20 Years Ago

Western Rosemaler's Association started on May 25th, 1975, when 13 people got together at Normanna Hall in Tacoma to discuss the possibilities of forming a group of persons interested in the art of rosemaling. They delegated the temporary officers as Florence Buck, Chairman; Lois Bradshaw, Secretary; Andy Feroy, Treasurer; and Mary Ellerman, Editor.

Others present who were going to act as area representatives were: Inger Svendson, Gudrun Berg, Pat Morgan, Adeline Svehaugh, Ester Einmo, Kaja Englund, and Bonnie Smith. Also attending were Helen Foren, Karen Newbill, Bonnie Van Buskirk, and Thelma Johnson. [of those present, only Florence Buck, Karen Newbill and Mary Ellerman are still members].



At the time, they thought of having meetings on the 4th Sundays of September, January, March and June. They discussed what they wanted as a group, such as programs, demonstrations, speakers, dues and a newsletter.

On the second meeting, in September 1975, they had 18 members and a balance in the treasury of \$90.00. More plans were made for the newsletter, a mini-rosemaling show, and for the by-laws. Also, the name was chosen for the organization.

In December 1975, they decided to have a contest for naming the newsletter. In March 1976 it was announced that Carol Ramstad won the prize for naming the newsletter *The Acanthus Vine*, and Betty Cooper created the letterhead design. Louise Friar, Historian

During this period of celebrating WRA's 20th Anniversary, patterns from the early issues of the Acanthus Vine will be included in the remaining issues of the Vine in 1995. Anniversary Committee: Louise Friar, Betty Edwards, and Barbara Hazen.

Shirley Evenstad to Teach in September

Coming from Richfield, Minnesota, Shirley Evenstad, a Gold Medalist, will be teaching in Portland and Trollhaugen in September. She will be teaching Hallingdal style. Currently Shirley teaches a variety of rosemaling classes through the community education program in Richfield, paints by commission in her home and sometimes travels to teach or judge. One of her patterns is in this issue. It will be an opportunity you won't want to miss attending a class by this gifted rosemaler.

It was in September, 1977 when she decided to get out of the house and take a class. She says, "Four weeks of tole painting and four weeks of rosemaling started by 18 year courtship with this interesting addition to my lifestyle.

Since then, many Norwegian teachers and other Gold Medalists kept me interested in learning the techniques of the beautiful Norwegian art. It was while attending a Sons of Norway meeting when I examined and admired a breadboard to be given away as a door prize that I was smitten. I want to do that!

In 1985 our church invited me to decorate a harpsichord. I tallied over 60 hours on it and feel like most of you probably do when you finish a project—that it is a part of you. It still gives me pleasure to see it each time it is used at our services.

The Epcot project was a case of being at the right place at the right time and knowling the right person. I will be

grateful for that once-in-a-lifetime experience."

Shirley Evenstad, Richfield, has studied Norwegian rosemaling with several master teachers from Norway, including Nils Ellingsgard, Oskar Kjetsaa, Gunnar Bo, Alfhild Tangen, Bergilot Lunde, and Eli Saelid. As a member of the 1995 Vesterheim Tour, she will study with Ragnvald Frovsadal and Knut Andersen.

Evenstad earned her Gold Medal in rosemaling from Vesterheim in 1983 and has subsequently taught four classes for the museum and was the American Gold Medalist judge for the national exhibition in Decorah in 1987. Her work was part of a rosemaling exhibit at Augsburg College, Minneapolis, and in April 1984, and a piece of her work traveled to Norway in 1986 and again in 1989.



This was the first design by Mary that I could find in the




Kaja Englund attended the first initial meeting in May of 1975 and was chosen to be on the first calling committee for Bremerton, Mercer Island and Poulsbo.

Western Rosemalers Assoc. General Meeting Minutes

Betty Edwards presented a very nice slide program of the 1994 WRA Juried Show. These slides are available for other members to present at various public presentations, with written descriptions for each slide.

Meeting was called to order by Mary McDonald, the new president.

Calendar: Bremerton meeting will be Nov. 12, a change from the printed calendar. Juried show items are due Sept. 29.

Calendar will be printed in each 'Vine'.

Sales Chairman: A new chairman is needed. Sign-up sheets for upcoming sales were sent around.

Major Workshops: Motion was made and seconded that the teacher fee for a major workshop will range from \$125 to \$175 per day.

Gurine Nordby's projected 5-day workshop budget:

Expenses: Teacher fee \$975-1,000 (\$175-\$200/day) Income to break even: Air fare \$300-400 10 students must pay \$200-300 (\$40-60/night) Lodging \$150-200 Classroom rent \$175 (\$35/day) 12 students - \$135-160 Miscellaneous 15 students - \$125-130 \$60

\$1610 - \$1945

A minimum of 10 students is needed. If more than 10 take the class, cost per student will go down. The student fee will be \$125 - \$150 for 5-day workshop.

Mini Workshops: Kelly Sooter announced that the Shoreline Library is available for workshops, located near 175th in North Seattle.

A motion was made and seconded that student fee for mini workshop be \$14.00 per day, \$24 for a non-member, motion passed.

World Fest: Members may work in the Nordic Heritage Museum booth, March 25 at Northgate.

Membership: Loiselle Dahill sent out letters to 1994 & 1993 members who had not renewed for 1995. She received a good response. She has prepared the Membership Roster and it will be printed and mailed out soon. She will publish new members' names in the 'Vine' to keep us up to date. She was thanked for all her work.

Telephone Committee: Mary M. will form a telephone committee and asked for volunteers. Mary asked that WRA members keep a record of the time, money and supplies which they donate to WRA. Such a record will show the many, many hours spent by volunteers to make our organization successful.

Juried Show Oct. 1995: PLU Scandinavian Cultural Center. Mary asked for volunteers to serve on the committee.

WRA 20 Year celebration: Barbara Hazen, Betty Edwards and Naomi Price will prepare a brochure to honor our 20th anniversary.

Standing Rules: Motion was made, seconded and passed that Standing Rules 19 and 25 be removed. No. 19 reads Workshops "The person responsible for the planning and carrying out of major workshops will be given a 50% reduction of class fees and lodging, if applicable." No. 25 reads "WRA will waive the workshop fee for major or mini workshops for any hostess of a visiting reacher." No member of a non-profit organization can be paid, according to the IRS. These reductions in fees constitute a payment.

Juried Show photography bill: Motion was made, seconded and passed that Betty Edwards be reimbursed \$170.25 which she paid toward that bill.

Washington State Cultural Commission: Motion was made, seconded and passed that WRA register with this commission, thus volunteering to demonstrate and talk to school groups, etc.

Marymoor Heritage Festival: WRA will not have a booth this year. Individual members interested in having a booth or demonstrating may contact Kelly Sooter. There is a stipend for demonstrating. Information about sales, even if WRA does not have a booth, will be published in the 'Vine' for members' use.

Nordic Heritage Museum showcase: Marie Ganfield announced that members should bring trays to the May meeting.

'Vine': Barbara Laskowski asked for patterns, news items, etc. to be submitted.

Sunshine chairman: Barbara Hazen sent a card to Al Edwards, and received a thank you for the LeRoy Clausen memorial to Nordic Heritage Museum.

Raffle: Gurine Nordby suggested members sell tickets to friends, etc.

<u>Library:</u> Motion made, seconded and passed that we accept the proposed 1995 budget as presented in the March 'Vine.'

Door prizes: Photo pages from the juried show were won by Wilda Snider, Marilyn Hansen and Barbara Hazen.

Meeting adjourned.

UPCOMING EVENTS

LOCAL YOUTH CHOIR RAISING FUNDS FOR NORWAY TOUR

A Norwegian May Festival featuring the Norwegian Youth Choir of Tacoma (also known by its Norwegian name, the "Barnekor") will be held at the Pantages Theater in Tacoma on Sunday, May 21, at 4:00 p.m. The choir, a group of 35 young people (ages 7 to 16) from all over Pierce County is planning a tour to Norway in June of 1966. The concert at the Pantages will be a major fund-faiser for this trip and will be a celebration of Norway's Constitution Day (May 17) as well as a commemoration of the liberation of Norway at the end of World War II and 1000 years of Christianity in Norway. CHANGES IN MAJOR WORKSHOPS: It was voted on at the March 1995 meeting to have a sliding scale of class fees due to the increased costs of having Gold Medal teachers come to our area.

There will be a class minimum size of 10. The class will cost \$25 - \$30 per day depending on the number of students in each class. This is still cheaper than your going to Vesterheim for a class. There will also be a cut-off date for you to send in your class deposits. If by this date we don't have at least 10 people who have sent in a deposit, the class will be cancelled. If the teacher is unable to get a refund on her airline ticket, WRA will still have to cover this expense.

I can't stress the importance of sending in your deposit early. You may still cancel in writing 5 weeks prior to class and receive a full refund. If written cancellation is received later, the deposit will be refunded only if the spot can be filled by another student. The balance of the class fees will be determined two weeks prior to start of class and must be paid in full at this time.

<u>CANCELATIONS:</u> If written note is received five weeks prior to class, the deposit will be refunded in full.

SUCCESSFUL SEPARATION

Your health and it's safety should always be a priority when rosemaling, especially with oils. Caution should not be thrown to the wind because of the word "ordorless." Ordorless Turpenoid is a familiar brush cleaner to most oil painters. However, when sediment builds up on the bottom of your selected brush cleaner container—so will the odor each time the lid is removed.

Solution:

- 1. Begin a paint session with a container of clean brush cleaner and a second empty clean container. By the time you start your second paint session the brush cleaner in the container will have separated into two layers: sediment and cleaner.
- 2. Pour the cleaner into the second container leaving the sediment behind and also excess odor.
- 3. After each paint session, pour the cleaner into the sediment container to allow for separation.
- 4. Repeat step 2 before each paint session and step 3 after each paint session.
