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## Bethel District Will Elect Board, Vote On Millage

Bethel School District will be asking voters to approve levies amounting to \$100,000 for maintenance and operation and building fund for 1964, according to news items released by school officials this week.

A large turnout of voters would be necessary to validate these issues and a 60% "yes" vote is required to pass. \$80,000 of the amount is earmarked for maintenance and operation, but according to the school board, would cost taxpayers slightly less than the current levy because of increased district assessed valuation.

The money would be used to maintain a high education level, replace obsolete transportation equipment and to complete necessary building and grounds maintenance and improvements.

More than 200 additional students are expected to register in Bethel schools next year. To maintain a favorable classroom-pupil ratio, more teachers will be hired, expansion of services in librarian and psychologist personnel will be accomplished, dependent upon passage of the levy.

With State kindergarten support being the same as this year, the levy is also necessary to maintain kindergartens, the board noted.

Each building site is in need of preventative maintenance and some desirable improvements. Such items as roofing, painting, additional furniture, ground surfacing and fire protection measures would be possible with the levy money.

The \$20,000 for the building fund would make it possible to purchase sites for future buildings in the area where population growth is making available sites harder to find each year.

Also, the money would provide school directors with the means to meet emergency classroom and equipment needs.

Statements of school director candidates to be voted on in the general election March 12 follow, furnished by the Bethel District from questionnaires given each candidate with the same group of questions:

**District No. 2, four year term:** H. L. Ashmore, incumbent, Ashmore, 43, lives at 165th and Pacific Ave., with his wife and four children, all attending Bethel Schools. A pharmacist, Ashmore operates Ashmore's Spanaway Drug Store. He is a graduate of the U. of W. College of Pharmacy and has lived in the Bethel District for five years. He was appointed to the School Board and has been a Director since October 1962. He is Board Chairman of his church and Treasurer of Boy Scout Troop No. 34, Spanaway.

"My position is that of any thinking parent who wants the best possible education for our children with the best possible use of our school

tax money," Mr. Ashmore says.

Delbert M. Bresemann, 48, lives on Spanaway Lake, his birthplace. He attended Spanaway Grade School, Lincoln High School, PLU and UPS. He served as Justice of the Peace at Spanaway for 24 years and is currently Bethel area Director of Civil Defense. He has also served as a member of Spanaway Church Council, Secretary of Spanaway Improvement Club and Fire District 7, Spanaway Boy Scout Troop Commissioner, Advisor in DeMolay and Bible class teacher in his church.

Mr. Bresemann states, "I wish to see the educational system continue to the highest degree as there is no substitute to education. I believe that our educational system must expand to our growing community and that every dollar spent must be spent only for education and not for wasted frills. It is my opinion that athletics are a part of our education system and must continue to grow with the community. Civil Defense shelters would be provided, and a program of understanding should be made available both to the students and to all of the people living in the community. I strongly favor first aid classes, medical self-help programs, family survival such as we are presently teaching in the public schools without any costs to the taxpayers whatsoever."

**District No. 3, four year term:** Dr. Randolph Valentine is 27 years old, has lived in Bethel District for two years and at his present address of Route 1, Box 1229, Spanaway, for a year. He is married and the father of a one-year-old child. He is a graduate of Montezano High School, Grays Harbor College and Washington State University with Bachelor of

Science and Doctor of Veterinary Medicine Degrees. He says, "As a permanent resident of our community and looking forward to having my own children in school I have a very definite interest in the quality and management of our school system."

**District No. 4, four year term:** Mrs. Phyllis Connelly, incumbent, Mrs. Connelly, 42, has been a resident of Bethel District for 15 years. She, husband Donald and their six children live on Route 1, Box 201, Eatonville. Experienced in secretarial and clerk-typist work, Mrs. Connelly has been a Kapowsin PTA member for 15 years and served two years as its President. She has been Secretary of Pierce County P-TA Council and a Community Chest Representative, and has been a Bethel School Director for two years.

She says: "I am extremely interested in our schools and have tried to contribute any assistance I could to maintain a high standard of education in the Bethel School District."

# Candidates Make Statements In Coming FP School Board Election

## Three Positions On Ballot In F-P District

Ten candidates for the 3 open positions on the Franklin Pierce School Board of directors will be on the ballot Tuesday, March 12th. Voters in the district will cast their choice for each of the positions, as voting for candidates is not restricted to only the voters living in the particular district.

The three positions open are: District 1, which takes in parts of the Parkland-James Sales area; District 3, which is largely the Harvard-Midland area; District 4, covering the Central Avenue area. The terms for each of these positions is four years.

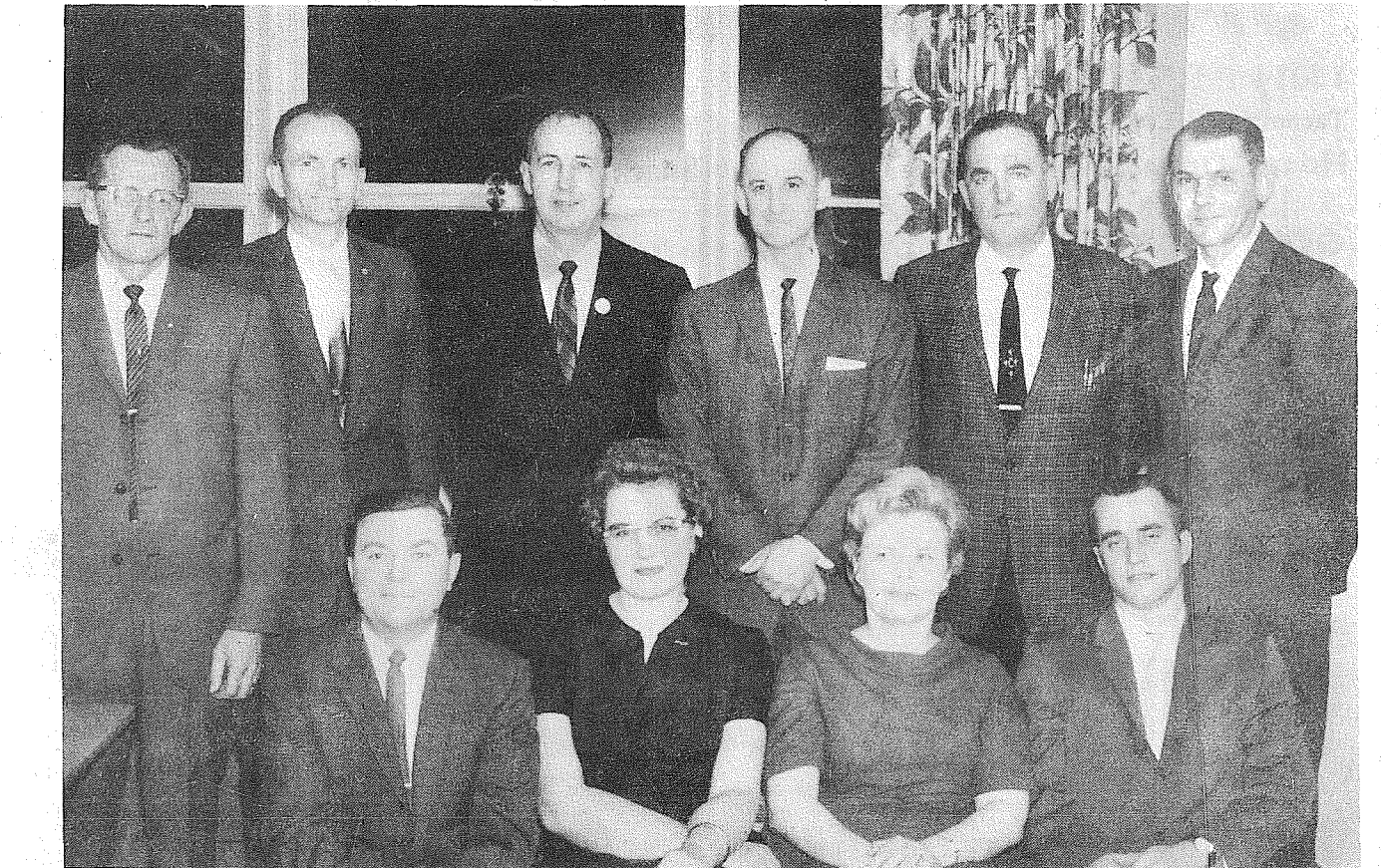
For the voting public to be better informed, a statement from each of the candidates is presented through the cooperation of the Times Journal and the Franklin Pierce School District Parent Teacher Association.

Voting for District 1 are Mrs. Phyllis K. Erickson, George Potter, Edward M. Stricherz, and LeRoy Trett.

Mrs. Erickson states, "I have a sincere interest in promoting continued quality education. I have worked actively with children and youth in our community for ten years and I have a real concern about children's education. Care in administering school funds and consideration of school problems is one of the needs that I recognize. Stress on the importance of public relations by promoting good communication and be an available, informed, school board member is another of my beliefs."

George Potter declares: "Trying times lie ahead. With our legislature threatening to reduce State funds for education and creeping inflation constantly eroding our purchasing power, the people of this district must send to the School Board directors who will conscientiously and energetically explore every possible means of stretching the tax dollar to preserve our fine school system and never cease attempting to improve it. To this end I dedicate my time and ability giving you the representation you deserve on the school board."

Qualifications are stated by Edward Stricherz: "I have an unselfish interest in community schools and in every child. I can think independently and objectively about school problems. I am capable of recognizing and distinguishing between administration and the policy functions of the board. I also have a layman's relationship to public education. I feel strongly that non-certified people should be given an opportunity to progress in pay and position. My experience as a

teacher is 24 years. If elected I will do my best at all times."

Candidate LeRoy Trett comments: "I believe that (1) Board members should take an active part in the formation of the district's policies. ## Mayfair School On \$600,000 Bond Issue

Voters in the Franklin Pierce School District will be asked to go to the polls next month to approve a \$600,000 bond issue and excess levies amounting to approximately 20 mills.

The bonds, according to Edwin L. Nelson, superintendent, will be used to construct and equip a new elementary school near the Mayfair Estates and purchase and improve other sites for future building in the District. In addition, the bond issue will provide funds to construct a permanent grandstand on the new athletic field being constructed at the high school. The new field is being built with State Highway funds because the old field lies in the path of a new freeway.

Excess levies are designed to purchase additional school buses to ease the crowded conditions now present and to improve the schedules. Also, continued support of kindergartens in the District is dependent upon excess funds being voted by the people. Full state support of this program is lacking now. The remainder of the excess levy request will be used to

pay the cost of general maintenance and operation of school facilities for the next year.

Nearly 2,600 votes are needed to validate the election, Nelson pointed out.

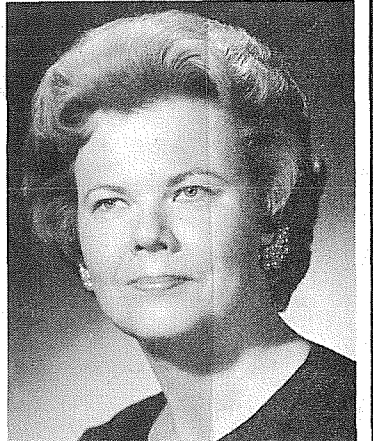

To the Times Journal and readers: It is stimulating to see the interest in regard to sewers in Parkland. Of the many

comments I have heard and read about this issue there is one very important point that seems to receive only slight attention; this is the danger to the health of the whole community if we continue as we are.

The rapid growth of this area resulting from the vast number of houses being built has increased the possibilities of severe illness from poor sanitation. As a nurse I am aware of the suffering, and pain, and expense—that disease can cause. Is it wise to pinch pennies on sewers and have to spend much more in dollars to restore health? I agree, the cost of living is difficult to keep up with; each one of us has trouble figuring how we will pay for everything. We each have to take time to consider what things are more important. Over a period of twenty years the cost of having a good sewer system would be like having additional health insurance; actually, it would be better, because we would be eliminating the risk of disease from one source for a lot of people—not just ourselves.

Even though I live within the boundaries of the present sewer district, and have not had any septic tank problem so far, it seems as though sewers are a must in Parkland if we want good healthy progress. I would rather pay for sewers than have medical bills for illnesses result-

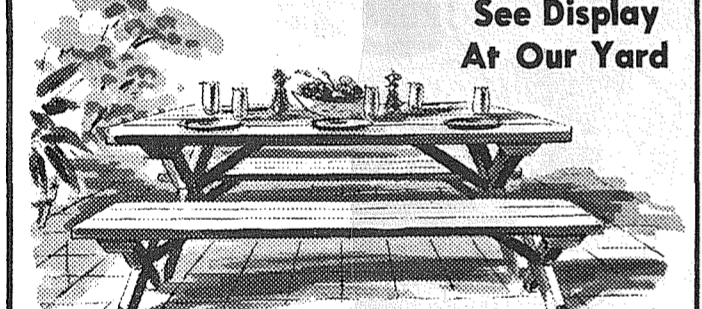

### a - Wondering and a - Wandering ....

with Jack Brown

Had to laugh a little last night. I took my first ride from street to street in Tacoma's new escalator and couldn't help but feel sort of guilty. I wonder how the city planners that spent thousands for this little trinket feel now, with the president yelling for everyone to get off their duff and take a walk.

Just a passing thought: Time is not kind to all, but it does seem to favor the gentle.

Just recently at a Tucson airport I met a friend from Indiana who had just landed, on his way south. After discussing our families, mutual friends and the weather, the subject of his trip south came up as I knew he had a real nice place up on the lakes in Wisconsin. From this conversation came fruit for thought. He had sold his summer home due solely to a conflict between himself and the local administrators of public power; R.E.A.

It seems that each year he opened his cabin for about three months of the year and he, his family and friends enjoyed it immensely. Electric power was furnished by a surplus generator he had acquired and all went well until the R.E.A. entered the picture. Permanent residents in the area brought about the electrification of the area, like it or not, his summer home was included along the line. This seemed well and good, so he paid his share, disposed of the generator and things went fine until time to close the home for the summer. He locked up, shut off all the lights and in due course received light bills that varied little with those received during the time the home was occupied. When he queried officials on the matter he was told that he must pay his share regardless of whether he lived in the house or not as his property was on the line. He paid the bill under protest and then had the power line to his house removed for the winter. The bills continued to come and the following summer found him in court defending his actions for not paying for service not received. He lost, and completely at odds with the R.E.A., sold the summer home and turned to his airplane for vacationing.

As I see it, this is a shining example of what the long arm of government can do when they dabble in the everyday affairs of the citizenry. They regulate, enforce and fine without recourse, and who is to say, "This is un-American. You can't do it." They do it any way!

Which would you rather deal with? A private enterprise such as Puget Sound Power and Light, governed by good practices and regulations dictated by a competitive field, or the R.E.A., who's word is law and final? Personally I think the government of the United States has no business in business. Regardless of what the case, give the problem to private industry and the need will be filled on a basis concurrent with the dictations of a free society.

With school board elections in the offing it will do well to give careful consideration to the candidates, their qualifications, their aims and their basic purpose in running. The considerations are manifold and just credit should be given all for their very entry into the field of candidates.

I note with interest the statement submitted to this paper by Mrs. Jack Erickson, appearing elsewhere in this edition. I feel that she has touched on one subject of utmost importance. In her statement she pledges herself, if elected, to keep the public informed of the manner in which the duties of the school board are carried out and to likewise keep a weather eye on the community attitude towards the school district.

I am not at all sure I have heard anyone give these matters position of importance before when running for the board. I feel they are deserving of support, namely because we here in the newspaper office hear, far too often, the old cry, "I didn't know." "You didn't have it in your paper." Too few people realize that a weekly newspaper must operate in a different manner than a daily. In covering the major portion of a county it is impossible for us to send reporters out to each and every meeting taking place daily. We must rely upon people such as Mrs. Erickson who feels that the residents of the area should know this or that to bring us the material. Too often people offer as an excuse the reason for failing to advise us of some matter of importance the old familiar barnyard cry of "What's the use? They won't print it anyhow," or "What's the use? They favor the other school, church, or whatever it may be."

To this I say . . . hogwash. If you or you or you bring us an article of community interest that hasn't already been published, then you can bet your bottom dollar it will be in the paper and with our thanks as well.

Just remember, the wheel that squeaks the most gets the grease, and if you feel your organization is not getting its fair share of T.J. space, check your own publicity chairman and see if she or he isn't using one of the familiar cries to cover up an indifference on their own part and the lack of effort required to bring the information to our attention.

To me as a newsman hearing these cries over the years, Mrs. Erickson's words regarding an informed public are music to my ears. I am wont to think that if she is elected we here at the T.J. may see more action from some publicity chairmen.

As an afterthought to the above. Perhaps some of you other candidates will feel slighted over this article. Mrs. Erickson took the time to come into my office and make me aware of her position and in so doing gave me the impression that she intends to practice what she preaches. Did you?

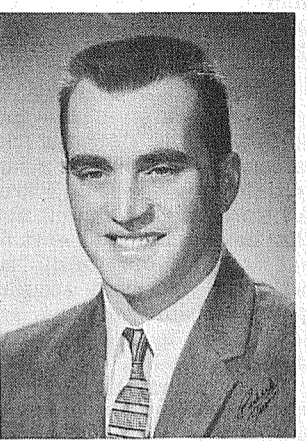

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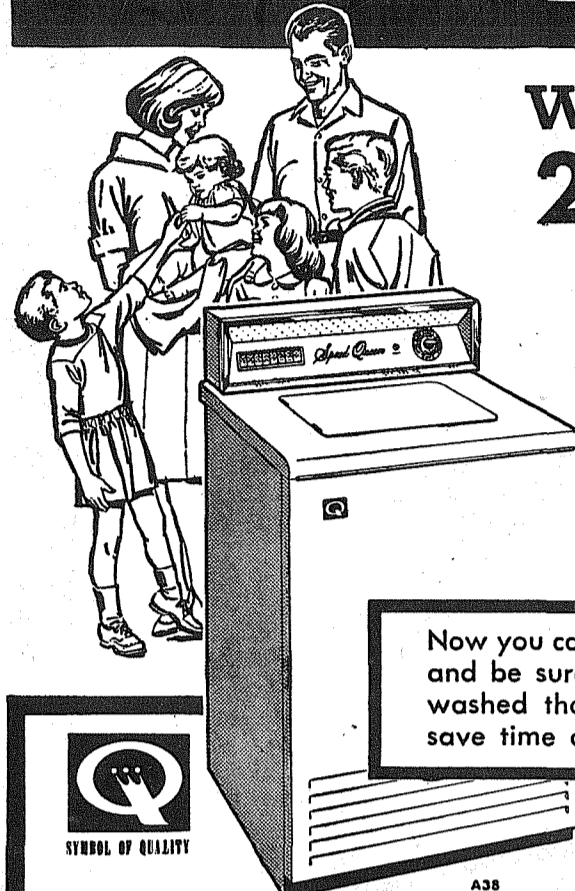

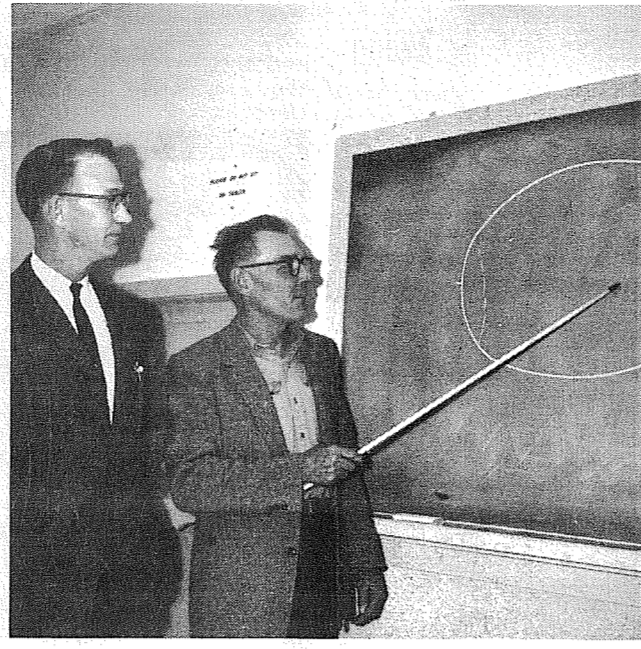
