Free At Last!

Southern Sudans Struggle for Freedom

Hundreds of thousands sought refuge from the longest civil war in African history. The conflict in Southern Sudan lasted more than 21 years, and by some measures, all the way back to the end of British colonialism in 1956.

Nearly half of the entire population were either killed, or fled in terror to hastily established refugee camps in Kenya, Egypt and Ethiopia. More than two million people simply ceased to exist- an entire generation of young men and boys- along with another million persons displaced around the world. The *Lost Boys Of Sudan* came to represent the tragedy of ethnic

annihilation.

The war finally ended with the signing of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement (CPA) in 2005. Colin Powell represented the United States, and was largely the architect of the final resolution. The CPA mandated a referendum for unity or independence, and the vote was scheduled for January 2011.

January 2011 came with this question: "How can a people consisting of many tribes, decimated by war and starvation, be certain that the referendum will be truly representative and incorruptible?" The Southern Sudanese Referendum

Knowing that the *Soundings* is primarily read by the leaders of our congregations, I want to say thank you to you.

This is an interesting time to be a leader in the church. Much of what we are addressing in congregational and synodical planning was not on our radar when we accepted God’s call to be leaders in the church. Yet these are the times in which we live, and yours are the gifts God knows we need to be the church in these days.

It is easy to reflect on the things we do not have. I am always accused by Jesus’ words to the disciples in the story of the feeding of the 5000, “You give them something to eat.” I quickly join the disciples in trying to excuse my short comings with the “where will we find enough.” The system is not working. We are in trouble.

God still calls us to be disciples in this time. We do have enough. We have the word and the sacraments. We have the story of God’s grace for us. We have Jesus’ command that we make disciples. You are proof that God has given the church what it needs to serve in this time.

The stories of faith and fellowship that I hear when visiting congregations are inspiring. The Holy Spirit is at work in our existing congregations, as well as in our new ministries. It is easy to become discouraged in these times of anxiety and uncertainty. I want to thank you for the faithful leadership that you are providing. You are a gift from God to this community and the world.

We have much yet to do. Before I start sharing ideas about what additional work you and I are called to do, I want to express my thanks to you and to God for your faithful service. I am often the one who shows up when there is conflict or transition in the life of a congregation. I have stopped counting the number of times someone has greeted me with the words, “Are we in trouble?” as I come through the front door. No, you are not in trouble. Your service in Jesus’ name is what the world needs.

We will continue to face challenges in this time of transition. Ministry is hard work. It is the Lord of the harvest who has sent you into this field. God will provide what we need to do the work that is before us. For that I give thanks to God for you.

Money In Your Pocket

Take The Health Assessment

The synod staff in Seattle have all completed the Board of Pensions Mayo Clinic Embody Health Assessment. And it was painless! Join us in being good stewards for ourselves, for the synod, and our congregations by taking the assessment today.

Each congregation in the Northwest Washington synod will receive a 2% discount on contributions for all of 2011 if 65% or more of the eligible ELCA-primary plan members and spouses in our synod complete the online Mayo Clinic Health Assessment by April 30. Our estimated collective savings for 2011 is \$32,000.

Completing the assessment earns you a \$150 credit in your personal wellness account to offset out-of-pocket medical expenses. (I received my check for 2010 this week.) On top of that you have the opportunity to earn an additional \$300 by completing follow-up activities. (Retired persons will not earn credits to a personal wellness account.)

If you have ELCA-primary health benefits, please plan to take a few minutes to complete the assessment. You don't need to know your numbers to complete the assessment. Make your best guess or leave that question blank. If you don't have ELCA-primary health benefits, do your part by making sure the rostered leaders in your congregation have completed their assessment. You will save your congregation and synod money!

The theme for this year's assembly is centered around two ELCA Campaigns: the ELCA Malaria Campaign and the ELCA HIV and AIDS Campaign. Offerings will be given to the two campaigns and, locally, given to the organization African Americans Reach and Teach Health (Learn more on page 6.)

In sub-Saharan Africa, one in five childhood deaths is due to malaria. And AIDS has claimed the lives of more than 25 million people worldwide with sub-Saharan Africa hardest hit by this pandemic. Nominations and resolutions are due to the Synod Office by March 1. The Resolution and Nomination Forms are available on the homepage (under Spotlight) as well as on the Synod Assembly page.

As material becomes available, documents will be posted on-line on the assembly website. Material will not be mailed to congregations prior to the assembly. (Notebooks with the materials posted on the website will be available at the Assembly.)

Voting members, observers, and visitors will again need to *register on-line* through the synod's website.

Dinka, Nuer, Shilluk. Kuku, Acholli, and members of all of the great tribes of Southern Sudan. The staff at the Referendum Center in Seattle, and their counterparts around the world, experienced the joyful cry of “Southern Sudan OYEE!”

Freedom won by an overwhelming margin exceeding 99.5%, and the new nation of Southern Sudan became a reality, created out of a free election after decades of struggle, war and privation

On July 9, 2011, my Sudanese children and I, along with about two hundred of the People, will travel from the United States and Canada to Juba, the new capitol of this great new nation to participate in the birth of Southern Sudan. OYEEEEEEEEEE!
