve at all? Nearly without exception, there never is.

It has been a pleasure to the management to find that during the last three months only five subscribers have been dropped. Of these, three were lost by death, one because of "No want it" and one because of poverty. In the meantime Hans Fahl of Yakima, Grace Johnson and Elsa Berggren of Spokane, Edith Olson of Portland, Lillian Lekander of Gresham and many others of the local representatives have sent in new subscriptions, and indications are that the near future will bring a long list of new subscribers.

News, articles, poetry, etc. is always welcome. If the C. L. is to be a true conference paper, co-operation is necessary. The editor not only writes and edits the paper, but he arranges the type, sends the bills, solicits advertisements, and worries himself into gray hairs in order to save a good publication for the future. Would it be too much asked, if the various congregations would send news each month before the 10th? Or does nothing happen any more within the conference? Are all the congregations dead?

Some one has asked why the church, and especially the clergy, is "arrogant and abusive toward the movies." The question is a pointed one and we therefore venture to state one of the reasons why: the movies are not conforming to the ideals of the church. Even if there is much good in the films, there is so much that we need to protest against. Or, if you do not believe it, look at the things which we found in looking over the list of films showing in Seattle the last month:

- Blasphemy and comic treatment of religious subjects.
- Travesty of religious rites.
- The institution of marriage treated with contempt.
- Death treated with vulgar flippancy.
- Gross and brutal travesty of prison life.
- Hospital scenes treated with vulgar levity.
- Physiological enormities.
- Suggestive theme acted throughout by children.
- Unrelieved sordid themes.
- Prolonged and gross brutality and bloodshed.
- Scenes in and connected with houses of ill-repute.
- Lives of thoroughly immoral men and women.
- Collusive divorce.
- Stories in which the criminal element is predominant.
- Habitual youthful depravity.
- Habitual immorality.
- Are things like those conducive to Christian character?

### Religious Education for Our Young People in the State Schools.

Acknowledging that a great many of our Lutheran young people deem it necessary to attend a state institution in order to acquire the particular education they desire there arises this extremely important problem "What about their religious education?"

Shall we let our young folks attend some one of the reformed churches in order to satisfy their religious wants and longings or, as the case often is,—shall we let them forget entirely about "that dear old church" during their years at a state university?

Though there are many students who wander astray, we rejoice to say that among the many students there is a large number of them from Christian homes who directly affiliate themselves with the Lutheran Church in the town and with at least one of the activities of that church. These students fill the streets on Sunday morning even if there are many who "are too busy" or too shy to go up to the house of the Lord on the Sabbath morning.

But does religious education mean only to have a church located in the vicinity of the school so that the students may worship on Sunday if they choose? Far from it. At no other time is there such an urgent need for con-

stant guidance, the fellowship of kindred students, the explanation of God's words in terms of the student, a study of the "Defense of the Bible" and something with which to combat and explain the secular education which he is endeavoring to comprehend. Not only that, but life away from home among strangers has its "ups and downs" and its manifold temptations and discouragements.

Who alone can help at such times? Only the Savior—that Blessed Redeemer. Somehow, if a student has that Redeemer and a Christian attitude of life those years at school are going to bring back memories of times when prayer was answered, when the Comforter proved very near, and when the religious attitude "paid back in full measure."

Students tend to have confidential talks among themselves. At such times the innermost ideas and opinions are expressed. Very often the talk turns to religion, and, if not religious, the topics are attitudes toward various phases of life. Would such confidential talks mean more if a Lutheran were confiding to a Lutheran? Yes, by far, for their high ideals are somewhat similar and where religion is a vital factor in one's life it will also be expressed in one's opinions.

Here is where the work of a Lutheran Student's Association eventually proves to serve as a "pal" to that laboring student. It causes Lutheran students to find each other and thus friendships can be established. Surely, besides the manifold Spiritual blessings which a Lutheran Students' Association bestows in the way of religious education, the opportunity it provides for Lutheran students to be together is not to be lightly considered.

What has been done? Oregon, my home state, has for the past few years had a pastor, Rev. Wm. Schoeler, who has devoted his whole time to this very important work.

Though laboring under the difficulty of insufficient financial support, Rev. Wm. Schoeler's work has progressed so far that it is really giving to the students Christian comradeship and Christian nurture. Lutheran students can feel that there is "someone who cares" about their Christian welfare.

The extent of this splendid influence cannot be realized unless one compares the past with the present. There is a vast difference.

We hope and pray that the future will reveal to the Christian folks the real place that is being filled by the Lutheran Students' Association.

### Tacoma District Brotherhood To Hold Rally At Tacoma.

According to Dr. John W. Unis, president of the Tacoma District Lutheran Brotherhood, October 25th will be a banner day for the men of the district, if present plans carry. On that day there will be a district rally and dinner held at the First church of Tacoma, Rev. Ernest G. Svenson, pastor. The dinner begins at 6:30 p. m. and will be followed by a brief business meeting. The address will be given by Dr. G. A. Magnusson, president of the conference brotherhood, and a musical program of special interest has been planned for by the local brotherhood. The convention theme is Stewardship and the motto: "The Men for Christ."

Representation is open to all the men of the district and it is hoped that many will avail themselves of this opportunity to come together for fellowship and inspiration. The officers of the district organization are: Dr. John W. Unis, pres., Dr. G. A. Magnusson, v. pres., Mr. Robert Carlson, secr., and Mr. Conrad Haggblom, treas.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Tacoma district is to be held at the

same time, beginning the day previously, and will include the First church, Bethel and Immanuel of Tacoma, Ruston and Auburn. It is also rumored that the District Missionary Society is having a joint rally with the brotherhood in the evening but as we have not received any official program for the general convention, we are not in position to verify the report.

### LUTHERANS OF SEATTLE TO CELEBRATE LUTHER'S BIRTH

Great plans for a worthy celebration of Luther's birth 450 years ago are being made by the Lutheran churches of Seattle. Meetings are being planned in four districts of the city in order to care for the throngs that are expected to gather for this unique celebration.

The date set for this joint memorial is Sunday evening, November 12, at 7:30 o'clock. Only two of the districts have as yet perfected their programs, namely Green Lake and Ballard. In the Green Lake, the meeting will be held at Bethany church, Woodlawn and Latona, and in Ballard at the First Norwegian, W. 65th St. and 20th Ave. N. W. At Bethany the speaker is Dr. E. Beeber of the Pacific Lutheran Seminary, and at Ballard Dr. George Taylor Rygh, former editor of the Lutheran Survey and commissioner to Europe after the war. Dr. Rygh is now a resident of Seattle.

The other meetings will be held at Gethsemane, 911 Stewart, and at Central, 9th and Olive St.

### C. A. Lundreen Ninety Years Old.

Thursday, Oct. 12, a number of friends visited Mr. C. A. Lundreen of Bethany church, Seattle, in commemoration of his 90th birthday. A brief devotional service was held on the occasion during which the pastor referred to the high age attained by Mr. Lundreen and the many opportunities for service that have been his. Mr. Lundreen served as organist in the Lutheran church of St. Charles, Ill., for many years and has proved himself a faithful and efficient servant. His parents were of the old, hardy pioneer stock that knew only victory. In his later months, Mr. Lundreen has weakened considerably and is no longer able to move about freely.

### A MESSAGE TO THE MEN OF THE COLUMBIA CONFERENCE

To the Presidents and members of the Lutheran Brotherhood:

Dear Brethren:—

Attention is called to the following items and it is urged that the same be brought up for thorough discussion by all local Brotherhoods:

1. MEMBERSHIP. Our membership is not what it should be and something should be done to put it on a more stable and definite basis. All the men of the congregation should be members of the Brotherhood so that all may feel that they have a share in furthering its objectives. In the Lutheran Companion of September 16th there is an article entitled "Every Confirmed Member a Brotherhood Member" written by the President of the Augustana Brotherhood. This should be read before the members at a Brotherhood meeting, and the question thoroughly discussed. The Central Board have designated the two weeks of Oct. 15-29 as a time for a campaign to increase membership. The requirements for membership is a matter for each Brotherhood to decide for its own organization. Restrictions that may keep any of the members of the congregation away must be avoided. It would seem best to discontinue per capita annual membership dues and rather place contributions on a voluntary basis.

2. BROTHERHOOD SUNDAY. October 29th has been set aside as Brotherhood Sunday. Your pastor will then, in his sermon, have a special message for the men of the Lutheran Church. Confer with him now and make plans for a special occasion. Arrange for ample publicity so that as many men as possible may be present.

3. EVERY MEMBER CANVASS. This is an important work that should be carried out by the Brotherhood. An efficient organization of the Committee is essential. Watch the Brotherhood page of the Lutheran Companion for suggestions. Articles will be found that should be read before the Brotherhood at meetings and followed by discussions. Organize early and get the work under way in time so that it can be completed well before Christmas.

4. FATHER AND SONS BANQUET. A gathering of this kind should be arranged for in every congregation. If your Brotherhood has not already made arrangements for this, kindly take the matter up for discussion at the next Brotherhood meeting.

5. FOLD BROTHERHOOD PLAN. If your Brotherhood is not already operating under this plan you are urgently asked to try it. You can get from your pastor a copy of the Manual for Lutheran Brotherhoods adopted by the Brotherhood of the Augustana Synod. More copies can be obtained from the Augustana Book Concern.

6. CHURCH PAPER WEEK. October 22-29. One of our church papers should be in the home of every member of the congregation. A committee from the Brotherhood should be appointed to work for this aim and to bring this matter up for discussion at Brotherhood meetings at least once a year.

The Brotherhood should be made an important factor in furthering interests of the congregation. Present day conditions require united and organized effort. May the men of Columbia Conference measure up to the situation that confronts us. A report relative to the work accomplished by the Brotherhood during the year will be asked for before our next Conference meeting.
