Dues increase - Board will discuss and bring recommendations to September meeting.


Ad rate increase - Acanthus Vine printing and postage costs have soured so rates must be raised for first time in our history. See new rate list on front page.

Pricing: Plates - 10" and larger - \$15 to \$60

Breadboards - 10" and larger - \$8.50 to \$20

Clocks - \$60 to \$75

Tines - \$25 to \$60

Bowls - 12" and larger - \$20 to \$65

Small items - \$3.50 and up

spoons, oven shovels, napkin rings, key rings,

small bowls, plates and breadboards

#### Explanation:

These guidelines are very general, but should be considered minimums. The higher figures are guides only, not limits. A general rule of thumb is to price items from 3 to 6 times retail cost of the items.

Commissions are usually taken from sales by sponsoring organizations, and if it is 20% or more, you may want to set prices higher than suggested.

#### Delivery and Pickup of items for sales:

Delivery should be made in advance of sale in accordance with times set by event chairman. The chairman has a great deal to do on the day of the sale and must not be burdened with items being brought in on that day.

Artists must make their own arrangements to have their items picked up at end of sale. Event chairman will not be held responsible for handling items after sale.

Instructions for pickup are to be indicated by artist on his or her individual sales sheet.

#### Painted Items Appropriate for Sales:

WOODENWARE ONLY - no metal items, no china items, no plastic items!

#### Finishing and Equipping Items for Sale:

Do Not finish breadboards on back; if left unfinished, they may actually be used and proven to be more desirable to customers.

<u>Do</u> finish backs of plaques, plates, insides of boxes, etc. This adds to the professional quality of the items.

Include a battery for clock so it may be displayed in operation.

Tie a leather thong in breadboards and bellows for hanging convenience.

Use hangers that fit pegboard hooks for display; wire and screw eyes are preferred; sawtooth hangers may have to be bent before attaching.

Do not use pull-top hangers from soft drink cans; they do not stay attached very well, and are unprofessional looking.

#### Demonstration at sales:

Demonstrator may use pattern or paint freehand, but if using patterns, choose those that are traditional and authentic.

Demonstrate only on woodenware.

Demonstrate only with oil paints--no acrylics.

#### Explanation:

To "preserve the art of rosemaling" and "to encourage the <u>High Quality</u> of workmanship set by our predecessors through the use of <u>traditional</u> colors, scrolls, and flowers" is stated as the objective of Western Rosemalers Association on our membership forms. Therefore, it is important that as we promote this art form at our events, we do so in a traditional and authentic manner.





# Rambling Rosemalers.

Only one WRA traveller wrote us since we inaugurated this new column in our last issue, and we hope she will stimulate others of you to share your experiences with our readers. Jan Wartinger rode her 15-speed bicycle 847 miles on her 5-week solo journey through much of Norway, shifted to train and boat before she racked up 1,000 ... wrote that she was slightly browner with a little more muscle. Spent whole day at Folk Museum, Viking Museum (her favorite), and Kon Tiki-Ra Museum on the 4th of July, a date she's usually with 30-40 relatives at a potluck on her parents' deck. She later spent an hour visiting the parents of her rosemaling teacher, Inger Svendsen. She spent the last year studying the language so she could converse with them and others along her trek. This was her first trip to Norway and she knew no one there when she left, but made friends easily. Said she always had enough energy for the "interminable hills", and at hostels or towns usually met nice folk. The settlements became what she valued there. Said much of the scenery reminded her of the U.S. "Today I cycled the mountain road by Shasta, it seemed--water, rocky hills, and trees all the way, and 10 miles of very tough grades. Overcast, about 55, occasional showers. Most days start sunny, wind comes up strong by 1 pm, and things look threatening by 5:30. I've stayed in 8 hostels and tonight am about 45 miles south of Stavenger. This southern coast is where Norwegians take their summer vacations -- many campgrounds and fjords. Am not really in the valleys of rosemaling but see good collections at museum and modern kind at Heisflidens (sp? forgive me Jan, can't read it...ed.) "I called Addie during my plane's stopover in Minneapolis and she told me where to find some rosemaling, asked me to call again upon return. Sent her best wishes to all." Lots more, but space dictates closing. We'll be anxious to see her slides; Jan is an excellent photographer and narrator, too.
