Apt Definitions

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering

With JACK BROWN

"At present more bunk is being peddled to the public concerning food than on any other subject."

That forthright charge came from a man who should know - Wallace F. Janssen of the U. S. Food and Drug Administration. He made it in a talk before members of the American Dietetic Association.

He said: "Modern nutrition education needs to acquire a new dimension — emphasizing the ability to question and to recognize and reject what is false and unscientific. Teachers need to keep up-to-date on the latest dietary nonsense; to teach regarding what is not true, or is merely speculation, as well as what is true." He then dealt specifically with certain dangerous representations of foods as medical cures, such as carrot juice for leukemia, apple cider vinegar as a general cure-all, garlic pills for high and low blood pressure, lecithin for coronary disease, powdered grapefruit for diabetes, Vitamin E for muscular dystrophy, and royal bee jelly for sexual rejuvenation and as a cosmetic.

The vast majority of people, of all ages, need a balanced diet - the kind of diet that is obtained from the standard foods offered in every grocery. Above all, a substantial proportion of protein in the diet is essential to both physical and mental health - the kind of protein that is found in its most palatable form in good, nonest meat."

There is, of course, a small minority of people who require special diets because of disease and deficiencies. But no such diet should ever be adopted except on the advice of a physician.

No grocer or butcher prompted this article. It's just little horse sense added to cold facts.

Life would be much simpler if we didn't try to make people think we're what we're not.

All levels of government indulge in the so-called 'painless" method of extracting tribute. What does it all Research by the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce

discloses that a breadwinner with an average \$7,500 income pays \$1,770 in direct taxes. Hidden taxes boost the hole in such a family's income to at least \$2,600. What can the taxpayer do? He can wake up. He can

interest himself in what his government units are doing. He can study where tax money is being spent, how and for what purpose. He can object to his congressman and senator to new spending.

He can keep on signing blank checks for government or become the boss of the nation as the Constitution says

The following is a guesatorial by the American Press: "The cost of advertising to promote or defeat legislation or to influence the public with respect to the desirability or undersirability of proposed legislation is not deductible as ordinary and necessary business expense even though the legislation may directly affect the taxpayers business."

"That is quoted from the newest proposal of the Internal Revnue Service for clarifying its regulations on oropaganda advertising.

"Perhaps a clearer way to say it might be: 'Freedom of the press and freedom of speech are hereby repealed by order of the Internal Revenue Service.'

"For under the proposal, even though a businessman was faced with the prospect of legislation which might ruin his business, he would be prohibited from appealing to his fellow-citizens unless he agreed to pay Uncle Sam a high tax premium for the privilege.

"Although leaders in advertising and business have been doing their best to fight this vicious scheme for censorship by taxation, they are sorely in need of public backing and grassroots rebellion against such regulation.


"The House Ways and Means Committee is now considering the proposal in connection with rewriting of the Revenue Act. We urge editors to join the fight against this new threat to freedom through their editorials, through letters to their Congressmen, and through appeals to their readers."
