SYNOPSIS OF GENERAL MEETING MARCH 19, 1989

The minutes were read, corrected, and approved. The Executive Committee gave reports. To date we have 147 members. The Membership Directories are ready. The President thanked Louise Friar, Librarian, for her many years of service. The telephone committee is being revised with Marvel Gordon as Key Chairman, Anita Boren for Seattle, Eva Clark for Tacoma, and Marilyn Hansen for Bremerton. The job of Publicity Chairman is open.

There was a discussion about the broken display case at the Nordic Heritage Museum. There is also a damaged plate. It was approved that WRA pay to have a repair estimate for the case.

Reports were given on workshops: Vesla Harris, Tacoma - April 11-15; Judith Nelson, Trollhaugen - October 9-13 (filled).

Upcoming Mini Workshops are: Dena Iverson, Tacoma - April 1st on detailing; Lois Clauson, Seattle - April 1st on detailing; Connie Sullivan, Seattle - May 6th, Telemark; and Gudrun Berg, Tacoma - May 6th, Telemark. Members were asked for input on what they want for future mini workshops.

Dates and locations of Sales and Demonstrations were discussed. A chairman for Astoria, on June 17-18 is needed. The Haritage Festival in Redmond needs workers July 2nd and 4th. Workers are also needed for Scandinavian Days in Puyallup October 6-8.

It was passed that WRA join the Nordic Heritage Museum.

The door prize was a brush holder, won by Mary Kapp.

Jim Kittelsby spoke about the new Scandivanian Cultural Center at PLU and Florence Buck gave a slide show about the Epcot Center.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Nothing we do, as an organization, is more prestigeous, in my opinion, than the Juried Show and Exhibit. We who contribute stretch ourselves to be the best we can, summoning up from our very souls, wonderful ideas and painting them on wood for all to see and enjoy. We share with our members and the public our unique, exciting and beautiful art form that comes from norway.

In the past, our contributions for the Exhibit and Juried Show have been professionally displayed both in Tacoma at PLU and in Seattle at the Nordic Heritage Museum. We hope this year that we shall be invited to exhibit our show at the new Scandinavian Cultural Center in Tacoma as well as the Nordic Heritage Museum in Seattle. Our show may be displayed in Tacoma as early as November and December of 1989 and in Seattle the months of January 21st through March are targeted. The dates are tentative and speculative at this time but not the fact that we shall have a Juried Show and Exhibit sometime this Fall. Be ready!

As Addie Pittelkow says, "Don't start a piece and say - 'This is for the Juried Show.' Paint many pieces, then choose your best one."

The rules are printed in this issue of the Vine. Read them, select your category and plan to enter.

Original design seems to be a confusing term. Tracing and copying directly from a pattern is unethical and in some cases, illegal. Looking at a design for an idea, then using your own imagination, put down your design.

Check out the style you are painting. What leaves, flowers and scrolls are used primarily for that area? For example, Telemark scrolls, leaves and glowers go together. Paint first the scrolls, then the flowers. Outline first the scrolls, then the flowers, stem lines and other embellishments follow.

A scroll is a scroll, is a scroll. The same for many typical flowers. But placement, color combinations and especially, embellishments make the design uniquely yours! One can compare a rosemaling design to a musical composition. The notes are notes, are notes. The composition of these notes, the arrangement of them, the light notes, the crescendo, the smooth quality and many such descriptions of music can be applied to rosemaling.

The basic rosemaling strokes were in the last Vine. Outline strokes were taught April 1st in Tacoma and Seattle mini-workshops. Fill your mind with rosemaling by checking out books from our library. Then, from the deep recesses of your mind, flowing out from your number 6 flat and your number one or two outline brush, you will create a masterpiece that you will cherish forever. Your children will care for it as their children after them and so on and so one. Come on - get involved in out Juried Show and Exhibit. It's not too soon to be painting.

JURIED SHOW AND EXHIBIT - FALL 1989

Those who have won a blue ribbon may not compete in that classification again, but may advance to the next classification. Those who have won a blue ribbon in the Professioanl Clasification are invited to exhibit only.

Acrylics will be considered for exhibit only.

CLASSIFICATIONS:

Beginner Those who have painted 2 years or less. May use pattern or original design.

Intermediate Has not taught on a regular basis. Design must be the original work of the artist.

Professioanl
Those who teach or have taught on a regular basis.

Design must be the original work of the artist and no part of the design may be copied from another.

ENTRY RULES:

- 1. Any member of Western Rosemaler's Association may participate in the Juried Show and Exhibit.
- 2. Only two articles may be entered in the Juried Show. Both must be in the same classification.
- 3. Articles must have been painted within the last three years and must not have been entered in any other Juried Show.
- 4. There is no size limit; however, the painted design should be large enough to allow the judges to appraise technique, design, and color.
- 5. No monochromatic colors.
- 6. Entries must be painted on wood with oil paints.
- 7. Wet or sticky entries will not be accepted.
- 8. The artist should not sign his/her name to the entry. If the name is on the entry, it should be covered with opaque tape.
- 9. If the entry is to be hung, it must have a proper hanger (screw eyes and wire).
- 10. Entries must not have been painted in a class or under the supervision of an instructor.
- 11. A screening committee will review all entries to determine if all criteria are met.

- 12. Each entry must have an identification label attached to the back. The registration label must be complete and the return shipping fees and entries should arrive together.
- 13. Articles must remain throughout the exhibits.
- 14. If you want to sell your articles, list price on the entry form. Remember, the Museum will take a 20% commission.
- 15. Judges will be Florence Buck and Vesla Harris. The point system that the judging will be based on will be announced later.

The Exhibit and Juried Show opens January 21st at the Nordic Heritage Museum in Seattle and will run through March 18, 1990. While it is there, Marianne would like the rosemalers to demonstrate on Saturdays and Sundays.

We hope to be invited to display our Juried Show and Exhibit at the Scandinavian Cultural Center at PLU in Tacoma prior to having it at the Museum — in November and December. Paint, paint, paint so you'll be ready!

A lovely cake time, rosemaled by Addie Pittlekow, was on display at the March meeting. Addie painted it especially for our Exhibit and Juried Show. It will remain in the WRA collection of Rosemaling.

If you, or someone you know, made a costume which you no longer want, and would like to sell it, contact Marie Ganfield. There is one available in size 14. Marie has the details.

MARCH "SHOW AND TELL" TABLE

Many interesting rosemaled pieces and snapshots were displayed on the "show and tell" table at the March meeting. The Board feels that all the members would like to see what each of us is doing in the Mini-Workshops and Workshop Seminars each month.

On the table were snapshots from Vesla Harris' class taught in Seattle last year. There were rosemaled examples from Kathy Anderson's two day class in January of 1989. Kathy's pattern which appeared in the March Vine, several very nice plates, and a trunk done by members who took the class were all displayed.

Also on the table were the sign-up sheets for our future Mini-Workshops and snaps of rosemaled pieces done by the teachers who will be teaching the classes.

Fern Nelson is kindly sharing the recipes that she brought to the March meeting.

UNIQUE PRALINES

20-22 double graham crackers
Sliced almonds
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar (tightly packed)

Break graham crackers in half so there are 40-44 crackers. Arrange them very close together in a single layer on an ungreased cookie sheet. Sprinkle generously with sliced almonds. In a small saucepan, melt the butter and stir in the brown sugar. Boil slowly 2-3 minutes, stirring constantly. Will incorporate and thicken. Spoon over crackers immediately to cover all. Bake at 350 degrees for 7 minutes. Cool. Melt about 3-4 ozs of chocolate chips and dribble over top of crackers. Let chocolate set and remove with spatula.

WAFFLE IRON COOKIES OR TURTLE COOKIES

Melt 1/2 cup butter or margarine and 2 squares bitter chocolate together and add the following:

2/3 cup sugar 2 beaten eggs 1 cup flour 1/2 tsp salt

(no baking powder)

1 teaspoon vanilla

Bake in waffle iron at medium heat for 1 1/2-2 minutes. (Drop by teaspoons on seasoned waffle iron.) Remove carefully. Heat and softten caramels with a <u>small</u> amount of cream or evaporated milk. Dab a little on each cookie and cover with chocolate buttercream frosting. A pecan half laid on top of caramel before frosting makes an authentic "turtle" cookie.

Mini-workshop on Detailing - April 1st in Seattle

Lois gave us two designs - one Hallingdal and one Telemark - which we transferred on two of the three off-white painted background tagboards. We filled in the scrolls and flowers and then put them aside. We took our third tagboard and practiced detailing freehand with ideas taken from Lois' demonstrations and from details in patterns she furnished us.

In the afternoon we took the Telemark and Hallingdal designs and detailed them from our own practice sheet. Lois gave three demonstrations and gave each one of us help in defining the light detailing of Telemark and the heavier detailing for Hallingdal.

This was an extremely good class and was a great help in correcting some bad detailing that we are prone to fall into. The class will be bringing their finished work for the display table at the May meeting. Mini-workshop on Detailing - April 1st in Tacoma
