JUDITH NELSON HALLINGDAL WORKSHOP

An introduction to Judith Nelson:

Judith Nelson, a Vesterheim Gold Medal winner, was WRA's instructor for the fall workshop at Trollhaugen Monday October 9 through Friday October 13. Judith instructed fifteen WRA members in freehanding Hallingdal.

Judith Nelson began rosemaling classes with Addie Pittelkow in 1975. For the next several years she studies with John Gundersen, a native of Norway, concentrating on Hallingdal which has become her specialty. Judith also has studied with Olav Fossli, Oskar Kjetsa, Gunnar Bø and Nils Ellingsgard.

Judith owned and operated a small retail store named Scandinavian Handcraft from 1978-1984, specializing in the sale of rosemaling and rosemaling supplies. Now she is studying design at the University of Minnesota.

This article is the joint effort of all fifteen painters. Each was asked to write a sentence about their week at Trollhaugen. This was what those participating had to say. (Kathy Anderson, Gudrun Berg, Lois Clauson, Betty Edwards, Anne Freeman, Marie Ganfield, Dolores Haugstad, Dena Iverson, Barbara Laskowski, Naomi Price, Julie Schultz, Bonnie Shannon, Wilda Snider, Ida Mae Swedberg, and Betty Yanak).

If you have never ever been to a WRA Trollhaugen workshop, you are denying yourself an occassion to experience a professional teacher, fun companions, quality projects, good food and unpredictable weather. All the ingredients for a Trollhaughen class and an inspiring week.

Ann put all of us on the right track Monday norning. The jokes did fly and to help those slow to catch the punch line, Ann would hold up her left hand if it was a joke and hold up her right hand if it was a fact. There were so many jokes, Julie couldn't fit them into one sentence. But rest assurred, Judith went home with new material.

Each of us were assigned foods to bring and assigned to prepare a lunch or dinner during the week. The lasagne was so delicious we had it twice. It went down well the second time around much to our delight. So did the cheese cake for breakfast and the popped popcorn left from the late night kitchen raids.

The three walks per day helped (maybe) keep our pounds off. For future reference the Trollhaugen dress code is stretch pants and baggy tops. That is so by mid week you don't have to unsnap your jeans to sit down to the paint table. It may have been cold and nasty on the outside between walk times, but it wa warm and friendly on the inside, especially next to the blazing fire in the fireplace.

Monday morning you will usually feel as though you left your brains at home, but by Wednesday you will have retrieved what is necessary to finish the week. Each of us forgot something important which made life fun. Perhaps it was forgetting paper towels, light bulbs or even food.

The strong emphasis Judith placed on color and design has given all of us a new appreciation of Hallingdal design.

- * Try metallic gold paint mixed into your warm colors. Burnt Umber and metallic gold is a gorgeous color.
- * Those backgrounding in acrylics, try mixing Mushroon, Bright Yellow and Apple Spice for a beautiful green. We dubbed it Puke!
- * You've stipple edges. How about stippling the center of large flower forms?
- * Hallingdal strokes should lay next to each other and not plow through the previous stroke.
- * Do the linework after the design layout has dried or is tacky.
- * Allow only the filler and patterned linework to come clos to the edge of the woodenware, not the primary and secondary design forms.

JURIED SHOW AND EXHIBIT - JANUARY 1990......

Those who have won a Blue Ribbon may compete in that classification again, or may advance to the next classification. However those who have received two Blue Ribbons in the catagory will not be eligible to enter again, but will receive a critique.

CLASSIFICATIONS:

- **Beginner...** Those who have painted 2 years or less. May use pattern or original design.
- Intermediate. Has not taught on a regualr basis, design must be the original work of the artist Intermediates may win two Blue Ribbons in this catagory would then be limited to the Advanced.
- Advanced... Design must be the original work of the artist and no part of the design may be copied from another. Anyone who has won two Blue Ribbons in the Intermediate would be limited to the Advance catagory.

ENTRY RULES:

- 1. Any member of Western Rosemaler's Association may participate in the Juried Show and Exhibit.
- Only two articles may be entered in the Juried Show. Both must be in the same classification.
- 3. Articles must have been painted within the last three years and must not have been entered in any other Juried Show.
- 4. There is no size limit, however, the painted design should be large enough to allow the judges to apprasie techninque, design and color.
- 5. No monochromatic or analogous colors.
- 6. Enteries must be prainted on wood with oil paints.
- 7. Wet or sticky enteries will not be accepted.
- 8. The artist should not sign his/her name to the entry, it should be covered with opaque tape.
- 9. If the entry is to be hung, it must have a proper hanger.
- 10. Entries must not have been painted in a class or under the supervision of an instructor.
- 11. A screening committee will review all entries to determine if all criteria are met.
