

### a - Wondering and a-Wandering ....

#### with Jack Brown

Did you ever hear of an Ombudsman? Me neither, until the other night. Now this isn't some aspiration from the darni corners but in my estimation one of the most needed individuals, or service as it may be, in this once free land of ours.

Let's take a gander at the situation, the duties of an Ombudsman and the need for same.

How many times have you received what you considered to be a dirty deal from some pipsqueak on government rolls, working behind a counter on your buck and mine, and interpreting his agency's rules as he sees fit? I doubt it there is one adult in Pierce County who at some time or another has not felt the needle from some such a character. Far, far too many of our public servants get carried away with their own importance and become heady from the powers they believe we have bestowed upon them. Far, far too often this rough shod red tape treatment is meted out on some minor field that doesn't warrant going to court and John Q. Citizen goes storming home fretting over an arbitrary ruling that reflected either per-sonal bias or a defect in the law, feeling that there was nothing he could do about it.

Occasionally one of these self appointed gods gets hauled across the counter by some irate citizen for his lumps but the net result is usually that said citizen gets to cool his heels in the bucket for awhile. Obviously, this is not the answer to the problem. In this giant state we must, it seems, deal with these people continually for there seems to be some bureau dealing with all phases of our life thru health, solvency and liberty.

I should here and now, in all fairness, say that this type of government official I have pinpointed is in the minority but let's face it....they do exist in far too plentiful numbers. Can something be done about them?

Scandinavia shows us what and how. There the voters have installed in office an official called the Ombudsman. He is totally independent, and his sole duty is to look into any grievance a citizen may have against bureau or bureaucrat. His powers are broad and include the right to see the relevent files, to question the bureaucrat thus accused and if he so finds, to award redress. The Ombudsman stands, in other words, between the often lost, confused, lonely, irate citizen and the vague, arrogant and often terrifying powers of the state. An editorial in National Review on the Ombudsman

observes that civil service...the bureaucracy...views any such plan in America with grave misgivings ... That in itself is eloquent testimony to the soundness of the plan and the need for it.

When will we as American citizens, certain of legitimate grievance against one of the vast bureaucracies, be free to knock on the door of the Ombudsman here in America, be made welcome, be encouraged to state our case and finally if right is on our side. be afforded our just rights?

It can come to pass if enough of us have the courage to speak out for the program. Where do we start?


