GS Day Camps Use Odd Items

Cleaning out the closet? Re-arranging the garage so the car will fit inside again? Chances are many of the items you have earmarked for the bonfire can be put to good use by the Girl Scout Day Camps.

For instance, they can use decals (any size or kind) large tin can lids, coffee cans and lids, sardine cans, tuna fish cans, "Spam" type cans, fruit juice cans, cottagecheese cartons and metal lids, plastic detergent bottles, round boxes, hosiery boxes, walnut shell halves, egg cartons, egg shell halves broken lengthwise (put in boxes so they won't break), egg shells dried and broken and put in jars or boxes, buttons, yarn, crepe paper, seeds of all kinds, wooden spoons, wallpaper, wall paper paste plywood, finished lumber, feathers, broom sticks, and Plaster of Paris, quick dry paint and wire screen.

We are rapidly losing our sense of values and our sense of humor. When anyone will take the trouble to go to court over the matter of a prayer their sense of the proper becomes overdeveloped.

Anytime a parent can't take the time to explain a few of the differences with which we live in this country, laziness has taken over. The difference in the form of a prayer is not so important as the fact of recognition of dependence on God, or a greater being than ourselves, or whatever name you wish to call the Creator of the Universe.

This attitude is evident in other areas of our national life. The posturing of extremists on either side of the fence, when they take an attitude of "if you don't agree with me completely, then you are wrong" leads to much of the trouble we are having.

When a man can be labeled as an agent for a foreign power because of a difference in determination of terms, or of interpre-

for conservatives, liberals, and middle-of-the-roads, whatever those terms have come to mean in these days. I enjoy learning the differences of opinion which exist between thinking people. I do not enjoy being accused of hearing another person being accused of frightful things because his definition of terms or his argument is different from another person's.

To brand anyone a Communist because he wishes peace and because his ideas of achieving it are different from yours, is I think a sign of laziness. Give to every man his day on the floor, then if his ideas differ, define your terms and plow into the argument with both feet.

Too many of us these days are prone to take a pronouncement of opinion by someone and quickly brand it a "Communist" line or to say "He's a John Birch-er".

My own inclination is to consider all opinions that I can gather on any subject, keep an open mind until the bulk of the facts are apparent and then make up my mind.

The curse of any family, organization or nation is a closed mind, individual or group.

a - Wondering and a - Wandering

with Jack Brown

One day while I was cooling my heels around an airport I happened to pick up a May 22nd copy of the Saturday Evening Post and read an editorial therein. It kind of stuck with me to the point that I borrowed another copy when I got home and re-read it. The more I think about it the more I think it contains fundamental statements which every American should remember, with pride and gratitude.

In part it says: "America is not a perfect society, and its people are not required to pretend that it is. Our newspapers, magazines, pundits and commentators constantly criticize the Government. The President of the United States reads an astonishing amount of this criticism. Sometimes he gets mad, and sometimes he accepts the advice of his critics. But although this country is by no means perfect, it is constantly changing for the better. The change is sometimes slow, but it happens without bringing up the tanks or purging our political leaders."

"All things considered, we believe that our system of government has enabled its people to achieve a better life than any other system on earth. This may sound like an immodest claim, but what other great nation has combined such a high standard of living with such a high degree of individual freedom? Communism? The Communists have murdered freedom in the streets of Budapest and East Berlin. They have promised a workers' paradise on earth, and they are unable to provide their people with enough to eat."

"We believe that government is not an end in itself. It exists solely to provide a climate in which the people may make the most of their abilities and live their own lives in security and peace. This means that government must be vigilant, and it must be active in many areas, but it must be the servant of the people and not their master."

On the lighter side of life it seems that I owe some people an apology. Last Friday on the way back from the San Juans I decided to get a boaters eye view of Puget Sound since the day was beautiful and I was in no hurry to get home. I eased off on the power, dropped down to about a hundred feet over the water and started cruising down the Sound at about 140 miles per hour taking in all the scenery like a starry eyed vacationer. Loafing along over the water I overtook several pleasure boats and a few commercial ships too. People on deck were eager to wave and I acknowledged their friendly gesture with a dip of the wing. All in all I was having a ball.

As I came upon one rather large boat it seemed the deck suddenly came alive with people doing the "Bare Bottom Scramble". This was once there were no friendly waves and I was glad to be past for fear of a shotgun blast. I have no way of knowing whether this was a bunch of YWCA girls out for a suntan cruise, or members of the sunbathers society. At any rate if you were one of those aboard, please believe me when I say that I didn't purposely invade your privacy, however I can't help but admit that your scrambling for the lower decks gave me quite a laugh.

The next time I do the scenic tour down the water you can bet I'm going to really slow that old plane down. You get more chance to observe the scenery that way... and man, what scenery.

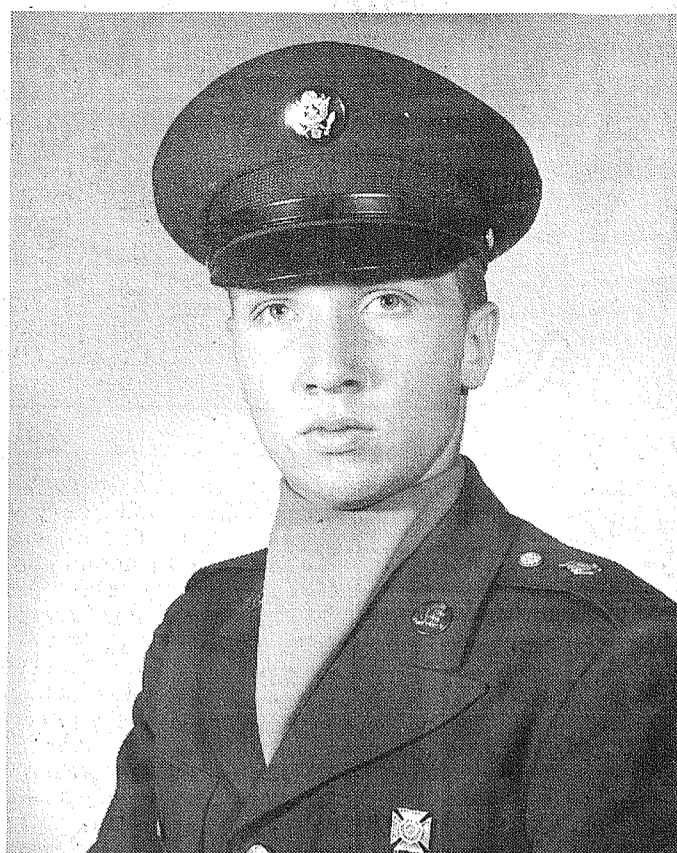

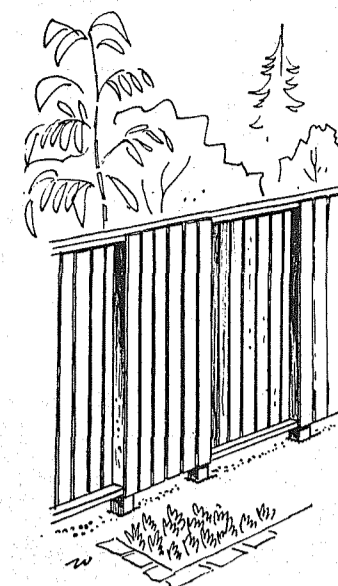

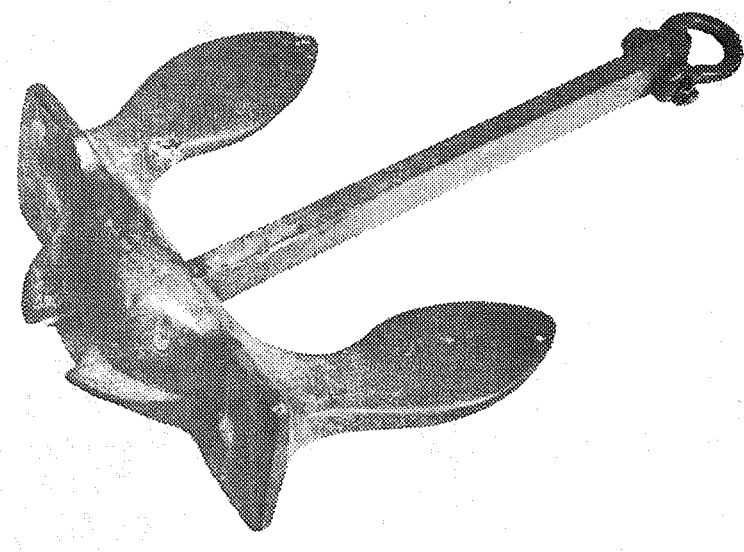

It was voted by the members to authorize the Directors to investigate the possibility of drilling their own wells. A report on this will be made in the near future.

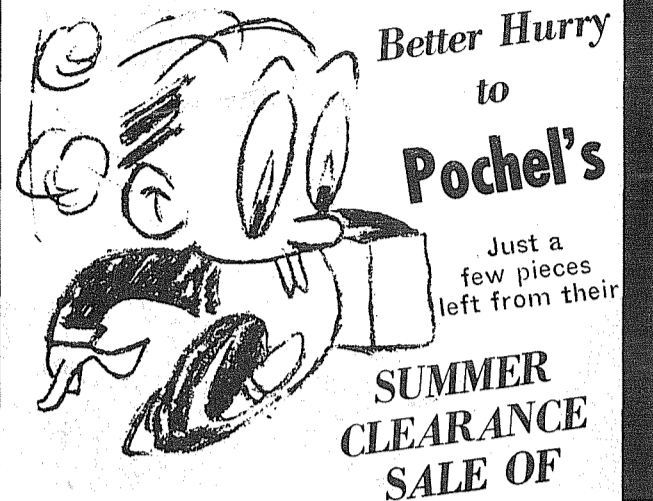

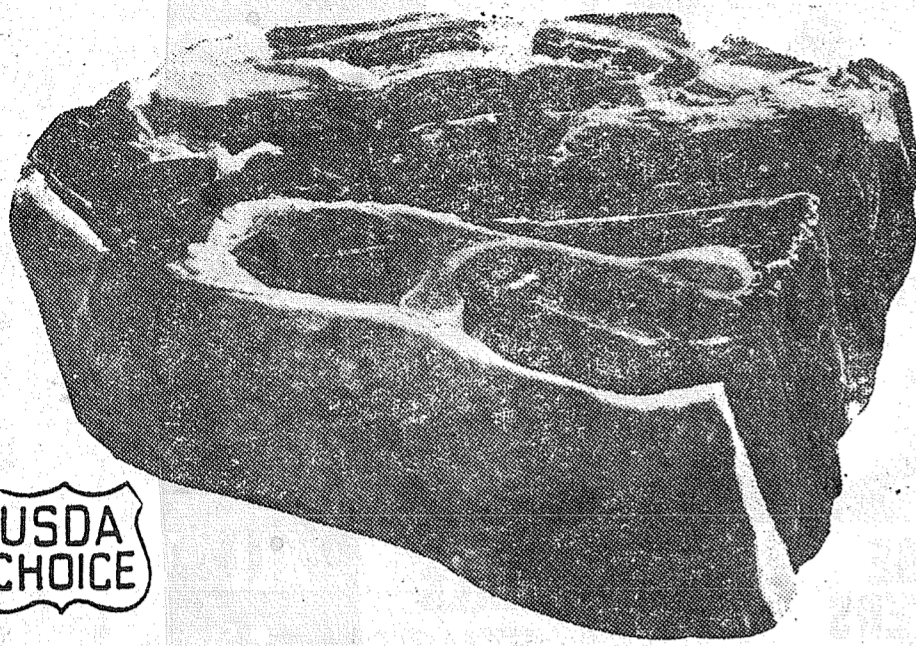
