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

AND IN THE OLDEN DAYS it was customary for those men whose souls yearned for musical expression to attune their ears to the voices of the sea and earth and record in their eager minds the music of wind and wave — the rustling and soughing of forest trees and mountain meadow grasses, or the wild tumbling laughter of streams and waterfalls mingled with the calls of the creatures of the forest. And with voice and instrument they would fashion the melodies of nature into songs which they sang whenever people gathered together for wedding or for burial, or merely for the pleasure of being together; and as the others listened, their heads would nod in recognition of Nature's music which they too had heard, and soon their voices also would be joined in the singing.

Thus it came to be that whenever the folk would tell of inspirational things, be it a great victory of their sea-faring Vikings or an act of unusual love or devotion, or an exciting encounter with one of the strange trolls or elves that everyone knew dwelt in mountain cave or in dark and secret forest glen, the musical ones would be inspired to relate in song that which they had seen or heard — and the melodies were sung by all through generation after generation.

Later came those who studied the writing of music and were inspired by the folk melodies, as well as by the song they too discovered in Nature's instruments, to write the great acappella compositions for which the north countries became so well known.

SO IT WAS that group singing became the favorite means for musical expression in those countries of the north — and in every city, town and village, choruses were formed; and often these groups would leave their own homes and travel great distances to hold sangerfests with other choruses, so that sometimes a thousand or more voices would be raised together in song. And the songs had a greatness because they were written for the common man and were of things close to his heart.

Now when these men migrated to a new land, they brought with them many traditions of the old, and soon male chorus singing became as much a part of their lives as it had ever been in their native land. Sangerfests began on our own Pacific Coast fifty-five years ago, after the formation of the Pacific Coast Norwegian Singers Association the year previous. Singers journeyed from far and near by boat, train or carriage to the little city of Everett where the first of these gatherings was held. Now, for the forty-eighth time the choruses have come many miles to sing together, three hundred strong. Certainly much credit is due the many fine musicians who unselfishly have given years of their lives in composing and arranging music, and in teaching and directing the songs so that the tradition of male chorus singing should not wither, but wax ever stronger and stronger.



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

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


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
