Born in Norway, Thea Foss and her husband Andrew arrived in Tacoma in 1889. Starting with a used rowboat, they built a maritime empire. Karen portrays Thea in 1912, the year of the first Foss tugboat. She reflects back on her life and looks forward to the future. At a time when few women could, Thea Foss took her place in a "man's world", always believing "we are members of one great body... we were born for the good of the whole". Like other immigrants, she added her experiences to the rich blend that is Washington.

The first quilt I made was a baby quilt for my Sunday school teacher; it had embroidered animals on it. I then made more quilts over the years, but not too many. I made a lot of clothes and then got into making mohair teddy bears. My passion for quilt-making started about 15 years ago. It was so nice to make something that didn't have a zipper or set-in sleeves!

I really enjoy fabric and my favorites are reproduction fabrics copied from old quilts and clothes from the mid 1800's to the 1930's. But I do enjoy other fabrics also. I've made several quilts from colorful fabrics from France. I make classic patterns rather than freestyle art quilts. I do some hand quilting but often machine quilt, and sometimes I have my quilts quilted by a professional machine quilter. After hand quilting a quilt a

### How are you doing with your Norwegian reading? Can you read the following? Syttende mai – Norges grunnlovsdag

**Den 17. mai** er Norges nasjonaldag. Denne dagen i 1814 ble medlemmene av Riksforsamlingen på Eidsvoll enige om den endelige versjonen av landets grunnlov. Forsamlingen valgte deretter enstemmig regenten, prins Christian Frederik, til konge av et uavhengig Norge. Grunnloven er i teksten datert 17. mai, men ble først signert og beseglet dagen etter, den 18. mai.

Dette innledet en kort periode for Norge som uavhengig stat, før landet etter en kortvarig krig med Sverige måtte inngå våpenhvile gjennom Mossekonvensjonen. Denne avtalen innebar at Norge godtok enpersonalunion med Sverige, men beholdt Grunnloven med de endringer som unionsinngåelsen gjorde nødvendige. Det medførte blant annet at ordet «uafhængigt» i § 1 i den reviderte Grunnloven av 4. november1814 ble erstattet med ordet «selvstændigt». Innenfor unionen beholdt Norge selvstendighet og separate statlige institusjoner, bortsett fra kongen og utenrikstjenesten.

17. mai er en offisiell flaggdag og offentlig høytidsdag med arbeidsfri i Norge. Barn og voksne har siden slutten av 1800-tallet feiret dagen mer enn det som er vanlig for mange andre lands nasjonaldagsmarkeringer, blant annet med barnetog.

### THE DOROTHY ANDERSON CABIN

Steelhead Construction has begun restoration work on the historic Dorothy Anderson Cabin located at Seabrook. In 2004, Moclips-By-The-Sea Historical Society merged with the North Beach Historical Society in Ocean City and took over ownership of the cabin. It was moved to a temporary location about 1/8 mile north to prevent it from being demolished. The cabin was moved again in 2007 by Seabrook to a parcel located within the new beach town. Funding for the restoration was provided by the Seabrook Foundation and the Museum of the North Beach. The projected completion date is sometime in May.



Dorothy Anderson was born in Nesna, Norway, on August 10, 1891, and came to the United States in 1910. For thirteen years she worked in Seattle hotels, and after her divorce, she moved to Ocean City. Dorothy fell in love with the area with its ocean beaches, the forests where deer and bear roamed, and the abundance of wild birds. It reminded her of her childhood home in Norway bringing back fond memories of her native homeland.

Upon arrival at Ocean City, she cleared her newly purchased property of brush and pulled stumps with her bare hands. In 1926, she built her cabin from logs she found on the beach and transported in a wheelbarrow across Connor Creek. The ceiling of her cabin is made of wainscoting retrieved from a shipwreck. Eight more cabins were added with the help of a part-time handyman. This became "Dorothy's Tourist Harbor".

Dorothy Anderson is mentioned several times in Norah Berg's 1952 autobiography, *Lady on the Beach*. Dorothy died on January 22, 1976 and is buried at Fern Hill Cemetery in Aberdeen.

In addition to the restoration, a beautiful garden will also be added. The cabin will be open to the public and both Seabrook and the Museum of the North Beach will use the building for special events.

#### SEVENTEENTH of MAY - NORWAY'S CONSTITUTION DAY

(Syttende mai - Norges grunnlovsdag)

The 17<sup>th</sup> of May is Norway's national day. On this day in 1814, members of the National Assembly at Eidsvoll agreed on the final version of the Constitution. The assembly unanimously elected the regent, Prince Christian Frederik, to be king of an independent Norway. The Constitution is dated the 17<sup>th</sup> of May in the text, but was first signed and sealed the day after, the 18<sup>th</sup> of May.

This ushered in a brief period of Norway as an independent state, and after a short war with Sweden, a cease fire was declared by the Convention of Moss. This accord meant that Norway agreed to a personal union with Sweden, but retained its Constitution (with amendments made necessary as a result of the union). The result, among other things, was that the word uafhængigt\* in § 1 of the Revised Constitution dated November 4, 1814, was replaced with the word selvstændigt.\* Within the union, Norway retained its independence and separate government institutions, except the king and the foreign service department.

The 17<sup>th</sup> of May is an official Flag Day and public holiday in Norway. Children and adults, since the late 1800s, have celebrated the day more than is usual for many other countries' national day celebrations, including, among other things, the traditional children's parade.

NOTE: Both "uafhængigt" (uavhengig) and "selvstændigt" (selvstendig) mean "independent."
