

Unless this notice appears on each copy, an author, such as Mr. Witty, loses his right to keep others from copying. The notice serves to warn the public of the author's as-

sertion of his rights. Since 1955 the use of the symbol c has been more widespread in this country, in order to confer international protection of an author's works. By treaty, other countries recognize our copyrighted works and afford them full protection if the copyright notice includes the symbol c, the owner's name and year of publication. Since both domestic and international literary protection depend upon it, the short copyright notice should never be ignored.

They gave me a much needed lift to continue writing, sending out copies of my editorials and in general making a fuss about the things I believe in. Now don't get me wrong. I take no credit for any of the recent events. It just proves that if enough of us have our say, action will be forthcoming.

I refer in this case to the proposed action for the benefit of our teenagers. Abraham Ribicoff, Secretary of Health, has taken a stand to have our child labor laws eased so that, as he puts it, "Today's children may be allowed to have a valuable taste of useful, gainful employment."

So far everyone that has made any such remarks, particularly those like myself, who are in business, have been accused of trying to get cheap labor or make a dent in the unions stand to preserve work for their adult members. Such has not been my motive. I firmly believe in the old adage that the school of hard knocks cannot be beat. As well I believe that school alone cannot make of a child a man ready to combat the world and make his mark therein.

Let's give our kids a break. Let's give them a chance to learn by doing. Let's get the anchors off their necks by easing our laws so that business can give these youngsters a chance without breaking half a dozen laws, going through a mile of red tape or, worse yet, ending up with a line of pickets in front of their establishments.

It only takes a 4c stamp to let Ribicoff know you agree with him and that he has your support.

Now to the second item of news that made me want to rush out and yell, "Well Done!" to some of our legislators. I refer now to those foresighted individuals who had a part in creating the Youth Development and Conservation Corps camp near Easton. Here 38 teenage boys are now encamped, working on trails and campsites in our mountain area, much the same as some of their fathers worked in the old CCC camps.

This first group is, of course, just a selected group of boys who will be the nucleous of larger groups to come. There are 38 boys in camp today. I hope by this time next year there will be 3,800 and the year after that 38,000.

Here again is a new chance for our teenagers to learn by doing, to take pride in accomplishment and to better themselves through proper instruction and environment.

Sam Long, assistant director of the State's Park Dept., is the administrator of the Youth Development and Conservation Corps. If you believe that he is on the right track in aiding our youth, let him know.

Let's get off the dime and give these people a howl of approval that will be heard through the halls of the state capitol and the pentagon.

On the above many of you will speak up (I hope), each without fear of criticism, for your speaking will be one of praise and support. Why then will not you same people speak out when you have a criticism to make? The answer is, I think, fear of misinterpretation of your remarks by fellow neighbors. That and nothing more. Each of you are an American and as such you have the right of free speach, yet you hesitate to take a

Day in and day out we hear about communism and the insideous way that it creeps into our midst. I firmly believe that because so many of you wonder what a communist is like without really having ever met an admitted one, that you are afraid to speak out in criticism of our governmental operation for fear 20, 1961. you may be mistaken for one, or even have it hinted that you are slightly pinkish in your thinking. Honest criticism of the operation of our government certainly should not be taken as anything but your right to speak out for that which you think is right. After all, those who run the government are but employees of us all and how else shall they become aware of our wishes unless we speak up.

More often than not when I speak up through this media my writings are of a nature of criticism rather than praise. but death alone will shut me up for I feel that strong about my rights as an American citizen. Abraham Lincoln once made a remark that I believe in feverently, and I quote . . . "The legit imate object of government is to do for a community of people whatever they need to have done, but cannot do at all, or cannot so well do, for themselves, in their separate and individual capacities. In all that people can individually do as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere."

To me it was a pleasure to read of the warm reception afforded Gen. Douglas MacArthur by the Fillipino people. The stories of his trip brought back to mind many familier names and long forgotten memories. One story that traveled through the jungle comes to mind. It seems a young sailor had volunteered to drive a navy truck across Bataan to Subic Bay and subsequently while sightseeing had missed his official ride back. After oiling up his thumb in good old American style, he started out along the dusty road. Time and again military trucks and cars roared by, ignoring the familiar sign of the sailor seeking a ride. After walking around a sharp turn the sailor heard a car approaching and assumed the usual outstretched arm position. Around the bend came a big black limosine and to the sailor's horror he found he was trying to hitch a ride with Gen. MacArthur. The thumb-out pose changed to a quick salute and the General returned the salute with the car coming to a quick stop. "Hop in", Published in the Times Journal said General MacArthur to the sailor. George Purcell , county extension agent, said this is a short summary of the outlook for hogs just received from Karl Hobson, WSU Extension price Specialist.

Other details from Hobson's outlook are listed by Purcell as follows:

Last spring's pig crop for the nation as a whole was 7 per cent above a year earlier. This estimate is from the June pig survey of the Crop Reporting Board. The increase in the spring pig crop indicates that hog prices this fall are likely to be down about 15 per cent or \$2.50 per hundred pounds from last fall. They are likely to average around \$16.50 per hundred pounds at Spokane this fall and winter.

Hog prices are likely to decline still more in 1962. However, the 1962 decline is likely to be small. This is indicative by the intentions of hog growers throughout the country to farrow only 2 per cent more sows this fall than a year earlier.

Ordinarily hog prices decline fairly rapidly during the year following the first 6 months of the cycle's downward swing. A more gradual decline is likely this time because the expansion in hog output is being slowed down by rising feed




