#### **School Posts** To Be Contested

All four school director positions in the Bethel School

District up for election on March 12 will be contested.
Filings indicate that the District 2, four year term, held by H. L. Ashmore, will be contested by D. L. Bresemann; the District 3 four mann; the District 3, four year term, where E. W. Webster seeks re-election, has Randolph Valentine also filed for the post; Phyllis Connelly, incumbent District 4 directions ector, will be opposed by Louis E, Nichols for the fouryear term; and in District 5, where Elsie Berggren is filling an unexpired term, she will be opposed by Bert L. Smith.

Voters will vote for a candidate in each district and the candidate with the majority wins election.

On the same ballot, Bethel School District directors have placed two special millage propositions.

The first millage proposition is for a general fund levy of \$80,000 for maintenance and operation. This is a replacement levy, according to the board, the same amount having been voted the past two years. The money is to be used to maintain a high education level, replace obsolete transportation equipment and maintain present level of transportation serv-

Total cost of the two structures was \$1,170,000, and they were financed by a long term loan of \$1,100,000 from the Federal Housing and HOME Finance Agency, with the National Bank of Washington, Tacoma, as the local financing agency.



## **Parkland Sewer District**

More Thoughts On

#### The Editor:

We have noticed that those who are opposed to sewers who volunteered to divide up now are the ones who were the sewer district for the peoopposed to them from the start. The difference now is that they justify their stand by misinterpreting the recent pollution articles in the newspapers. They would have us believe that it is worse to empty processed chlorinated effluent into the Sound than to keep it here in our roadside ditches.

Our engineering and construction problems here in Parkland are comparatively simple: gravity trunk, gentle slopes, mostly straight streets few sidewalks to replace, not too much blacktop or pavement yet. It will never cost less to construct sewers here than at the present time.

The engineer and financial advisors have spent much time and money developing our plans. They work on a contingent basis. They know that unless the sewer system is built they will not get paid for their work. You can guess that these men are hardheaded practical businessmen. They believe that Parkland must, and will, have sewers. The Pollution Control Commission must think we need sewers, otherwise why would they offer us a quart-







Just recently I had the opportunity to interview some the Doukaboors of B.C. who were then encamped in Vancouver's Freedom Square. These people have made the headlines so often with acts of destruction being credited them that I almost expected to find some sort of half man half ape creatures swinging from the trees in the square.

Nothing could be further from reality. These people presented a picture of utter dejection. Some were sitting on the hard park benches covered with tattered blankets while others stood in a group huddled against eath other for warmth. Young and old shared the

misery of another cold night in the open. They spoke two languages and it seemed that when talking to each other they invariably reverted to their native Russian tongue. When speaking to some Canadian or answering a taunt by some sidewalk jester they spoke

in broken English. I picked out a likely looking subject to interview that seemed to be complete master of the English language. I asked him many questions which he was eager to answer once he learned I was an American newsman. First he made great point of the fact that he was proud and considered it a privilege to be counted as one of the Sons of Freedom. I queried him on their beliefs and plans. Some of the answers seemed rather simple and most within reason from

our American way of thinking. They are asking Canadian government officials for the establishment of a neutral commission to try and solve their existing problems but insist that their spiritual guide, Stephan Sorokin, now in the callaboose, be allowed to be in

I was told that they have been fighting for what they consider to be freedom of religion which would include the presence of a spiritual comforter of their own choice. They want to uncover the truth as they see it regarding what they consider the intimidation against their people.

I asked what their reason was for being in Vancouver and was told that since they were prevented from reaching Agassiz, their original goal, they continued on to this prominent spot to try to further their stand.

They planned to try and find accommodations for some of the mothers and children and to enroll the children in Vancouver's schools to continue their education but in the meantime most of them would have to spend their time out in the open square as they had no place else to go as the government had refused them social assistance, I was told.

Looking at them and maintaining a 'so what' attitude was hard to do. To me they looked like any other group of refugees who were cold, hungry and homeless.

Be these people the rogues and fanatics that they are branded they still looked like living, breathing humans to me and I certainly felt sorry for them while watching the wretched souls standing, nearly freezing, while the multitude of a great city stopped to watch and look as one would look upon a dying wounded leopard.

Apparently some Canadians with humanitarian instincts felt the urge to help too strong to ignore for by morning the group had thinned out and as I understand

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

have now finally dissipated to a few holding daytime meetings in the square. Apparently most have now found

On the funnier side of life I happened on a scene in Vancouver that would make an "Our Gang" comedy look like a tea party.

I was attracted to one section of the city by what sounded like gun fire. In fact it sounded like the battle of the Walled City of Manilla being fought all over again. On rounding a corner I came to a street lined with buildings, each adorned with Chinese signs and with people throwing thousands of lighted firecrackers from every window, balcony and roof top to the street below.

I latched on to one spectator of oriental parentage and learned from him that this was a celebration of the Chinese New Year. This was to be the Year Of The Rabbitt and each exploding firecracker represented good fortune for the Chineses.

The scene before me was almost indescribable. I have seen lots of fireworks but never before have I witnessed the continual shooting of so many regular firecrackers.

Cars moving thru the streets were literally covered with exploding firecrackers. The air was so full of powder fumes as to burn the eyes and you could scarce see across the street. Giant bundles of firecrackers were tossed lighted from aloft and started exploding long before they hit the street. The sidewalks were inches deep in exploding fire-

I finally worked my way into a doorway that afforded some protection to my bare head from the deluge from above and focused my burning eyeballs on a huge building across the street from me. Literally thousands of firecrackers were pouring down from this building, from its two balconies and roof top.

I saw one huge bundle of crackers come sparkling and popping from the roof top only to dive onto the lower balcony like a jet out of control. Instantly bedlam reigned. This exploding mess apparently lit among the unexploded boxes of crackers on the balcony. Flames and black smoke shot up to the next balcony and completely blotted out view of the roof. Those on the upper levels just whooped it up and kept on shooting off crackers while Chinamen came over the second floor balcony railing like gobs coming off a sinking ship. Some of them managed to slide down the supporting poles while some lost their grip in the excitement and fell into the exploding firecrackers on the street. Howls of anguish could be heard above the din and I imagine some of it would have made a Chinese maiden blush for shame. A few spectators tried to rush over and help those who were unfortunate enough to catch fire or break a leg or crack a scull but the deluge of exploding firecrackers drove them off. In the meantime the lower balcony continued to burn and firecrackers rained from all sides.

The arrival of fire rigs and ambulances didn't even faze the celebrants who had managed to survive and to watch firemen and ambulance attendants working in a sea of exploding firecrackers was just too much for most spectators who by this time were doubled over with

One fireman got a whole bundle of exploding crackers down the back of a raincoat he had put on for protection and, I swear, he actually leaped over the hood of a moving car. One ambulance sat there literally covered with live firecrackers while the driver danced around with a genuine

At long last the boys on the top deck were made aware of the seriousness of the situation and gradually the din subsided and those injured in the melee were carted off for repairs and hoses were put into action to quickly douse the flames.

I'll guarantee that it was a good half hour before the laughter finally subsided, with even those less seriously hurt entering into the spirit of things.

Some joker with a movie camera could have made a fortune filming that epic.
