
April 5th - 7 pm Bethlehem Lutheran Church. Beautiful Bunader by Florence Buck.

The object of this order is: to unite women who wish to preserve Norwegian heritage; to maintain among members a knowledge of the history, culture and language of Norway; and to build a strong support and bond of friendship within the sisterhood.

In April, Embla will celebrate its 94th birthday. We have come a long way! I have been a member for almost 30 years, along with my daughter, Karen Bell. My other daughter, Janine, also joined them, but gave up her membership after getting married and moving to

Olympia. My mother, Mary Rice, was a long time member.

Both my parents grew up in Norway. Mom was from Boda and Dad from Biri. Dad immigrated to America in 1902 and Mom in 1920. My three brothers and I were born and raised in Tacoma. We lived on McKinley Hill in the house my Dad built. There were a lot of gettogethers, picnics and parties with friends and relatives. I thank my parents for my heritage.

I have 5 children: three boys – John, Mark and Arne; and 2 girls – Karen and Janine. My first husband, John Sand, who was of Norwegian descent, passed away after we were married just over ten years. Later, I married Blaine Swieso, who is a duke's mixture or Heinz 57 variety! He has come to enjoy the Norwegian cookies, Rømmegrøt. The big challenge was lutefisk. He has been known to say, "If it's Norwegian, it must be good." We have been married 43 and a half years.

Renew your heritage. I have taken two trips to Norway. In 1984 my children gave me money for Christmas for a trip to Norway. I went in 1985 on Florence Buck's tour. I think she known more about Norway than most Norwegians. Last year I went to Norway to meet relatives on my Dad's side. My two

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daughters, two of my grandchildren and my brother Frank were able to go.

Thirty-four relatives from America met in Lillehammer. We walked around the house my Dad grew up in Biri and visited the church where he was baptized. It was very heartwarming! We met over 100 more relatives and they put on a feast for us at the Honne Konferansesenter. My second cousin, Svein Ruse, was our tour bus drive and his wife, Tordis, our tour guide. Tordis spoke English. What a wonderful two week experience!

I want to keep our heritage strong. We can do this by working, volunteering and helping each other. Embla puts on cooking classes, and we have our own Janet Ruud giving us mini Norwegians lessons. We have members who do Rosemaling and Hardanger embroidery. We participate at Norwegian Heritage Days, the Scandinavians Day and have a St. Hans Fest.

With our and your help, we should have a wonderful 2001!
