

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ROSEMALING IN AMERICA TODAY - September meeting talk by Lila Granaas

By way of introduction, I have drawn from our own WRA library an immensely interesting folio on the above subject and I am using this as my source for our program today. The folio was written by Marion J. Nelson, Director, Norwegian American Museum and is dated 1972. Included in the folio are colored reproductions of artists who had accumulated the greatest number of points through awards at the National Rosemaling Exhibitions begun by the Museum seven years prior and these are all familiar names to us today.

To quote Mr. Nelson, "As far as is known now, very little rosemaling was done in America before about 1930. This is surprising because the first wave of immigration occurred around 1850. The Norwegian settler in America, who broke away from a rather closed culture, met new demands and new potentials of the frontier country and this led to a sudden loss in America of this facet of Norwegian culture.

Revival of interest began in 1930 due to Per Lysne in Wisconsin. His father was the last of the West Coast rosemalers in Norway. Per gave this up and became a laborer in a mill. The Great Depression forced him to seek other work and he turned to Rosemaling. This little known type of decoration had a gaiety and charm with immediate appeal in the gloom of the Depression and, later, the war years. He was not a teacher, but taught informally. His work set off a revival of artifacts brought by emigrants and is said he restored over 600 trunks. His works were purchased in the 40's all over America and went from Norwegian—American to American. The Museum in Decorah further aided and developed in the search to collect artifacts and imported Norwegian artists to teach, plus instituting Rosemaling Exhibitions each year.

As expected in revival art, contemporary American rosemaling is more controlled and refined than the work it was emulating. The two are products of totally different environments — and differences in the artists and relationship to their work. Most are women who do rosemaling as a hobby now, while originally it was painters who made it a profession. In spite of the differences, rosemaling in America today is of astonishingly high quality. It may lack the vigor of early painting, but it does compare favorably with recent rosemaling in Norway.

The painters represented in this particular portfolio are those who had accumulated the greatest number of points at the National Exhibitions in the year 1972. Among the earliest Gold Medal winners were Agnes Rykken and Ethel Kvalheim, both of whom have painted since the 40's. Rykken is entirely self-taught and inspired by rosemaling brought from Norway. She is from Seattle. Kvalheim traces her interest to 1936. She lived one block from Per Lysne, but has developed a freer style. She is the only American to have received from Norway the King Olav Medal of Honor for her work in Norsemaling.

<u>Vi</u> Thode - started in 1961 under another gifted painter, Annette Hayter. In 1969, her work was in an exhibition of "contemporary folk arts" at the Smithsonian Institution. Mr. Nelson in 1977 says, "The Rogaland style developed by her must be considered the most highly-developed single strain of American rosemaling today! Rogaland made its first entrance in 1971 with Bergljot Lunde's first visit to the United States, under whom Those studied. She was a 1970 Gold winner.

Gyda Mahlum - is also a product of inspiration under Per Lysne. Through self-study, she developed a distinctive style. She has studied extensively with the painters from Norway.

Norma Splitt and Addie Pittelgow began painting in the 60's and became major teachers and demonstrators. They studied with the early painters from Norway, which may account for the stress they place on freely created work.

<u>Barbara Hawes</u> represents a new element in the rosemaling revival. She was an art major in college and worked extensively in Early American painting before she discovered Rosemaling. She studied with the Norwegian painters and in 3 years developed a mature and distinctive rosemaling style.

ROSEMALING TODAY - (cont.)

Since this folio was written, there have been many winners and the good work goes on.

In closing, I would like to leave with you some thoughtful remarks from S. Arseth in his book, Norwegian Rosemaling. "It is apparent Rosemaling has swung full circle and is as beautiful today as centuries ago in Norway".

"Thus, the spirit of the decorative artists of the 18th century continues to flourish in America as well as on its native soil. Few nations can claim such a vital continuity of tradition as Norway - a heritage that has survived industrial and artistic upheavals to claim a place in modern society".
