

CHEAP MATERIALS GREAT TOOLS!

At the May General Meeting, President Mary shared some great ideas for painting tools. "This is just the beginning," Mary tells us.

- Pink hair styling tape is better than all other tapes because it costs next to nothing, leaves no residue after a long 'I forgot to remove the tape' episode; and it's pretty.
- Make-up brushes can be made of the same fine hairs as found in artisan brushes and of course for less monies. They come in a variety of shapes and sizes.
- The U-shaped clips that hold a hot hair curler in place is the same clip you want to use to grasp those small items we sometimes paint. Perhaps it's time to visit your local beauty supply store for perhaps other painter bargains.
- 100% cotton balls won't leave lint. Wind on a round toothpick a small amount of the cotton. Wet the cotton to firm. Spit is great for this! You determine the size of wipe-out-tool by the amount of cotton you wind onto the pick.
- Your clothes carry that unforseen and dreaded lint.
 Wear an apron to cover-up while you paint.

The following proposed changes to WRA By Laws were reviewed and approved by WRA Board at a meeting July 24, 1997. Changes will be voted upon by the general membership at the September meeting. Please note that proposed changes are in bold print.

Article IV - Membership

Section 3. Voting - Each active **dues-paying** member is entitled to one vote in the affairs of the association.

Article V - Dues

The annual dues required for membership in the association shall be determined by the vote of the active members. Dues shall run from February 1 to January 31.

Article VI - Officers

Section 2

Terms - The President, Vice-President, Secretary, Financial Secretary Membership Secretary and Treasurer shall take office February I after their election, and shall serve for a term of one year ending January 31 and until successors are duly elected. Officers are eligible......

Article VII - Executive Board

Section 1

The Executive Board shall consist of the president, vice-president, secretary, financial secretary, membership secretary, treasurer, immediate past president, newsletter editor, major workshop chairman and miniworkshop chairman.

Section 2

The executive board shall:

a. Recommend expenditures of the club monies.

Article VIII - Elections

Section 3

The nomination of officers shall be made by a nomination committee consisting of the vice president plus two elected active members at the September meeting each year, nominees announced at the November meeting.

Section 4

Election of officers shall be by ballot. Ballots will be counted by 3

appointed members.

Section 5

Newly elected officers will assume office February I following election.

Article XII - Parlimentary Authority - General Membership Meeting

Article XIII - Order of Business - General Membership Meeting

Article XIV - Duties of the Officers

Section 1

The president shall:

h. Appoint an auditor and send a copy of the audit to the secretary and

the 'Vine' editor for publication.

Section 4

The financial secretary shall:

a. Receive and record all incoming money of the association

b. Deposit money and send breakdown to the treasurer.

Section 5 The membership secretary shall:

b. Record all membership.

Section 6

The treasurer shall:

a. Maintain a checking account for the association with both himself/her-

self and the president having signature authority.

b.Render an accounting to the association at each meeting of bills, receipts, expenditures and bank balance. A voucher is to be presented to

the treasurer for each check written.

c.Pay all bills approved by the vote of the membership.

d. Conduct the business meeting of the association in the absence of the

president and vice president.

Section 7

The immediate past president shall:

a. Be responsible for recognition of the outgoing officers, and volunteer

recognition.

Betty first became interested in rosemaling in 1969 when she visited the Norwegian American Museum in Decorah, Iowa. She later enrolled in her first rosemaling class taught by Nils Ellingsgard and returned to the museum several summers to study under numerous Norwegian teachers. After joining WRA, she benefited greatly from the workshops that were offered. Under the guidance of these artisans, Cooper developed a strong background in color, design, and technique. Betty has also studied fine art at several colleges and under many professional artists nationally.

For more than 14 years, Betty owned an art/gift gallery with mail order service near Poulsbo, WA. She combined her art skills with her teaching ability and taught rosemaling as well as a variety of other art classes. She has authored several pattern and painting instruction sets.

Because of her varied art training, Betty is versatile in style. She works in many media and draws and paints a variety of subjects. She has not limited her painting surface to paper, canvas and wood but has also decorated store fronts, walls, and furniture. SOME MYTHS OF ROSEMALING

by Celia Hendrix

After 15 years of painting and teaching rosemaling, several trips to Norway to study rosemaling, and working with many different teachers, I have come to some conclusions concerning this beautiful old art. These ideas are strictly my own, and I do not expect everyone to agree with them. However, I do hope it will give you something to think about.

First: We are told we must not mix the different styles of rosemaling -- those being Telemark (asymmetrical, scrolls the most important, flowers just used as fillers), Hallingdal (symmetrical, flowers most important, tulip, bonnet lily, and pull-out flowers) and Rogaland (must shading, few scrolls, fanciful flowers), and several other styles not as well known.

Yet, if you study old -- and some modern rosemaling -- it is very difficult to decide which style, because the early painters traveled from district to district mixing up the different styles, *continued.....*

I've been teaching rosemaling since 1980. I take beginners, intermediates and advanced students at any time. I teach all styles of rosemaling but I personally favor Telemark. Since 1990 I have also been teaching folk art from around the world in the adult education program. I founded the *California Rosemaling Association* in 1987. Sigmund Aarseth will be our teacher this October!

My rosemaling teachers have been - Sigmund Aarseth (who started me on the way with his easy stroke work and imagination), Nils Ellingsgard, Ragnvald Frøysadal, Gunnar Bø, Oskar Kjetså, Sigrid Midjås Heisholt, Eli Sælid, Bergljot Lunde, Bjørg Kleivi, Kari Signe Bråthen, American rosemalers Irene Lamont, Judy Miner, Karen Jenson, Addie Pittelkow, Gayle Oram, Eldrid Arntzen, Diane Edwards, Julie Anne Droivold, Ruth Wolfgram and Vesla Harris.

There are 5-6 rosemalt pieces in the Smithsonian Institute painted by me. While on the Vesterheim study tour in Oslo, Norway (my 4th trip) this summer, I and other members in Oskar Kjetså's class were interviewed by the press.

I love rosemaling! It relaxes me; it lets me be creative; it has taught me much about Norwegian culture; I've met many interesting people; it creates a product, which fits my work ethic; it can be sold and so I can buy more woodenware and pay for more workshops. So, for me, it is a perfect hobby!

Telemark is my favorite style, followed by Valdres, Hallingdal, Os, and Rogaland. Painting in a different style for a few days energizes me. Since I work, I teach rosemaling at the Bremerton Sons of Norwy on Wednesday evenings, 6pm to 9pm. Of course a half hour of that is a refreshment break of good food and many laughs. Everyone is welcome, beginners, as well as continuing students. Each session is 6 weeks.



It was in 1975, after I had watched a demonstration of Norwegian Rosemaling, that I decided this was something I wanted to do. My first lesson was from Inger Svendsen, in Seattle Little did I realize how much rosemaling was to become a part of my life.

The following spring I joined the newly organized WRA, which over the years has provided me with the opportunity to take classes from many of the well known rosemalers. Nils Ellingsgard, Sigmund Aarseth, Elsa Sjøvaag, Bergljot Lunde, Gunnar Bø, Alfhild Tangen, Kari Signe Bråthen, Bjørg Kleive, as well as Americans Addie Pittlekow, Vesla Harris, Judith Nelson Miner, Trudy Wasson, Vi Thode, Florence Buck, Sallie DeReus, and Pam Rucinski.

I have been fortunate to have taken two trips to Norway. It was a thrill to visit folk museums and farm homes to see and photograph the works of the old masters. It has been a valuable tool in studying the techniques that were used by these early rosemalers.

I paint mostly Hallingdal and Telemark designs, and like them both. But if I had to choose a favorite, it would be Hallingdal. I am very proud of my ribbons that I have won at WRA sponsored juried shows. It is

so important that WRA members participate in these shows, it is just another learning tool on the way to becoming a good rosemaler. So don't be afraid, submit an entry in the next juried show!

I began teaching classes in my home about 14 years ago. Currently I teach classes at the Nordic Heritage Museum in Seattle, at the Scandinavian Cultural Center at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, and most recently at Panorama Cilty in Lacey, WA. As I tell people, "Have paint brush will travel." This past June I taught a 4 hour class to a group of twenty Elderhostlers at PLU. It was a real challenge, but fun! I have been told that they now have a greater appreciation of rosemaling. When not teaching, I am busy painting for commission and for coming sale events.

It is important that we preserve the concept of rosemaling through technique, design and color. I hope that by sharing my knowledge and love of rosemaling and teaching it, others will learn to appreciate this beautiful folk art of Norway.

My introduction to Rosemaling came about 1969 through my Portland, Oregon decorative painting teacher, Eunice DeCamp. She had gone to Decorah, Iowa to take classes from Nils Ellingsgard and Sigmund Aarseth. Later Eunice hosted these artisans and offered seminars with them at her studio.

My next classes in rosemaling were again with Nils when another lady in Portland, Alice Lindquist, brought him to Oregon to teach.

During this time, I moved to Seattle. Through contacts here and there, I became acquainted with others who were also interested in this art form. We decided to form an organization to give us a vehicle through which we could become more adept at this painting style. With the formation of *The Western Rosemalers*, we started hosting Nils, Sigmund, and other Norwegian Rosemalers. This proved to be beneficial in improving our painting skills.

Over the years I have studied with both American and Norwegian Rosemalers. The one significant change I made during this time was to switch from oil paints to acrylic paints. I now paint and teach primarily with acrylics. I like to study all of the styles rosemaling and do not tend to favor one over the other.

Second: A word about color -- we are told over and over again never to use pink or purple. I will add two more to this list -- a very well known teacher just about fainted when I got out the turquoise and thalo yellow green. Yet, I have seen very good Norwegian rosemalers use many different colors -- sometimes in the same painting. Bergljot Lunde taught a workshop using purple and metallic gold. It was lovely. Here again, use those colors that make you happy.

Third: Regarding the writing of sayings on rosemaling, it would be nice to have it authentic, and everyone be able to read it. However, does this mean *Landsmal*, *Rysmal*, old Norwegian, new Norwegian, or one of the many variations in between. I maintain the writing is merely decorative and 99.9% of the people looking at is will not be able to read it. So, do your best, and put you interpretation on the back, and enjoy!

Fourth: We are told rosemaling is always painted in oil on wood. The early rosemalers used wood because that is what was available to them. However, I think we are missing a lot if we don't experiment with other things such as metal, glass, ceramics, and particularly cloth. You can come up with some lovely things using these materials.


One of the newer ideas is painting on leather. Bergljot Lunde taught this at Decorah recently. It is called *Gilded Leather Work*, and is an old technique of embossing, painting, and gilding leather for upholstery and walls. It is still practiced in Norway. Although the technique is associated with Spain, it was highly developed in Scandinavia 300 years ago.

Last, but not least, does rosemaling have to be done in oils? Lately there have been several prominent rosemalers who have developed an allergy to the paint, particularly the thinner used. The doctor has been telling me for several years I must stop painting, but I just couldn't see it. Didn't I always keep my odorless thinner covered? Also, I cleaned my hands with borax, painted in a well-ventilated room, with no food or drink unless I cleaned my hands first. It just couldn't be!

However, when I read Karen Jensen's article in *The Vesterheim Rosemaling Newsletter*, I knew the doctor was right, and those powerful chemicals had finally gotten to me. When I wrote to her and asked for advice, since WRA frowns on rosemaling done with acrylics, she wrote back that I had two choices; either give up painting or go to acrylics. She also stated that she will be teaching a class in rosemaling with acrylics at Decorah in April -- and would teach a class for us if we'd like.


The early rosemalers used casein paint, and mixed their own pigments. That is all that was available to them at that time. Now we have a wide variety of paints available to us. As of yet, I am unable to get the soft, muted color that I can with oils, but I'm working on it.

In conclusion, we should all strive to develop our own style and colors for this lovely art form. Therefore, in my opinion, there is only <u>one</u> rule for rosemaling..."Enjoy."



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Naomi Price Rosemaling is silent poetry. When one lives far from the central influence and activity of rosemaling, you learn to see and feel the silence. The many printed resources I own and the wonderful photographs shared by fellow painters are priceless to me. I cherish the instructors that have given of their time and shared their knowledge unselfishly. In return, my students are promised the same commitment from me.

Sigmund Aarseth had asked me where I had learned to rosemal. Imagine my fear in responding, "I'm self-taught." Sigmund remarked, "By not having an instructor early on, you were able to develop a style of rosemaling with your own characteristics." It has taken me some time to see what he was referencing in my paintings. I also give a heart-felt thank-you to Pat Virch. Although I have never had the privilege of being her student, her book *Rosemaling In the Round* was my loyal painting partner for many years.



Words of wisdom never seem to count until you have the experience. Once, a college professor asked me why I selected Elementary Education over an Art major. If Mr. Diamond could see what I'm doing now! I ask of my students to listen and hear my words of wisdom. There just might be something to note for future reference.

I chose to rosemal as a contribution to my mother's Norwegian ancestry. Rosemaling was always difficult for me, until I took the time to understand the culture and history surrounding this folk art. The most important thing one can do is learn how to learn. Each student comes to me with their goal for learning to rosemal. However, before their first session ends, their appreciation for this art form surpasses all other agendas.

Drawing upon my past experiences and needs in rosemaling, I have developed a series of classes for the beginner and intermediate; one special topic is lettering as it pertains to rosemaling. Lastly, but always a priority in my classes is safety. I am constantly researching and asking, "Is there something better to take the place of my present material or approach to technique."

Perhaps you would like to join me in Klamath Falls once a month or in Bend every other Thursday. I will also be teaching in the Hillsboro, OR October 11 and 18 through PCC Adult Continuing Education. I treasure each student of each session because I always learn so much from them.
