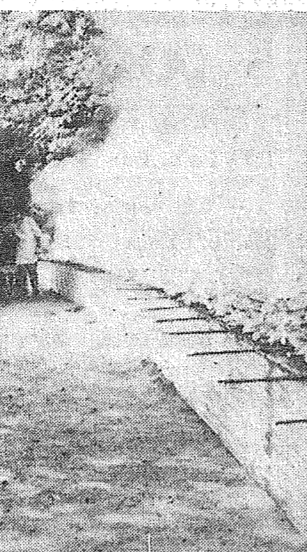

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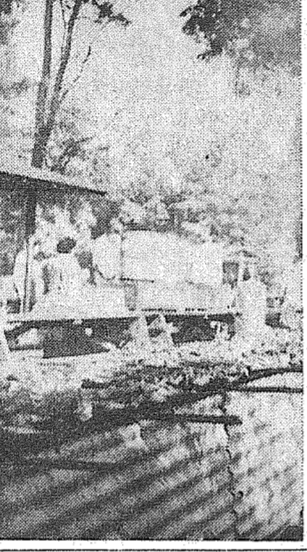

Horsesense Good Tonic For Summer Brush And Grass Fires

Horsesense is the best rule for fire prevention, says Parkland Fire Chief "Bud" Larson in this weeks Parkland Fire Department release designed to warn the public about the current and ever-increasing brush fire hazards.

"Brush and grass fires are the rule almost every day in Parkland," reports the Parkland Fire Chief, "and the main culprit is the burning barrel, the most favorite method of trash disposal.

Larson advised Parkland residents that a proper burning barrel is a "must". Defining the barrel, he said, "It should be a good solid barrel with a screen on top". It should be located as far from buildings and high grass as possible.

Residents without burning barrels are advised to get burning permits available anytime at 114th Street just east of Pacific Avenue at the Fire Hall. Fire permits will be issued on a day-to-day basis as long as hazardous conditions exist.

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

With JACK BROWN

Suppose the proposal to extend the federal wage-hour law to retail business — which has always been exempt — were passed? What would happen? Would marginal and unskilled workers — the kind extension would reach directly — be helped?

Something said by the head of a retail company which has 13 small stores in small communities may help answer this question. This retailer employs 39 high school students for Saturday work, evening openings, and peak seasons. The students work part time and are paid less than the federal minimum wage.

The retailer was asked if he would continue to use the high school students if required to pay them the federal minimum. He said: "Definitely not. I like using high school students because it gives the kids a chance to work. Besides, in the small communities where my stores are located—it is good public relations. But the cost of using these kids under the Wage-Hour Law is prohibitive. I've got my plans figured out, if covered by the Wage-Hour Law. I can make my stores self-serve and replace the 39 high school students with a lesser number of employees who are more capable of earning a higher hourly rate. I don't want to put these high school kids out of a part time job, but . . ."

What it all comes down to is that, if the law demands wage and hour standards which are excessive in view of a worker's productivity and value to the employer, the employment concerned will be cut to the limit. In the case of retailing, many kinds of marginal workers, in addition to high school students, would be hit, and hard.

Here again is a case where the do-gooders may end up cutting the throats of those they propose to help.

Literally hordes of our young people roam the country today with little or no chance to obtain part time work as it is. Why make it tougher on them when there aren't enough jobs to go around now? If the federal minimum wage and hour law is extended there will be even less and less opportunities for these youngsters.

In my way of thinking we are operating in reverse. Everyone is yelling about juvenile delinquents yet the powers that be seem reluctant to do anything about it and are overcome with worry over the earning power of those youngsters fortunate enough to have a chance to pick up some extra spending money and further their knowledge. Why not let them keep on working and learning and try to create more of these jobs instead of putting a crimp in the existing program.

As an employer covered by the federal wage and hour laws, I know whereof I speak. In my case there are many times I would be delighted to give some young fellow a chance to pick up some extra money doing odd jobs around here, cleaning presses etc, a job whereby he could easily learn something, yet I am forced to hand out all of these jobs to my own two boys. When they are gone on vacation the jobs go begging for I dare not hire any other than my own flesh and blood at the wages that the job is actually worth.

I'd like to hire some young girl to work here on Saturday just to answer the phone so that our regular office girl could work Monday thru Friday, but there again I am stymied. A girl taking such a job would get some wonderful experience preparatory to taking up journalism in college, yet I by law cannot even have her in the office to observe and learn unless she is paid the minimum federal wage.

So it all boils down to one thing. I nor any other employer covered by these regulations can hire anyone unless they have the experience to warrant the wage scale stipulated. Now I'll ask you a question; Where in blazes are the young people of today going to get that experience?

As far as I can see we'd better revise the old CCC or something similar and start giving our youngsters some sort of a break where they can get a little experience and do something beside drifting around like jetsom on the tide.

Many people call or write and give me material or ideas for this column and I must say that I certainly appreciate this interest but in fairness to all I'd like you to know that at present I am overloaded with ideas. I have just about enough on hand for a full year so if you have sent in or called in, with a subject you would like me to wander around with, please be patient. I'll get to it as soon as possible.

Many of us do not realize that the soil attributes of the Puyallup Valley, along with the gentle Puget Sound weather, are the main factors that our blueberry and rasp-

berry growers in the Valley produce the greatest yields per acre of these two bush fruits in the nation. The first commercial planting of blueberries in Washington was established by J. A. Aves of Puyallup back around 1925. This was an 8 acre planting — really something at that time. It was from this pioneering in blueberries by Mr. Aves that has made Pierce county the leading producing county in the state. Shortly after World War II, Charles (Chuck) Bond came to Puyallup and became most interested in blueberries. In 1948 he

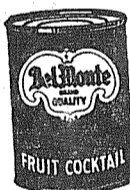

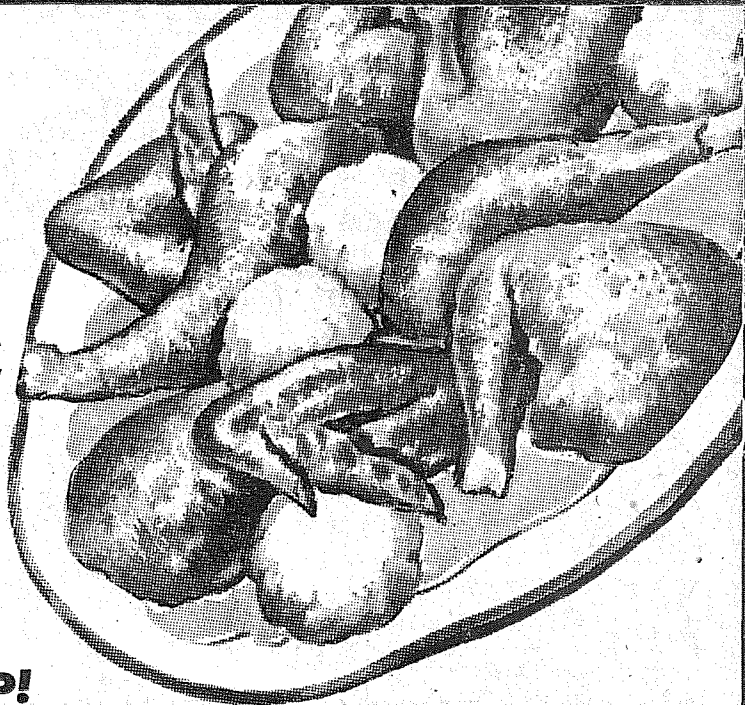
