Art of the People

It's the second week of September and Dr. Marion Nelson and his nine or so coworkers at the Museum of American Folk Art in New York City are celebrating Christmas. In high spirits, they're opening forty huge crates filled with Norwegian treasures.

The only difference is that Nelson knows what's in each box. In fact, this professor emeritus of art history at the University of Minnesota and director emeritus of Vesterheim in Decorah, Iowa, has spent the last year choosing the approximately 175 Norwegian and Norwegian-American folk art pieces for a groundbreaking exhibit: "Norweign Folk Art: The Migration of a Tradition."

"This exhibit is a very important reminder of the folk tradition out of which most of the Norwegian people came," says Nelson, guest curator of the exhibition. "This is their tradition—more than Ibsen or Grieg."

The show which features such items as Viking-style ceremonial drinking vessels, exquisite picture weavings, and brilliantly painted immigrant trunks, runs through January 7, 1996, in New York. A tour to three U.S. cities—Bismarck (North Dakota), St. Paul (Minnesota), and Seattle—as well as Oslo, Norway follows. [February-May 17 1997 at Nordic Heritage Museum]

Highlighting an extensive artistic legacy, the exhibition examines a decorative-arts tradition that has had a lasting impact well into the twentieth century as it was transported from Norway to North America. Jointly organized by the Museum of American Folk Art and the Norwegian Folk Museum in Oslo, the show is presented through "Norwegian Visions," a Norwegian-American cultural partnership program. Because of the significance of the exhibition, participating Norwegian museums are allowing seventy superb works of art from their collections to travel outside the country, many for the first time.

California Adventure


Anita Boren and I drove to the California Rosemalers Convention (October 26-29) held at Mount Alverno Conference Center in Redwood City. We made several interesting stops going and returning. The sad moment of the trip was when I told my oldest grandson I could only stay one night with them. I hope dinner out and a trip to a pumpkin patch made up for some of his disappointment. My other grandchildren are younger and it didn't bother them. Pumpkins are expensive in California. I spent \$35 on three large pumpkins and one small one. Next year I'll grow my own again.

The Convention Center is located across the bay south of San Francisco and north of San Jose. The Center is run by the Sisters of Saint Francis. It had very nice rooms, beautiful grounds and provided three meals a day. We had a room for two and shared a large bathroom with two other people.

Our teachers were Irene Lamont, Julie Ann Droivold, and Joe Haugen. We were divided into two classrooms with our group subdivided between Joe and Julie Ann. The Convention lasts three days—so you spend one and a half with each teacher.

Julie Ann taught a Vest-Agder design on a plate and Joe taught wood carving. Anita and I wanted to take both, but we finally chose the Vest-Agder class. The piece was painted in acrylics. It is a more primitive style but there is lots of line work and tear drops. It is excellent practice for your brush control. Julie Ann brought a large selection of pieces for sale, so Anita and I bought several pieces to use as examples when we bot home. We both really enjoyed this class. I've designed and painted several pieces since I got home.

After one and one half days, the teachers switched classrooms. The people who did carving joined our group for the class with Irene Lamont. We started out with demos on some Hallingdal flowers and scrolls. She gave us lots of information on things typical to this style. Next she moved on to a large Telemark design. Irene paints with a long handle filbert brush and stands



up over her surface to paint the large scrolls. We watched her demo on a cupboard doorpanel. She started by showing us how she antiqued her pieces. It was very interesting watching her fill in the panel with flower forms after she had her scrolls in place. Her detail work is very lovely and distinctive. We had a very enjoyable time telling stories and jokes while watching Irene. She also explained different painting styles from her collection of painted poster boards.

The CRA has a trade show area where you can buy woodenware, painted sweat shirts, painted woodenware, jewelry, etc. There is always a large table of door prizes. Everyone usually gets two-three door prizes. My name was drawn close to last on the first round and early in the second. I got the things I had wanted.

One night Diane Edwards taught a make and takeit class on painting with DecoArts ultra gloss on small tiles. Another night a video of Sigmund Arseth painting was shown—very good. Anita is trying to get a copy so we can use it for a program.

One of the highlights of this trip was the evening Margie Miller-Utzinger invited us to her home for dessert. (Note-She wrote the book with Sigmund). She lives a short way south of the Convention Center. It was a beautiful night and when we turned into her driveway, the fairy tale began. The driveway is lined on both sides with tall narrow trees-very regal. This opens up to a large beautifully landscaped parking area. We were led to the left past the pool to a split-level pool house (anyone would love to live in it). On the main floor, one corner contains a floor to ceiling round ceramic fireplace. The wood floors are painted, the ceiling with large open beams were painted by Karen Jensen. There are canvases by Sigmund scattered throughout. You go up a few wood steps to an open loft that contains two single built-in beds that are rosemaled. You go down a few stairs to the kitchen area. There was so much to see-it's hard to remember everything. Between Anita and I, hopefully, we got pictures of most everything. Then we moved on to the deck area. The deck and its decorative railing set off the spectacular view of the bay with all the lights from the other side. Along one side of the deck was a large bare limbed tree that only added to the mystic of the night.

Next we entered the main house into the living room. This room has a beautiful view as it looks out onto the deck and beyond. On the walls are watercolors by Margie's father and two lovely pastel portraits. Interesting painted pieces are scattered throughout the house. The guest bedroom has a built-in rosemaled cupboard bed. Margie's three-legged chair that was Continued on page 7

featured in the Pamela Publications book is in this room. The guest bath has a towel rack and a magazine rack painted by Shirley Evenstad who just taught a WRA workshop last fall. It was a very simple design with a subtle color which made is very elegant. The master bedroom furniture was quite unique. The carvings, turnings, or decorative trim were painted by Margie.

She spent a lot of time cleaning it up and decided to paint the special details. It turned out lovely. It was a very special treat to visit this house. 

Major Workshops in 1996



Major Workshops will be put on hold or cancelled until new guidelines are put in place. This was not taken care of at the November meeting. This means there is not enough time to pass new guidelines at the January meeting and get the class information out in the March newsletter and have time to get a response five to eight weeks prior to a class in April If things are not settled in January, there will probably not be a fall workshop either. [Editor's note: A special Board meeting is called for January 6th to discuss these issues.]

Too much money is involved to continue as we have. Howard, Mary and I are not willing to deal with all the uncertainty, last minute changes, late payments, and so on that have taken place in the last few years. Each year has gotten worse. The decisions, monies, and paperwork must all be taken care of weeks prior to a workshop. We must make firm commitments with the teacher five to eight weeks prior to a class. We can be held liable for airfare and teaching fees even if we cancel a class. This amounted to over \$1800 for our last workshops. We do not have this much money to spare in our treasury.

This is an important issue and each of us must decide what we are willing to commit to have major workshops in the future. I value having the classes and I am probably less able to afford the classes than most. I am willing to forgo something and use the money for a class, book or some related painting item. People with children at home have different choices to make-but most of us in the classes are past this issue. That brings up another point to think about once we build up a cash reserve-class scholarships for those who need them.

4 eggs (separated)	l tsp vanilla
2 cups sugar	1/2 tsp salt
1 c. Crisco	3 c. flour

2 tsp. baking powder tsp vanilla 2/3 c milk 3 c. blueberries coated with flour

Beat whites until stiff; fold in 1/2 cup sugar and set aside. Cream shortening, add salt, vanilla, sugar. Add yolks, beat until creamy. Add dry ingredients alt. with milk. Fold in beaten egg whites and blueberries.

Pour into pan, sprinkle sugar over butter.
